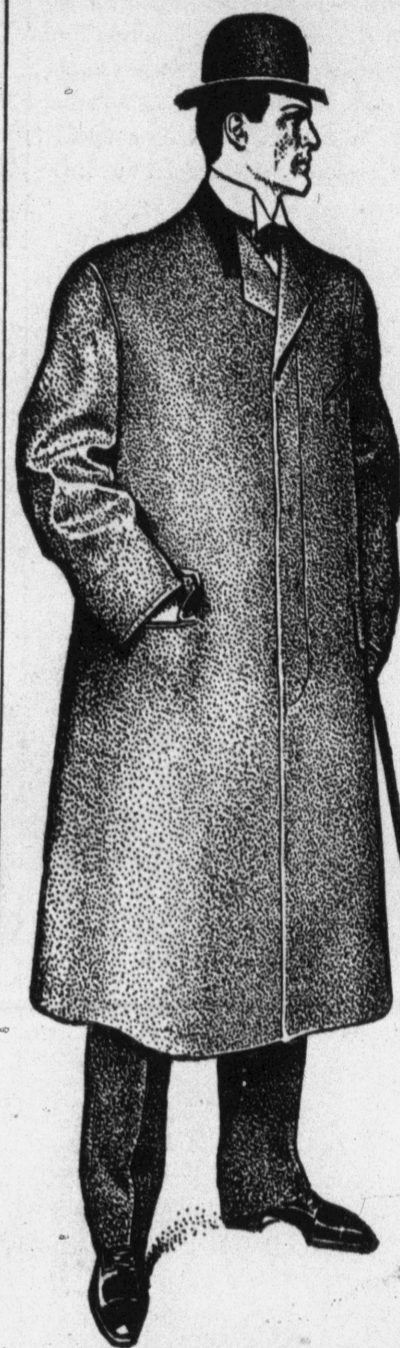

North Carolinians have a way of coming to the front. Dr. Charles Lee Smith, a native of Durham and a graduate of Wake Forest College, was recently inaugurated president of Mercer University in Georgia.

When the railroads fail to put on sufficient trains to handle their business, and overwork employes by running them day and night and trying to make one man do the work of two, they may expect wrecks and losses.

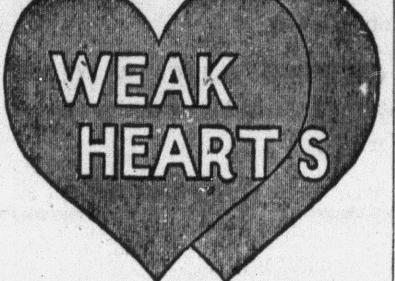
