OVER THE STATE.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Alfred Beaver, a farmer of Rowan county, died of lockjaw caused by cutting his hand in a saw mill.

A recent census of Salisbury shows that the city contains nearly 12,000 population.

Congressman Blackburn has introduced a bill appropriating \$100,000 for the erection of a public building at Salisbury, and a bill appropriating \$50,000 for a public building at Mt. Airy. Representatives W. W. Kitchin has introduced a bill appropriating \$50,000 for a public building at High Point.

By a unanimous vote the Baptist State Convention decided to raise \$150,000 additional endowment for Wake Forest College next year. They will do it. They have 170,000 members and less than one dollar per capita will give the sum pledged.

The Christmas bazaar under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society of the Methodist church opened Tuesday night in Perkins' opera house, and will continue for four nights. The bazaar is the center of attraction and was greeted with a large crowd on the opening night. The ladies worked with unceasing energy in preparation for the event, and are to be congratulated that their efforts are so successful.

The hall, with its splendid decorations and artistically arranged booths, is transformed into a scene of beauty. There are articles innumerable for sale in the booths as well as an elegant menu of refreshments, with the fairest of fair daughters to wait upon and serve the purchasers, and he possesses a miserly spirit who fails to yield liberally of his "filthy lucre" in the midst of such attractions.

The first thing to greet the eye as one enters the hall is the kitchen, which with its excellent appointments might easily be taken for a parlor. From this are served oysters in any style to suit the taste, ham, turkey, salads, pickles, coffee, ice cream and cake.

Over in the opposite corner is the palmistry and fortune wheel booth, where the fortune teller, ensconced in most inviting surroundings, will for a small fee unfold the mysteries of the future.

Next is the Japanese booth filled with novel articles from the orient. Attached to this is the tea parlor, where you can sip the delicious cup served in the midst of catches from sweet songs.

Then comes the baby booth in which are dainty and beautiful caps, sacks and other articles for the little tots.

The fancy works booth contains an exquisite array of such laces and other fancy goods as bring delight to the ladies.

The doll booth veritably caught the eye and the heart of the little folks, especially the girls. There are dolls of all sizes and two magnificent doll houses already furnished. The largest of these houses is to be awarded the girl receiving the largest number of votes during the bazaar.

The Klondyke booth catches all the boys and girls. This is equipped suggestive of the arctic regions and contains a mine of buried treasures from which prospectors can for a nickel dig out a prize.

The Little Helpers booth is filled with handsome sofa pillows, bric a brac and other handsome articles.

The candy booth is sweetness itself with a great variety of candies and fruits.

CUSTOMS AT ETON.

The Slang and the Ways of the Great English School.

Dry Bob—A boy who plays cricket.

Wet Bob—A boy who boats.

Swog—A Greek composition.

Chamber—A large room in college divided into "stalls" or cubicles.

Glory Corner—Formed by the bed and the wall, where dirty clothes are kept hidden by a curtain.

Threepenny Day—Feb. 27, when every collegier in hall is presented with a threepenny bit.

Fire Lags—The boys in chamber who have to keep up the fire.

Dead Man's Hole—The little square hole formed by the steps on a fires court.

Pepper Box—The buttress of a fires court.

Tug—The usual name for a collegier—i. e., a boy with a scholarship.

An acquaintance with the chief shops of Eton must also be acquired, for as soon as the fortnight is over the new boy, in his capacity as a fag, may be sent on an errand in the town; indeed, it will be part of his duty to fetch his "fag master's" hot food from one of the school shops.

This in itself is not so easy as it sounds, and the sooner a new boy learns his way to the kitchens of "Rowland's" and "Little Brown" and the gentle art of worming in among a crowd to a position where he can get what he wants the better for that boy.

If the coming year does not show great development in Greenville you can mark us as a second rate prophet.

The papers are saying a crisis is now on in Russia. Looks to us like it has been on for some time.

Mrs. Hetty Green, the richest woman going, is a wise girl. She says there would be fever fools on record if people talked less.

Witte handled things all right in the peace conference, but the premiership of Russia amid the troubles existing there was too much for him and he has resigned.

That is a pretty story coming from the state penitentiary that Wilcox and Utley, two of the most noted prisoners there and both serving sentences for murder, had been furnished with pistols to shoot their way out. If there is any truth in it the matter should have a rigid investigation.

The Baptist State Convention and Woman's Union proved too large to hold their meetings together, and at the recent convention in Raleigh it was decided that the two organizations meet at different times hereafter. The women will hold their next meeting at Durham in April and the convention meets in Greensboro in December.

The grand jury of Mecklenburg county adopted a recommendation to the legislature that justices of the peace and the recorder of the city of Charlotte be given more power, and have final jurisdiction in petty criminal cases. The legislature would do well to comply with this recommendation and make it apply to the entire state. If such power was given to justices it would save great expense to the counties by not taking up the time of Superior courts with petty cases.

