### SOUND COMING.

**A Splendid Site for the Depot has Been Secured**

### ALDERMEN GRANT RIGHT OF WAY.

The Road is Making Good Progress Eastward.

The Raleigh & Pamlico Sound railroad is one of the certainties of the near future in Greenville. The road has already been completed several miles eastward from Raleigh and the work of bringing it on is being pushed. The statement has been made in the papers that a site for a depot at Wilson has been secured, and now the same thing can be said for Greenville, as an option has been taken on property here for this purpose.

The site selected for the depots in Greenville is most admirably located. The passenger depot will be on Dickinson avenue near where the Godwin shop now stands, and the freight depot will be just back on the south side of Ninth street on the former Greenville tobacco warehouse site. This gives ample room for both the passenger and freight traffic.

The board of aldermen at an adjourned meeting held Wednesday night granted a right of way through South Pitt street from the southern limits of the town to and across Ninth street, which gives access to the site selected for the depots.

It is said that the construction of the road has been divided into seven sections, and each section let out to contract under bond that the work must be completed before the first day of September, 1907. So it is safe to say that the road will be completed and in operation within eighteen months from today.

Our townsman, Mr. L. I. Moore, is largely interested in this enterprise, and is enthusiastic over the Raleigh & Pamlico Sound road. The road means a great deal for Greenville.

Mr. Cox also informed us that Dr. Parsons, of Chicago, is now ready to send his check for \$25,000 to the college which was promised on condition that the \$90,000 was raised. Now that this amount is in hand, Dr. Parsons will be notified. When Dr. Parsons check is received Guilford college will have \$175,000 endowment fund.

**ONE OF FIELD'S PRANKS.**

How the Poet Used to Impress Some of His Visitors.

Some recent reminiscences of Eugene Field, the well known poet, tell of a way in which he used to amuse himself with some of his visitors. He would reserve for such use some carefully written bit of verse. His associate, who told the story, would figure as his amanuensis when he was not personally known to the visitor.

"Field would be talking with his visitor about some commonplace subject," says the narrator of the story, "when suddenly he would stop, place a long finger to his brow, as if smitten with a new thought, and speak my name in a commanding tone.

"Instantly I, at my desk close to his, would snatch up a pad and give ostentatious attention to him. Then, with just enough hesitation to make the feat impressive, Field would begin repeating from memory some poem which may have cost him hours of the most painstaking labor to compose.

"Between lines or stanzas he would perhaps turn back to his guest, as if the reciting of such poetry were the easiest possible task, a mere incident apt to arise unexpectedly at any moment. Indeed, sometimes the most difficult part of his task and mine was to refrain from laughing at the amazement pictured on the visitor's face.

"When the poem was completed I would read it over to Field, who, with an expression of beatific meditation on his face, would sit as if watching closely for a word to change. Of course, he never found one.

"The next morning, when the verses appeared unaltered in the columns of a paper, that visitor would start telling all who would listen how the wonderful Field had composed this classic, not only in a few minutes, but in the midst of a conversation which was scarcely interrupted by it."

## GREENVILLE GOING AHEAD.

There are good things ahead for Greenville, and the man who makes investments here now can do so with the assurance that he has done a safe thing. The next year or two will show progress here never equalled in the town before. The past year has given us a good system of electric lights and water works and other public improvements will follow. We also have an excellent graded school that is proving a great blessing.

Recently the transportation facilities of the town were greatly helped by the Atlantic Coast Line putting on an additional passenger train. Then we have the Norfolk and Southern system reaching here with its boat lines and that company is taking interest in the advancement of the town. And the coming of the Raleigh & Pamlico Sound railroad is a matter of the near future, a site for the depot and right of way in town having already been secured. The completion of this road will make three strong transportation facilities operating here.

Other advancements are being talked and the town is taking on new life all around. Greenville just will not be held back any longer.

Cotton has swung the other way again, the bulls being in control.

The Texas man who has been married three times, is the father of thirty-one children among whom are six pairs of twins, is helping to keep up the population of that great state.

The cadet who killed one of his class mates at Annapolis has been sentenced to one year's confinement, the punishment being that he is not allowed to leave the bounds of the academy in that time.

### A Will Decision.

The Supreme Court appears to have struck a snag in a case from this county. The late S. W. Scarborough left a will and named three executors, all his sons, two of whom reside here and the other in Lenoir county, with whom the deceased made his home for the past few years. The two executors, asked that the will be probated in this county, his home. The Lenoir executor had the will in his possession and refused. Then an action was brought before Clerk of the Court Nelson to compel him to do so, whereupon he at once went before the clerk of the court of Lenoir and had it probated. For this the clerk here adjudged him in contempt unless he should produce the will. He appealed to the Superior Court and Judge Ward at a recent term, held that Clerk Nelson was perhaps

right, but inasmuch as the executor had already had the will probated and could not therefore produce it, the same being a part of the record of the clerk's office, the sentence of contempt would amount to perpetual imprisonment and he decided against the clerk here. From this the two executors in this county appealed to the Supreme Court and Judge Clark writes the opinion affirming Judge Ward. In doing so he says in effect what Judge Ward says—that the Lenoir executor could not produce the will and would have to stay in jail and while the law as construed by Mr. Nelson was perhaps correct, still, under the circumstances, would not do. He does not say so in so many words, but this is about what it amounts to.

