### BOYS AND GIRLS RALLY DAY.

Interesting Exercises at the Christian Church.

Reported for Reflector.

At the Christian church Sunday night, a large crowd assembled to witness the exercises of the children of the Sunday school, for the observance of Rally Day.

This is a day set apart for the raising of money for Home Missions, by the children of the Sunday school, and it was observed here for the first time Sunday.

The exercises were especially fine throughout, and reflect credit, not only upon those who took part in them, but also upon those whose untiring energy and skill molded the small human units into graceful and pleasing combinations of elocution, drill and song.

As usual, there were those who surpassed in their roles; but the majority was so large that it would be difficult to single out any one of the children for special commendation, so well did they sustain their parts as a whole. Beyond doubt the strongest individual feature was the interpretation of hymns by Miss Nancy Coward. Her pantomime work is of the very highest order, and needs only to be seen to be fully appreciated.

Special attention was given to a proper background for the pantomime portion of the program, and the convenience and utility of electric lights was demonstrated in the most beautiful effects. The local manager of the electric light system, Mr. Dunlap, is herewith given full credit for his able suggestions and valued assistance in arranging the lighting for the exercises.

Prizes were awarded to those raising the largest amounts in the mite boxes, as follows: First prize Teuche's Bible, Miss Mary Johnson; second prize, solid gold pin, Miss Ada Tripp; third prize, book, Miss Angas Spain.

Those who raised one dollar or over were awarded a badge from the American Christian Missionary society. These go on the roll of honor and get badges: Ada Tripp, Mary B. Lathan, Evelyn Lang, Ione May Hooker, Fannie Spain, Harry Rountree, Lucy Outerbridge, Agnes Spain, Mary Johnson, Mamie Ruth Tunstall, Willie Gray Lang.

The children were trained for the exercises by Mrs. H. H. Moore and Mrs. Henry T. King; assisted by Miss Minnie Tunstall, as organist, Mrs. Moore and Mrs. King have both had experience in public school work, and are exceptionally qualified for the work of training the children. The results do them credit.

The amount raised by the children was \$18.24; total amount raised, \$24. The largest sum (\$3.57) was raised by Miss Mary Johnson, to whom was awarded the first prize.

### STATISTICS OF METHODIST CHURCH.

Splendid Report for Last Two Years.

Sunday Nov. 26th, being the last Sunday in the conference year for the Methodist church, at the close of the evening service the pastor read the following statistical report for the past two years:

When I came to this charge as pastor two years ago, I found the names of 202 members on the church register. We now have 296 members, a net gain of 94 during the past two years.

During my two years pastorate of the charge 116 persons have joined this church, of this number 2 have moved by certificate and 1 has died, leaving on roll 113 who have come into the church under my pastorate, but deaths and removals of those who were members when I came to the charge, leaves a net gain of only 94.

On looking over the Journal of our conference for the past 20 years, and dividing that period of time into two years each, we find the following facts as to net gain in membership:

The net gain for the past two years is larger by 22 than has been reported for any other period of two years during the past twenty years, and excepting the years 1888-1889 the net gain has been more than three times as large as any like period for twenty years.

The total net gain reported in membership during the 18 years next preceding my pastorate was 149, an average of a little more than 16 for each period of two years during the 18 years. The net gain in membership during the past two years has been nearly six times as large as this average. But for two periods of two years each during the 18 years under review net losses were reported amounting to 25. This number subtracted from the total gains reported would leave a net gain of 124 for 18 years, or an average net gain of 14 for each period of two years during the 18 years. The net gain for the past two years has been nearly seven times as large as this average.

My object in these statements of facts is not to boast over anything I have done, or anything that has been done under my pastorate, but that you may be encouraged by the progress made under the blessing of God, and redouble your efforts that results for the next two years may be far greater than those of the past two:

"I have not all the figures at hand to arrange the financial report at present, but this much I may say; every claim against the church has been met in full, and the church sends up a financial report in keeping with the statistical report just read."

### Sermon to Juniors.

The Jr. O. U. A. M. attended service in the Baptist church, Sunday morning. It has been many a day since Greenville heard a sermon so able as the one delivered by Rev. J. E. Ayscue on this occasion. His subject was "Miser of the Moments," in which he showed that our lives should be first consecrated to God, then consecrated our fellow man, and make the best use of every moment in the service of God and humanity.

## EASTERN SECTION OF THE STATE SHOULD HAVE AN ASYLUM.

### EDITOR REFLECTOR:

While the governor and the press of the state are taking steps to see to what extent the law is being violated in regard to the care of the insane of the state, why not the people of Eastern North Carolina begin to make their demand upon the state for an asylum for whites in the Eastern section? We have one at Morganton for the West with 1,000 inmates. We have another at Raleigh that will accommodate 600 when completed. These asylums ought not to be enlarged, they are large enough. Build one at Greenville or Washington, Edenton, New Bern or Elizabeth City. Then build another for the benefit of the insane who have property to take care of themselves, and remove from the present asylums all who are not strictly classed as the law specifies. Then we will no longer hear of the disgrace of insane people being confined in the county jails.

It is estimated that 2 per cent. of our population are crazy. In the older countries it will run as high as 4 per cent. As the percentage of urban population increases the percentage of insane will increase, so the natural increase of population will make another asylum necessary in a few years. To enlarge either of the two we have will be unwise. One should be built in the Eastern part of the state. We have a population of 1,300,000 white people in North Carolina. Upon the basis of 2 per cent. there are now 2,600 people who ought to be in an insane asylum cared for by the state. Those who are able to pay should be made to pay, but there should be room for them to be treated in North Carolina.

All asylums should have large farms attached to them where the patients could work, as experience has taught that 3 average patients make 1 good hand, and they can be cured much quicker when they can have occupation in the open air and sunshine. This idea has been adopted by the leading hospitals in the United States with very much increased success in treatment of patients. The hospital or asylum should be at an accessible point to railroad, but should not be at a large city where land will cost hundreds of dollars per acre. With a large farm attached the patients could do some work, their cure would be expedited, their health would be better, and what they raised would go a long way towards making these institutions self sustaining.

J. J. LAUGHINGHOUSE.

Representative J. J. Laughinghouse makes a wise suggestion in a communication in this paper when he calls attention to the need of an asylum for insane at some convenient point in Eastern North Carolina. This would be far better than increasing the size of the present asylums, even if they could be made large enough to provide room for all the patients in the state. It is better that there should be more asylums and not so many patients collected at one place. Just think of one thousand patients already in one asylum under one superintendent. It stands to reason that only half the number there could receive better attention. Mr. Laughinghouse's suggestion that there should be a farm connected with each asylum is timely. These matters should be agitated from now on and acted upon by the next legislature.

The Southern Cotton Association is now recognized as a prominent factor in protecting the cotton growers interest and in keeping prices of the staple on a paying basis, and I trust all who are interested will meet and give us their hearty cooperation.
