GREENVILLE TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

One of the Best Equipped in the State.

Through the courtesy of General Manager F. C. Toepelman, we were shown through the local offices of the Home Telephone & Telegraph Co., and the details of the plant and working of the exchange were explained. After going through it we must say that Greenville is to be congratulated upon having so complete a telephone system as the one recently installed. The circuits are full metallic and the wires cabled throughout the town.

The offices of the exchange are on the upper floor of the building in rear of the postoffice on Third street and the equipment there is thoroughly modern. In one room are the dynamo, motor and storage batteries that supply the current, lightning arresters and the distributing frame through which the multitude of wires are distributed from the cables to the operating room. The operating room is large and well arranged. In this is the switch board, central energy multiple pattern, large enough to accommodate 280 signals with positions for three operators. The calls are made by means of a self restoring signal.

There are two other rooms, one used as the manager's office and the other as storage room for supplies. The whole makes a convenient and well arranged suite of rooms for the exchange.

A marked contrast with the old plant is that each subscriber's station is now equipped with a long distance telephone that does away with the old style of crank turning, all that is necessary to signal the central office being to take down the receiver and place it to the ear. And when the customer is through there is no "ringing off," but simply hanging the receiver back in its place notifies the central operator that the conversation is finished.

Another great convenience in the new plant is that now there are twenty-three out of town points to which subscribers of the Greenville exchange have free connection. These places are Ayden, Grimesland, Winterville, Fountain, Farmville, Falkland, Cottontale, Bruce, Black Jack, Coxville, Gardner's X Roads, Parker's X Roads, House, Whichard, Oakley, Stokes, Standard, Chapman's, Willow Green, Shelmerdine, Smith's mill, Smith's store and Slattown. The first two named places have local exchanges. Free communication to these points is a great advantage and convenience, to the business men of Greenville.

To equip this new plant and bring it to its present high standard of efficiency represents an outlay of about \$20,000, and gives Greenville a telephone system equal to the best city service, the plant being as modern as can be found anywhere. Manager Toepelman has taken much interest in it and gave his personal supervision to a greater part of the construction.

The force in charge of the local exchange are M. P. J. Williams, manager; S. Buddie, inspector; Misses Hattie Smith, Emma Starkey, Maud Anderson and Cadie Holiday, day operators, Raymond Moore, night operator.

There are at present 220 subscribers to the exchange. A visit to the exchange offices will be interesting to any one and every courtesy will be shown those who wish to inspect the work.

THE PURPOSE OF PAIN.

Our light affliction which is but for a moment worketh for us a far more and exceeding eternal weight of glory. II Cor. iv: 17.

This is an age of anesthetics. Every one seeks to escape pain. We seem to think that suffering is the greatest of all misfortunes and we hail with rejoicing the man who promises deliverance from its power. Indeed, the charlatan has but to make his promises big enough and he can depend on possessing the purses of the people. We are physical cowards fleeing to potions, instead of enduring the answering assault of outraged nerves. So ready are we to resort to any means to deaden their stings that we are in danger of becoming a race of drug dependents.

To the average man nothing could be more desirable than a painless world. That is all that heaven means to many. Yet no one knows whether such a world would be as good as our own. Pleasure unalloyed might be pleasure unenjoyed. Certainly the higher we go in the scale of being the greater is the susceptibility to suffering. Whatever the future may hold, pain remains one of our great problems in the present. And we wonder why it should be necessary in the order of things.

We cannot content ourselves with saying that it is only a consequence of sin. That may suffice as a superficial solution of another man's problem. But we know there is pain in the world that does not come from wrongdoing, and that you cannot measure a man's sin by his suffering. If you could, then the Saviour of men was the most sinful of all. Some of the best people have certainly known the worst suffering. Perhaps in the place of pain in their lives lies some explanation of its purpose in all lives. It has its part in the development of character. It is an indication of the disciplinary intent of existence. If the best of all must be made perfect through suffering, how much more do we need its schooling?

Remember the pains of childhood, of school life. Were not those days of discipline as hard to bear as are our later days of pain? The confinement in the dull room when fields and streams and beasts were calling, the tasks, failures, and chastisements were each so overwhelming as to seem to blot out joy forever. Yet we could not afford to miss one of them. They warned of derangements in ourselves; they spurred to right adjustment to our social order; they taught application to unpleasant tasks; they bred sympathy with our fellows.

Those past pains make our present pleasures. Yet we are still at the school desk, and still, if we but knew it, in the elementary division. The lessons, no more welcome now than then, have all to be learned. Tempted to flee from normal pain, one needs to remember that no man learns life's lessons or becomes fit for graduation by playing truant at any of its recitations.

Pain is simply part of life's plan. It is as the winter to the year, as the dying seed to the harvest. Its principle runs all through life. We recognize and yield to it constantly. It is a painful thing to acquire an education, to achieve distinction. The office and the store are scenes of suffering. We are so used to their pain that we think nothing of it. Success is a costly thing. No worthy reward is picked up on the street. Everything costs, and the best thing cost most; we pay for them in blood and tears and anguish of soul.

Labor and weariness are but synonyms for pain. These endure with joy for the rewards of wages, of home and social pleasures, and distinction. If a man will thus endure for the bread that perishes, how much more will he endure for that

which is eternal, the sustenance of character. If we are willing to pay so high a price—often too high—for success in business, how much more shall we gladly pay for success in soul!

Out of tribulation comes our triumph. Every man must learn the way of life trod by the man of sorrows. They do not walk alone, who walk that way; he goes before them. He leads into life. The All Wise may permit some lower parasites to come to perfection without pain, but he loves man too well to allow him to lose his crown of life by refusing to taste a little of the bitterness of death.

The season of Thanksgiving is here in keeping with the annual custom of the American people tomorrow (Thursday) has been set apart as a day of Thanksgiving—a day to turn aside from labor and care and render thanks to our God for the many blessings He has bestowed during the year.
