TRAGEDY IN SOUTH CAROLINA

Two Members of "Nothing But Money" Troupe Killed.

The "Nothing But Money" theatrical troupe that has been touring the South this season and visited Greenville last month, giving theatre goers here great satisfaction, has had to cancel its engagements because of a tragedy. The company was in Gaffney, S. C., last Thursday, stopping at the Piedmont Inn hotel. Two of the ladies, Miss Sheridan and Miss Bishop, were annoyed by a man trying to get in their room, and Miss Bishop was insulted by him.

At the breakfast table next morning Miss Sheridan identified George Hasty, proprietor of the hotel, as the man who had attempted to climb over the transom, after having tried the door and window, in an effort to get in her room. Milan Bennett, musical director of the company, accosted the hotel keeper about this and the latter proposed that they walk out in the hall to talk it over.

While the two men were talking together in the hall, Miss Bishop and Abbott Davison, the comedian of the company, came along on their way to the dining room. Stopping to ascertain what was going on, Miss Bishop recognized Hasty and said he was the man who had insulted her the previous afternoon. Hasty called her a liar when Davison struck him. Hasty drew a pistol and shot Davison, seriously wounding him, and also shot Bennett through the heart, killing him almost instantly. Davison has since died.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

The residence of John Fields, near LaGrange, was destroyed by fire Friday morning. Nothing was saved and the loss amounts to about \$5,000.

The grand jury, of Guilford county, found a true bill for murder against Dr. Mathews, who recently administered strychnine to his wife and caused her death. The case will be tried at Greensboro in February.

The president of the Wells-Whitehead cigarette manufacturing concern, at Wilson, has admitted that a controlling interest in the company has been sold to W. M. Carter. It is believed that this means the company is going into the hands of the American Tobacco Co., trust.

While responding to a fire alarm one of the hose wagons of the Durham fire department was smashed. Ten men were on the wagon when the accident occurred and six of them were seriously injured.

The number of corporations chartered in this state during the present year has reached 697, and 99 factories have been started.

Curious Lake Morat.

THE CLAQUERS.

How They Do Their Work in the Theaters of Paris.

The question of employing claquers in New York theaters has been agitated, but it is safe to say that the American sense of humor will never permit this. The claquer in European cities consists of a small body of men, under the orders of a chief, who undertake to applaud actors and actresses at certain times. The only one of the band who is remunerated is the chief. The men under him get the privilege of seeing the play without paying for their seats. The chefs de claque of the great subsidized theater of Paris are officials paid by the management to do certain work. Their salaries vary from 300 francs to 500 francs a month, and for that sum they are expected to take with them into the theater at each performance a certain number of men with big, strong hands and intelligent enough to clap when they are given the signal by their leader.

The claquer's work does not demand intellect of a high order. The chief is supposed to have taken notes at the rehearsals, to have consulted with the manager, to have talked with the author and to have a very accurate idea of the good points of the play. The men under him are scattered all about the house ready to give a quick response to the signal of their leader. Most of these men are eminently respectable. They are small shopkeepers, students of the drama and pupils of the Conservatoire with insufficient money to spend upon theater going. At the opera they number thirty. They assemble every evening at half past 7 in a cafe at the corner of the Boulevard Haussmann and the Rue Lafayette, where they crowd around their leader and answer to their names like small schoolboys. As each answers "present" to his name he receives a metal ticket upon which is the number of his seat.—New York Herald.

A Clever Advertiser.

When he came to a town where he was not known he pretended to have lost his dog and ordered the public crier to offer with beat of drum a reward of 25 louis to whoever should bring it to him. Bad roads impose a far heavier tax upon the people than would a bond issue sufficient to build good roads all over the county.

The South's Manufactures.

The great development of manufactures in the fourteen Southern States is forcibly set forth by figures taken from The Manufacturers' Record, of Baltimore, and secured from other sources, all of which are reliable. In manufactured products the increase from 1880 to 1890 was from a valuation of \$450,000,000 to \$917,000,000; in 1900 the figures were \$1,600,000,000, while for 1905 the valuation is placed at \$1,750,000,000. The output of pig iron in 1880 was 397,000 tons, and this year it is 3,360,000.

