In spite of the fact that she is supporting the entire family, she is very cheerful, and evinces great pride as she displays the latest addition to the family.

Gov. Glenn at Charlotte

"The other day I read some figures which were startling to me and I am going to give to you. In 1890 in the United States the cost of bread amounted to \$600,000,000; the cost of meat to \$630,000,000; the cost of clothing to \$660,000,000; the cost of education to \$347,000,000; and the whiskey upon which the revenue was paid was \$1,459,000,000. If the bill of illicit whiskey were added to this it would make a total of \$3,000,000,000. Present the subject of temperance as a business proposition and keep the saloon out of Charlotte. Don't abuse the saloon-keeper, but plead with him as a man made in the image of God not to abuse his manhood. Remind him of the fact that no church and no decent secret order will take him into their membership, and plead with him to do right. Stand for law and order and see that all offenders are punished alike."

#### MYSTERY OF SPACE.

The Sun Would Be Hardly Visible  
Alongside the Pleiades.

If our sun were removed to the Pleiades it would hardly be visible in an opera glass, with which nearly 100 stars can be seen in the cluster. Sixty or seventy Pleiades surpass our sun in brilliancy, Alcyone being 1,000 times more brilliant, Electra 500 times and Maia nearly 400. Sirius itself takes a subordinate rank when compared with the five most brilliant members of a group the real magnificence of which we can thus in some degree apprehend.

If we seek to know the dimensions of the cluster itself we are met with many difficulties, but on the assumption that it is approximately spherical in shape we can calculate its diameter to be over 40,000,000,000 miles. If we think of the dimensions of our solar system by themselves or in relation to terrestrial matter they appear stupendously enormous. Neptune, the most distant known member, has an orbit over 5,000,000,000 miles across, but the solar system is to the Pleiades but a Lilliputian to a Brobdingnagian, is but as a microbe to a mountain, for a sphere the size of the solar system would, if it were spherical and its diameter that of the orbit of Neptune, be relatively so minute that it could be contained more than 400,000,000,000 times in a sphere the size of the Pleiades. In other words, the limits of the Pleiades could contain 150 solar systems as many times over as there are miles between Neptune and the sun.

It must not be forgotten that, though there are 2,300 stars in the cluster, yet with such dimensions for the entire group vast distances must separate the stars from one another. In fact, 2,300 spheres, each with a diameter of 3,000,000,000 miles, could be contained in the limits assigned to the group, and assuming equal distribution of the stars in the group each would be at the center of a sphere 3,000,000,000 miles across and therefore a light

Apropos of this London Answers tells of a London lady who had an album garished with the autographs of most of the great men of the day, but wanted that of the "great captain." She mentioned her distress to a friend, a certain Mr. H., and a few days after he, to her great surprise and pleasure, brought her a note from the hand of the victor of Waterloo. It ran thus:

### An Insect Curiosity Shop.

### Where the Bird Felt Safe.

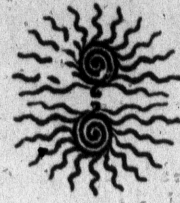

**WEIRD GHOST STORIES.**

**A Persistent Dream That Brought a Murderer to Justice.**

In a certain town in the province of Minsk, west Russia, a peasant suddenly disappeared. He was last seen alive leaving the church and going home to his sister, with whom he lived.

One day in a dream his sister saw her brother. He looked pale, his eyes were closed and his legs were broken. He told her that he had been murdered by her husband and his brothers. He mentioned the exact date and place of the deed and added that his body was put into a sack and thrown into the river. He wanted her to find his body and to have it buried in the family grave.

This dream was repeated several times, and at last the sister sought the advice of her aged father-in-law. He told her that it would be difficult to find the body, and if the culprits were brought to justice her children would be left orphans. So after consideration the sister gave the matter up.

But her brother's spirit would not rest and appeared in a dream in the above manner to a friend of his. Soon the news spread to the local authorities, who took the matter up. The river was searched, and the body was found in the exact spot indicated.

This discovery had such an effect on the murderers that they at once confessed. They gave all the details of the crime—how after service they took him to a mill where they all dined, and on leaving for home they attacked their victim. Finding that the sack was too small, they cut off his legs, tied a stone to his neck and threw him in the river. The above is certified to be perfectly accurate by the local authorities.

A Russian paper relates the following as having occurred in an officer's family at the time of the outbreak of cholera. The eldest son was in an office in a town nearly 200 miles from his home.

One morning the family was visited by an undertaker, who said he had received orders from a person, whom he described, to make a coffin for their eldest son. The father replied that the son was far away and that all the family were alive and well.

Directly afterward a message came that the eldest son had died of cholera at the same time that his exact similitude had been seen by the undertaker.

**Squaring the Circle.**

One of the problems that are as old as the science of mathematics is that of squaring the circle. By squaring the circle is meant the problem of finding the sides of a square exactly equal in area to a circle of given diameter. To do this either by elementary geometry or by expressing it arithmetically in commensurable numbers has been found to be an impossibility. In other words, the ratio between the diameter and the circumference of a circle cannot be exactly found even though in the division the decimal be carried out to 10,000 figures. The above being the exact facts in the case, we will say that the problem of squaring the circle is one that has long been given up by the mathematicians as insoluble.

**Apple Water.**

Apple water is a refreshing drink for an invalid. It can be made with either baked or raw apples, the former to be preferred when time is short, especially if the apples are baked and in readiness. They should be sour and when cold should be immersed in boiling water to cover them. Let them stand until cool, then strain and sweeten to taste. For the liquor made from raw apples three or four juicy sour apples of fine flavor should be pared and sliced. Pour over them two cupfuls of boiling water and let them stand three hours. Strain, sweeten and add a small piece of ice. A pleasant flavor is added if the rind of a lemon is mixed with the slices of apple.

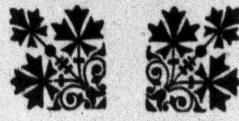

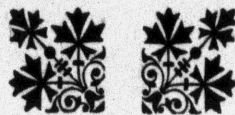