At Salisbury recently a jury returned a verdict against instructions given them by Judge Peebles, who excused them from further duty remarking that he did not want lawyers to try any more cases for him. That is precisely like Judge Peebles. He is the whole push in his courts, and it would save the State some expense if it would refuse to furnish Judge Peebles any jury at all.—Charity and Children.

Fifteen Cent Cotton.

The Cotton Growers of the South, through and with the assistance of their organization, The Southern Cotton Association, are slowly but surely winning the greatest commercial battle ever known to the world. They are being applauded by millions of people who are watching the great fight that is being successfully waged by them to throw off the yoke of thieving and speculative manipulation that has held them so long, and has been the means of enabling the spinners to grow enormously wealthy at the expense of the poor farmer.

Those who stood loyal to the Association and accepted its advice, as given last January, to fix a price of 10c per pound on their cotton—demand it and get it—did so, notwithstanding there were thousands who derided their efforts by saying: "Impossible, foolish, etc." The amount of cotton held by the loyal ones was sufficient to bring the price to 10c before the present crop was ready for market.

On September 7th, the Association advised the farmers to ask 11c for their cotton as conditions fully warranted that price. Many fixed that price and sold for it.

Now, on December 1st, the fact that the crop is very short has been established beyond the shadow of a doubt, and only a small remnant of that left unsold; also, that the markets are bare of dry goods with future prices enormously advanced, cotton mills loaded down with contracts and orders for goods several months ahead, and only with about one-half enough cotton in sight to fill them. Will they pay 15c for cotton? Why, of course, they will if you ask it! If you do not they will take it at 05c as they have done in the past.

Decide for yourselves,—let them have it at its actual value, 15c, or let them take it at their price, 05c,—it is yours—do as you please, but remember that if you sell for less than its value 15c, you are not only injuring yourself, but every other owner of cotton is being denied his price while you are giving yours away, which prevents the advance as long as they can get it at less than its value.

Hundreds of thousands of bales are being pledged to the Southern Cotton Association for 15c, enough to force the price to its value very soon; unless buyers can continue to get yours that is not pledged at their price, in its value until yours has been taken out of the way and at their price—then the loyal ones will again reap the benefits of their Association's hard work in their behalf.

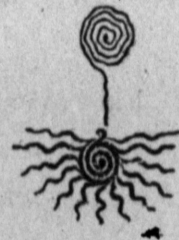

HOW TO SLEEP AND WHEN.

Some Words of Advice From a Doctor on This Subject.

The following brief quotations are from "Sleep and Its Regulation," by Dr. J. Madison Taylor, in Popular Science Monthly:

During childhood and exhaustive states too much sleep is rarely possible. For those in full tide of vigor too much sleep is often distinctly hurtful.

To secure the most perfect repose the temperature of all parts should be equalized before retiring. Cold feet induce delay in securing sleep, and it is then shallow when attained.

It is most unwise to overfill the stomach before retiring; this disturbs sleep almost as much as hunger, but moderate eating before sleeping is not hurtful, and is often salutary.

Body clothing at night should be loose, not dense, permitting the ready passage of air, never of wool next to the skin.

Bed clothing should not be too close of texture, blankets being preferable to dense "comfortables" and not "tucked in" too closely. Air should be allowed to pass occasionally under the sides at least as one turns about more or less freely.

Early rising is a salutary custom, especially when the day comes early, not otherwise.

More sleep is required in winter than in summer. The best sleep is had during the hours of darkness.

The sleeping room should be cool, abundant air being always admitted. This should not be interpreted to mean that the room may safely remain intensely cold.

In the modern treatment of tuberculosis fresh air is recognized to be imperatively needed all day and all night. Artificial heat can, and should, be supplied along with the fresh air till the temperature of the room be at or near 50 or 56 degrees F., for some even 60 degrees F.

The Skeats, Snells, Gleggs.

There are many examples of surnames which denote physical or mental strength in the person who first bore them. Striking instances are: Skeat, the old English sket, swift; Snell, the old English snell; old Norse Sniallr, swift, strong; Marvell, meaning prodigy; Swift, Sharp, Quick; Maginn, probably from the old Norse meginn, strong. A remarkable northern name is Glegg, or Clegg, which represents the old Norse gloggr, Scotch gleg, meaning quick, clever, and occurring in the Lancashire dialect as clegg. In south Yorkshire they say that a quick witted man is "as glegg as a wumble"—that is, sharp as a gimlet. Every one of these surnames—and there are more of the same kind—is certainly derived from the mental or physical good qualities of an ancestor.—Gentleman's Magazine.