In 1880 the Southern States had \$21,000,000 invested in cotton mills, operating 600,000 spindles, while ten years later \$61,000,000 represented the amount invested in the industry and 1,700,000 as the number of spindles; this year \$150,000,000 is invested and there are 9,000,000 spindles. These mills now consume 2,250,000 bales of cotton, as against only 188,000 bales in 1880. The possibilities of the industry are shown in the statement that there are in the world a total of 110,000,000 spindles and the South can supply cotton for 80,000,000, while there are in the section in which the staple grows but 9,000,000 spindles. These figures would seem to indicate that, other things being equal, there is no danger of too many mills being built in the South. This section raises the staple and it should also manufacture the greater part of it, thus to greater extent reaping the benefit to be derived therefrom.

Twenty five years ago there were but 40 cotton oil mills in the South, with a capital stock of \$3,000,000, and in most places cotton seed were regarded as worthless, being used mainly for filling gullies and making fertilizer. Now there are 1,000 cotton oil mills in operation and their total capitalization is \$80,000,000, more than half the amount invested in cotton manufacture in this section.

The figures quoted above give some idea of the rapidity with which the Southern States are coming to the front in the matter of manufactures and are indeed gratifying. Taken in connection with the fact that this development may now be said to have only fairly begun they paint a most glowing picture for the future.—Charlotte Observer.

They have a hard time enforcing the liquor laws in Mt. Airy, as they do almost everywhere, and the Mt. Airy News complains that at recent term of Surry Superior Court Judge E. B. Jones was too light in his sentences on this class of offenders, as he imposed a fine of only \$50. Anybody who knows anything about this business knows that a regular blockader will never be put out of business for any length of time by the imposition of a fine. Nothing short of a jail or chain gang sentence will stop him and even that will not stop some of them. The judges who try these cases know that the imposition of small fines will not stop the business. Put the News should be thankful that Judge Jones made the fines as much as \$50. At the spring term of Iredell court Judge Bryan let this class of offenders off with fines of \$2.50, \$5 and he like.—Statesville Landmark.

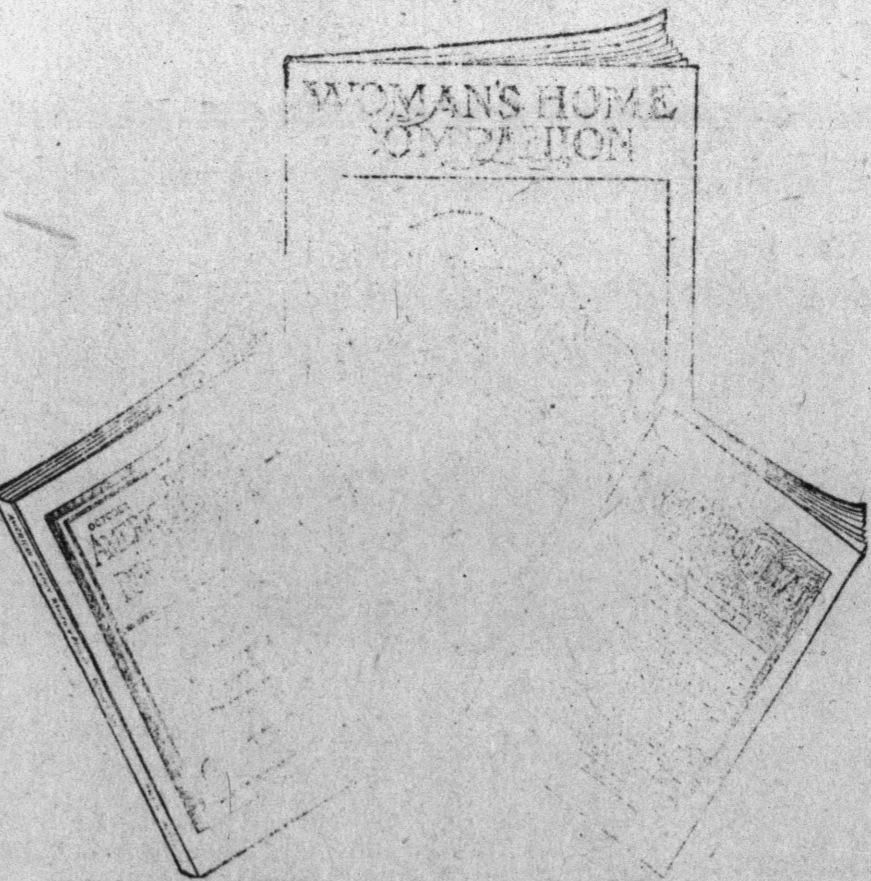
