CAROLINA WINS OVER VIRGINIA.

Carolina's Complete Victory
Over Virginia at Norfolk-17 to 0.

Seventeen to nothing was the score in favor Carolina in the game of football at Norfolk on Thanksgiving day between the teams of the universities of North Carolina and Virginia. The result was received with rejoicing in Greenville where football enthusiasts are numerous. Every feature of the game as it progressed was bulletined here, and the result was announced in a few moments after the last play had been made.

The bulletin service was effected through an arrangement with the Western Union Telegraph Co. A wire was run from the office to Carolina Club and the messages were received direct in the club rooms, a large number of members with their guests and ladies assembling there to hear them read. The bulletin service was excellent and prompt. P. S. Cotton, who managed the movement to receive the descriptive report of the game, carried out his part well. He read the bulletins to the assembly as fast they were received and speeded the intervals with his inimitable wit.

The bulletins early indicated that Carolina was leading and enthusiasm was at high pitch among the rooters for the Tar Heels. Some Virginia rooters were present and tried to keep up their courage, but this was seen to weaken as the game progressed. The first half of the game gave Carolina two touch downs and one goal, making her points so far 11 to nothing for Virginia.

During the rest interval there was much conjecture as to the final outcome of the game. Carolina's enthusiasm kept rising, but the Virginians were not willing to give up yet.

The bulletins of the second half of the game showed that Virginia fought more stubbornly but could not win any points, while Carolina added one more goal and one more touch down, bringing up the final score of 17 to 0 in favor of Carolina.

Carolina rooters were jubilant and the assembly dispersed well pleased with the outcome.

Sales for November 1,786,485 pounds, average price \$ 8.70. Total sales for four months up to Dec. 1st, 8,206,116 pounds.

In November 1904 the sales were 1,643,004 pounds, and for the corresponding four months to Dec. 1st, 5,528,878 pounds.

A VERY GOOD AND USEFUL LIFE ENDED.

Mr. Alfred Forbes, one of
Greenville's Oldest
Citizens Dead.

One Thursday morning at 2:30 o'clock, at his home on Evans street, the spirit of Mr. Alfred Forbes, one of Greenville's oldest citizens, passed from earth to the world beyond. He had been in feeble health for sometime and for about two weeks prior to his death had been confined to his bed. He was 76 years of age.

Mr. Forbes was a native of Pitt county. He was born in the country and spent the early years of his life on the farm. During the early part of the year 1850 he came to Greenville and engaged in the mercantile business. Greenville was a small town then, but he prospered and his business grew with the town. For many years he ranked as the largest merchant here. He was a plain, practical, honest business man, and always held the highest confidence of the people, both at home and in all his business connections. Having accumulated considerable fortune he retired from business in the year 1899, because of age and poor health, and was succeeded by his son, C. S. Forbes.

In the year 1871 Mr. Forbes married Miss Clara Jane Williams, and their's was a happy wedded life of thirty five years. To them were born seven children, all of whom, with the wife, survive him. These are C. S. and F. J. Forbes, Mrs. E. A. Moye, Jr., Mrs. M. H. Quinerly, Mrs. G. B. W. Hatley, (of LaGrange) and Misses Glenn and Helen Forbes. All of these were with him at the time of his death. It is remarkable that his is the first death that has occurred in the immediate family.

Mr. Forbes was not only a devoted husband and father, but he was a generous man, his means being used liberally whenever he could relieve suffering or want.

The funeral was held this afternoon in the Methodist church, of which he was a faithful member, the service being conducted by Rev. J. A. Hornaday. The interment was in Cherry Hill cemetery, the pall bearers being J. L. Little, J. G. Moye, Zeno Moore, R. W. King, C. O. H. Laughinghouse, W. L. Brown, B. F. Patrick, H. L. Coward and Jesse Speight.

The business houses of the town were closed during the hour of the funeral as a mark of respect to him.
