MEETING OF COUNTY SUPER-INTENDENTS.

Shows Educational Progress Throughout the State.

PITT COUNTY TAKES HIGH RANK, Resolution Adopted to Establish an Educational Journal.

At the meeting of the county superintendents in Raleigh last week the reports of the various superintendents showed progress all along the lines in the state. The report from Pitt was one of the best made. Superintendent Ragsdale spoke upon visitation of schools, teachers' association and upon the establishing at once of a North Carolina Journal of Education. There is no member of the body who is listened to with more pleasure or whose words carry more weight with them than the superintendent of Pitt. Prof. Ragsdale was again selected president of the Northeast division of county superintendents associations, this being the third time successively that he has thus been honored. He has been president since its organization and at this meeting declined to be re-elected, but was in spite of this.

The association passed the following resolution which shows that they are moving forward. The committee will be announced by the state superintendent in a few days:

Realizing that the day has come in North Carolina when the educational interest of the state can be served by having some better means for the dissemination of information in regards to the schools, for practical suggestion as to methods and means, for communication of every part of the state with every other part, for the wide distribution of the facts of the schools as they are, and for the expression of the best thought of our educators upon the conditions and problems that now confront us in the work, therefore,

Resolved 1st, That a committee of five be appointed by the chairman of the state county superintendents' association with the state superintendent as chairman of said committee to take in consideration the advisability of establishing a North Carolina Journal of education devoted primarily to the educational interest of the state.

Resolved, 2nd, that should said committee deem it wise and prudent that such a journal be published, they are hereby empowered and directed to take such steps as they may deem best for issuing the same as early as may be found practicable.

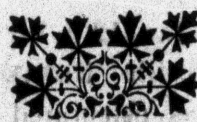

How to Select Flour.

First look at its color. If white with yellowish or straw colored tint it is a good sign. If very white with bluish hue or black specks, the flour is not good. Examine its adhesiveness by wetting and kneading a little on the fingers. If it works dry and elastic, it is good; if soft and sticky, it is poor. Throw a lump of dry flour against a dry, smooth, perpendicular surface. If it adheres in a lump, the flour is good; if it falls like powder, it is bad. Squeeze some of the flour in your hand, and if it retains the shape given by pressure it is a good sign. Flour that will stand all these tests can be bought without fear.—Pearson's Weekly.

Call For Mammoth Convention.

The cotton producers of the South, bankers, merchants and representatives of other business interests are hereby called to meet in convention at the City of New Orleans, La., January 11th, 12th and 13th, 1906. We want five thousand delegates to be present, representing the entire cotton territory of the South when the convention is called to order at one o'clock P. M., on January 11th in the splendid auditorium of the Washington Artillery building.

The farmers generally have expressed a desire for this convention similar to the one held at New Orleans last January. The South has won a notable victory in handling her great staple crop since that time and it is but meet and proper that the people should come together and rejoice over the great blessings which they have enjoyed and to emphasize their determination to continue the present reign of prosperity through the future. There are many things of vital importance to the future welfare of the South that will command the attention. Many eminent speakers from all parts of the country will take conspicuous part in the program. All agricultural organizations are invited to send delegates. No restriction on number of delegates to be appointed. County meetings should be held throughout all the cotton states on Saturday, Dec. 23rd, for the purpose of appointing of electing county delegates. Heads of the various State Agricultural organizations and Farmers' Unions can appoint delegates from the States at large. Discussion will cover the importance of holding the balance of the unsold crop for fifteen cents—extending the organization of the Southern Cotton associations; trade relations between the producers and spinners; building warehouses to facilitate the handling of cotton; diversified agriculture and raising home supplies; maintaining the present area of cotton for 1906; closer relations between farmers and bankers; extending our markets for American cotton in foreign countries. These matters of vital importance need the attention of the people. Hold your county meetings on Dec. 23rd, elect strong delegations, and send list of names to the general office of Southern Cotton Association, 920 Empire Building, Atlanta, Ga. Let every county in the South be well represented and let the world begin to acknowledge the business ability of the Southern planter.
