HAULING COTTON BACK HOME.

Farmers Refuse to Sell at Present Price.

Something THE REFLECTOR does not recall ever having known before in Pitt county has occurred several times during the past week. It is farmers bringing their cotton to market and then hauling it back home. People coming in tell us they have met teams going back with cotton, and in one lot noticed there were twenty bales. The reason given for carrying it back was that the owners had been holding for 11 cents and finding the price below that figure took the cotton back home before they would sell for less. This is the kind of discrimination on the part of the farmers that will win out in the fight against low priced cotton. The farmers of Pitt county are able to hold their cotton and do not have to sell it unless they want to.

These tenement fires accompanied by numerous loss of human lives are very frequent in New York.

If Georgia keeps on burning cotton the crop may be reduced so that what is left will easily bring fifteen cents. Thursday in Columbus two thousand bales were destroyed by fire.

The latest in connection with the New York election frauds is attorneys for persons charged with violations are putting up cash bonds and spiriting their clients away.

Notwithstanding the claim that cotton is being held back, it is noticed that port receipts continue to run from seventy to ninety thousand bales a day.

GOVERNOR'S THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

It oft behooves a State, as well as an individual, to look at the past, that it may realize the mercies for which it has to be thankful, and to give expression to its gratitude by words and acts of praise.

If our State will take this backward glance, it will find that during the last year the measure of our mercies has been full to overflowing, and that our need of praise should be given without stint.

In agricultural pursuits we have been blessed with fair crops, and prices for farm products have been above the average, until the farmer is enjoying a prosperity seldom before possessed. He is also gradually learning the lesson of diversifying his crops, making his own supplies, thus being able to hold his products for increased prices.

In industrial enterprises the growth of the State has been phenomenal, over one hundred more new plants being incorporated this year than last, and many of them capitalized for very large amounts. Good dividends have likewise been declared on these investments, labor has been paid fair wages and given reasonable working hours, and prosperity abounds.

The settlement of our outstanding debt upon a just and honorable basis is indeed a great reason for thankfulness, as no unpaid obligations, that are honest, now remain.

There has been no strife between capital and labor, but peace and good will exist between employers and employees. With only one exception, good order has been maintained throughout the State, and the majesty of the law has been upheld by the people and the courts.

No scourge or disease or pestilence has to any great extent visited our State, but, blessed with unusual health, we have been happy and prosperous.

Our colleges and schools were never in a more flourishing condition, and the educational awakening that now exists is but an earnest of greater power and wealth yet to be enjoyed.

Temperance and sobriety in all things are being practiced by our citizens, thus insuring industry, and the high morale of the State is a blessing beyond estimation. No graft either in public or private business has cursed our State.

These extended mercies, shown in every department of business, have made our growth a marvel and wonder to all, for our percentage of increase industrially, agriculturally, educationally and morally has equaled, if not exceeded, the increase of any other State in the Union.

For the mercies so lavishly bestowed by a bountiful Creator, it is

our duty to return heartfelt and grateful thanks, and to praise and magnify the name of the Author of our good.

To the end, therefore, that all shall have an opportunity of showing their love and gratitude, I, R. B. Glenn, Governor of North Carolina, do join with the President of the United States in setting apart and fixing Thursday, the 30th day of November, 1905, as a day of general thanksgiving, prayer and rejoicing, during which day praise for the past mercies received, and guidance for our future, may be given and asked.

On this day I therefore earnestly request that all business of every kind be suspended and a general holiday granted, and that throughout the entire State the people gather in their accustomed places of worship and render thanks unto the Most High God for His manifold blessings during this year, and to consecrate ourselves anew to a life of industry and honor, and to His service.

I further specially recommend that on this day that all our people, as God hath prospered them, shall of their substance give to charitable and benevolent institutions, and especially to the widows and orphans.

I also beseech every one on this Thanksgiving Day, after they have given thanks, and while enjoying this holiday, that they do nothing unworthy of the reputation of the State, or that will dishonor God, but that they deport themselves as becometh good citizens and a Christian people.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of North Carolina to be affixed.
