COMMISSIONER'S COURT.

After Blind Tigers and Moonshiners

United States Commissioner I. A. Sugg is having some violators of the Federal laws before him. The colonel is conservative but firm. He has had quite a number of cases before him since his short term of office in this county. There are several prisoners now in jail awaiting the Federal grand jury at New Bern, and others are under bond.

A serious matter of bearing down and breaking mail boxes on the rural routes by five drunken men, was before him. The colonel put them under bonds of \$700 and \$1,00 for their appearance at court in New Bern.

Several blind tigers cases have also been before him. This is a common offense, and the crop of such cases seems to be fair for a full one. In one of these cases there was evidence of selling "monkey rum," the defendant undertook to show it was something that was not intoxicating, but did not go on the stand to explain. Commissioner Sugg remarked in making the judgment that he would give the defendant a chance to explain to the Federal court what "monkey rum" is.

It is to be hoped the good people will give Colonel Sugg their support in breaking up blind tigers and moonshine stills.

One Hundred Drowned

London, Nov. 20.—The South western railway's cross channel steamer Hilda was wrecked yesterday morning off St. Malo, on the north coast of France, and it is believed that one hundred or more of her passengers and crew were drowned.

The government ginners' report issued today places the number of bales of cotton ginned up to and including Nov. 14th, between 7,400,000 and 7,500,000. This was a bullish report and was followed by a sharp advance in futures.

A hero died in Raleigh Sunday, when James Litchford passed away. The day previous he rushed out to stop a runaway team, was struck on the head by the shaft of the buggy, receiving injuries that caused his death. Thus he gave his life for others.

One of the largest whiskey distilleries in the world, located at Bradford, Pa., was destroyed by fire Sunday, 810,000 gallons of liquor going up in the flames. The loss was upward of \$4,000,000 covered by insurance. It was a big case of "goodby booze."

A committee of United States engineers have during the past week been inspecting the proposed route for the inland waterway, the enterprise which Hon. John H. Small has been advocating through several terms in congress. Congressman Small and Senator Simmons accompanied the committee on the investigation. Reports from towns visited say that the engineers manifest much interest in the matter. We hope they will make a favorable report to the government and that the inland waterway will be opened. Such an enterprise will benefit the entire Atlantic seaboard.

Are We Lazy?

A prominent farmer said to us the other day that the biggest trouble with our system of agriculture is that we are lazy. He said that farmers, including tenants, do not half work, and predicted that when farmers get to working every week day in the year they may expect bigger returns from their labor. This is a pretty severe indictment, but it has at least some show of backing. We cannot agree that our farmers as a rule are lazy, but their labor is so spent that it does not yield the largest returns and they haven't as a class learned to make all seasons of the year contribute to their income. Undoubtedly many of our farmers are trying to cultivate too much land with the supply of labor at hand. They would be far better off if they would reduce their acreage and cultivate their land more thoroughly. People who follow this plan can testify as to its superiority. This acreage reduction will itself help to solve the labor problem by making the employment of a large amount of labor unnecessary. But acreage reduction will avail nothing unless it is accompanied by such intensive farming as will make "two blades of grass grow where there was only one before." Then when we accustom ourselves to a variety of crops making the harvest time last nearly all the year round, farming will take on a new impetus.

In short, the invariable rule of success for men engaged in all sorts of enterprises, as well as farming, is "make the most of the resources at your command."—Kinston Free Press.
