### President of State Cotton Growers Association to the Growers.

Col. John S. Cunningham, president of the North Carolina Division of the Southern Cotton Association has issued the following call:

To the Cotton Growers of North Carolina:—

President Harvie Jordan has issued a call for county conventions in all the cotton growing counties of the South to be held the 23 inst. This is to request the cotton growers of North Carolina to meet at that time to select delegates to attend the New Orleans convention Jan. 11-13, 1906.

Also I wish to ask that if any county has failed to appoint delegates to the State meeting which will be held in the State capitol in the city of Raleigh, January 3rd, 1906, they will appoint their delegates at this meeting. Reduced rates have been secured for the meeting in Raleigh.

Let every cotton growing county in the State be well represented so a wave of enthusiasm and inspiration will go out from it covering the entire State.

Next year will be the critical year and all cotton farmers must stand together or they will lose much of the vantage they have now won.

The school taught by Miss Nancy Coward, at Snyder's school house, 3 miles from town, will give a concert Friday night. There will be a small admission fee of 10 and 15 cents, the proceeds to be for improving the school. Everybody invited.

It was announced that the Ginners' Association report from December 1st to December 13th, was 489,520 bales of cotton ginned. The directors were closed during the dinner hour in secret conference. The convention will adjourn sine die tonight. The utmost secrecy has been maintained as to what has occurred in the convention.

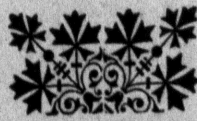

Remember your greatest happiness is derived through making somebody else happy. Let this be your Christmas motto.

Of course the Gaffney hotel keeper was going to put up the plea of self defense, or something else. He ought to hang just the same.

Ex-Attorney General F. I. Osborne, of Charlotte, has located in New York for the practice of law. In his leaving the state North Carolina loses another of her able men.

On Tuesday Col. R. B. Creecy, editor of the Elizabethian celebrated his 92nd anniversary, and the people of Elizabeth City honored the event by tendering him an elaborate banquet. Col. Creecy is the oldest active editor in the world, and notwithstanding his extreme age continues to write brilliantly. He is one of the state's most honored citizens. We wish him many more years of peace and happiness.

The Raleigh Times stated at the time that it only took over the mechanical equipment of the Raleigh Post and agreed to fill out the latter's unexpired subscriptions. But it seems that the grudge against the News and Observer went along with the deal. We never could see why newspapers in the same town should keep fighting each other instead of working together to build up their town. The public does not take much interest in such quarrels.

## The Telephone Girl.

If people would stop and think about the heart-aches they cause; the needless offence they give when they rail out against the telephone girl or the local manager, they would have a more thoughtful care. The girls in central are laboring for their bread. They are doing the best they know how to do, as a general rule, and it is a sorry man who wants to curse them through the phone or who is short and impudent in his demands and answers. The manager is always trying to make good—upon his success depends his position and salary. If people find that something is wrong they could call attention to the fact in a way that would not cause humiliation for the girl or the manager; they could understand that if

their ungrounded kicks reached headquarters that off would go the heads of the subordinates, and after the dismissal would be too late to regret the haste and anger.—Everything.

There is much common sense in the foregoing and it applies not only to telephone service but in other positions where the public must be catered to. Persons are prone to forget the thousand and one courtesies shown them from time to time by those who hold such positions, and will almost kick their heads off with impatience over one instance of imaginary inattention, when the one serving them is at the time burdened with demands equally as important. The public needs to learn a little lesson in patience, and, as suggested, stop and think sometimes.

## Prosperity to a Town.

In these flush times with the farmers, people in the towns begin to think about what will bring prosperity to them also. One of the surest ways for a town to become prosperous and stay prosperous is to make things for which there is demand. This is what farmers are doing. They are producing cotton and peanuts and tobacco, chickens and eggs and turkeys, and other things for which there is a demand. The prosperous towns in North Carolina are the manufacturing towns, and not those towns that depend upon buying things from one person and selling them to another. Of course this is done in all towns, but it is not what brings prosperity. Towns like Charlotte, Greensboro and High Point, which make things, are the towns that know nothing about dull days and hard times. Of course almost any town can now and then have a period of thrift on the simple commerce of the people, but this does not last unless it has some exceptional advantage in freight rates, trucking or the like. The towns that are prosperous year in and year out are the towns that make things, let us say again.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

## No Bad Suggestion.

The suggestion that the penitentiary be converted into a hospital for the insane and that the convicts be sent to the State farm is not bad. The penitentiary building is commodious and at no great expense could be altered so as to suit the requirements. But again rises the question, where is the money to maintain it coming from? It is almost a certainty that the next legislature, which does not assemble for a year yet, will balk at any proposition to increase taxes, so fearful is the average legislator of the effect an increase might have on his political fortunes. The plan offered last winter that the State issue bonds in amount sufficient to provide for the pressing needs of our institutions dependent upon the State for maintenance seems to be the most feasible solution of the problem. Whatever course may be adopted the State can no longer afford to delay in making adequate provisions for the insane.—Salisbury Post.

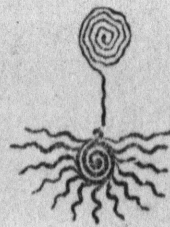

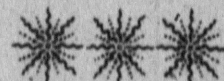
