## A. L. C. FREIGHT TRAIN WRECKED

Three Cars and Coach Derailed—Conductor, Brakeman and One Passenger Hurt.

### PASSENGER TRAIN DELAYED OVER TWELVE HOURS

There is Considerable Speculation as to the Direct Cause of the Wreck.

The Southbound freight train on this branch of the Atlantic Coast Line met with quite a bad wreck Friday afternoon. When about three miles this side of Grindool and eight miles from Greenville a coal car in the train broke, causing this car, two box cars loaded with merchandise and the combination coach to be derailed and wrecked. One of the cars turned completely over and all of them badly damaged, while a considerable portion of the track was torn up. A piece of the broken rail stuck through the bottom of the coach.

The train was in charge of Conductor J. G. Elmore, whose home is in Mt. Olive. There were several passengers on board, all but one of whom escaped injury. The one hurt was I. H. Koehler, a traveling salesman of Rochester, N. Y., who received a severe sprain of the back. Capt. Elmore was also considerably hurt, receiving a scalp wound on the back of the head and a severe sprain of the back. A colored brakeman, Andrew Jones, received a slight abrasion of one arm and hand.

The engine and forward part of the train came on to Greenville, bringing the injured here. Capt. Elmore and Mr. Koehler were taken to Hotel Bertha where Dr. Charles Laughinghouse attended their injuries.

A wrecking train was sent down from Rocky Mount to remove the

wreck and repair the track. It required considerable time to do this, and the track was not cleared so trains could pass until 5 o'clock this morning.

Passenger train No. 59 from Weldon to Kinston had to stop at Parmele. It was first ordered to wait there until midnight, but was afterward told to move down to the wreck and transfer to an extra train to be sent there from Kinston. This extra train passed Greenville about 11 o'clock going to the scene of the wreck for the transfer and it was 12 o'clock when it got back to Greenville.

There were a large number of passengers on No. 59, there being about 50 for Greenville who were returning from the foot ball game at Norfolk, besides those for other points down the road. These had a disagreeable experience at Parmele where there were no accommodations, and also at the wreck while waiting for the transfer. This train did not get to Greenville until nearly 6 o'clock this morning. It proceeded on to Kinston reaching there just in time to make ready for returning on the regular morning schedule.

Mr. Koehler was able to get up this morning and continue his journey. Capt. Elmore is confined to his bed, but is getting along well and hopes to be out in a few days.

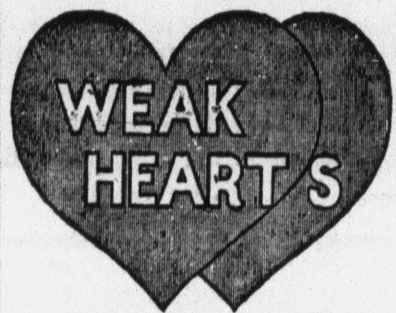
