### MADE BIG MONEY.

Cotton in Five Minutes Nets Hoadley Pool \$8,000,000.

Cotton advanced 100 points, or \$5 a bale in 5 minutes, yesterday. The market value of the crop was increased \$50,000,000.

Joseph H. Hoadley and his pool of Southern farmers made profits estimated at \$8,000,000. Mr. Hoadley's personal profits were more than \$1,000,000.

Theodore H. Price and his following lost millions.

Daniel J. Sully was a heavy winner.

Eight thousand men on horseback are riding among the farmers calling them to 8,000 mass-meetings on December 3rd, when an agreement is expected to be made to hold cotton for fifteen cents a pound, or \$17.50 a bale above the high price of yesterday.

The rise was caused by the Government's Census Bureau report of the amount of cotton ginned up to November 14th. Wall Street had been expecting the report to show at least 8,500,000 bales. The figures were only 7,498,167. This means a crop of under 10,000,000 bales.—New York Journal, 22.