The effect will be to nullify this statute and a will can hereafter be probated in any county, no matter where the intestate resided. It leaves matters so that if Jones should be given the custody of money by order of court and he let Brown have it and Brown absconded, Jones would not be liable except in a civil action. There could be no contempt because he let the funds pass from his hands.

The opinion of the Supreme Court is regarded as most peculiar.—Greensboro Record.

Gov Glenn announces that he will ask the next Legislature to pass an act requiring the Bible to be read daily in all the public schools of the State. The Landmark believes that all schools should be opened with Scripture readings but it is old fashioned enough to doubt the wisdom of laws on the subject. But that is the fashion now—pass a law is the infallible remedy for everything (enforcing the laws after they are passed is of minor importance) While they are about it The Landmark suggests that a law be passed requiring all citizens, male and female, of the age of twelve years and upwards, to attend church at least once every Sunday unless they can show a doctor's certificate that they are physically disabled; and that all citizens be furthermore required to say their prayers at least twice a day. It might be a good idea to require candidates for the Legislature next year to speak out on these matters.—Statesville Landmark.

### SPIDER PERSISTENCE.

Patience and Skill That the Insect Displays at Times.

One who has been especially observant of spiders' habits writes: "To learn the aeronautic intelligence of the spider, fasten a pole in a pool of water, leaving a few feet of the pole above the surface, and put a spider upon it. Watch operations and you will see him spin a web several inches long and hang to one end while the other blows off into space in the hope that some object may be struck whereby he may gain his freedom. This plan proving a failure, he patiently waits until the wind changes and then sends another silken bridge floating off in another direction. Failure after failure may be the result, but the spider still keeps on until all points of the compass have been tried, when he proceeds to work along different lines. He climbs to the top of the pole and begins to build a silken balloon, and, although possessing no hot air with which to inflate it, he is able to make it buoyant. After finishing the balloon he fastens it to a guy rope, the other end of which he attaches to the island pole from which he wishes to escape. He then gets into his aerial vehicle and makes it fast while he proceeds to test it to see whether it is capable of bearing him away. If it is not and he is dissatisfied with it on account of its being too small he will tear it down, take it apart and construct another on a larger and better scale. Sometimes a spider has been seen to make three or four different balloons before he was satisfied with his experiment. Then he will get in, snap his guy rope and sail away to land and freedom."

### The Lake of Blood.

Every polar expedition and whaling vessel which visits the Baffin bay region puts in at Yaureka bank so as to allow explorers and seamen to visit the celebrated Lake of Blood. Of it the author of "My Summer In the North" says: "It is a lake of considerable extent, lying only a few feet above the level of the sea, and appears of a deep dark blood red. Careful examination proved, however, that the water itself was as pure and clear as possible, the red effect being due to the fact that the bottom and sides of the lake as well as the few stones which were scattered about in it were coated most perfectly with the red snow plant. In some places, where the water had evaporated, the withered red plants on the soil and rocks looked exactly like dried spots of blood."

### The Difference in Days.

A "solar day" is measured by the rotation of the earth upon its axis and is of different lengths, owing to the ellipticity of the earth's orbit and other causes.

An "astronomical day" commences at noon and embraces the twenty-four hours to the following noon.

A "civil day" commences at midnight and is counted from the first to the twelfth hour and then again from the first hour of the day till the twelfth at night.

The "nautical day" used by ship captains, explorers and some few others is counted as a "civil day," only that the reckoning is begun at noon, as with the "astronomical day."

### An Odd Death Custom.

One of the death customs of the ancient "Wends" was odd. They were most careful at the moment of dissolution to have no one present with the dying person. The doors communicating with the rest of the house were closed and the windows of the death chamber opened to afford easy exit to the evil spirits who, with the good, leave the mortal at death. Otherwise these wandering and malicious spirits would seek habitations in the first person encountered in the house. Once outside they went to their own places of abode, and nobody was further harmed by them.

live gases developed by the burning of powder became known the old style weapons disappeared, and firearms took their places. The first of the kind was a small gun barrel fastened to a long pole and fired with a slow match. Shot stones, balls of lead, iron bolts and fireballs to set buildings on fire were propelled with this apparatus. Only a short distance could be shot with these primitive guns. The old and clumsy siege machines which threw heavy stones by means of a spring rope were changed into siege guns.
