DECISION FOR STATE.

North Carolina Wins the "Packing House" Case.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 8.—In an opinion by the Chief Justice the Supreme Court of the United States today decided the case of the Armour Packing Company vs. B. H. Lacy, Treasurer of North Carolina, in favor of the State.

This case grew out of an effort to enforce the State law of North Carolina imposing a license tax on every meat packing house doing business in the State. The Armour Company contended that it was not engaged in doing a packing business in the State as it did no slaughtering there, but the law was upheld by the State Supreme Court, and their finding was sustained.

The law was also attached on the ground that its enforcement was an interference with interstate commerce; that it contravened the uniformity rule of the North Carolina Constitution, and that it was contrary to the Federal Constitution, because it was class legislation, but the court accepted the interpretation of the State Supreme Court and sustained the law.

Justices Brown, White, Peckham and McKenna dissented on the ground that the Armour Company is not engaged in doing a packing house business in the State, but in selling meat.

Col. Skinner's Reappointment.

Col. Harry Skinner, United States Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina, is being congratulated by the Democratic press for receiving a reappointment. The colonel should feel complimented, for aside from the fact that factional lines sometimes prevent the saying of nice things the Democratic press is more often prevented by the calibre of the Republican office holders. The reappointment was given to Col. Skinner without the great ado that is characterizing the pie-hunt in Western North Carolina.

This is partly due to the fact that there are fewer Republicans in the Eastern part of the State and the number possessed of any degree of intellect being exceedingly small, but largely one, as several of our contemporaries have well said, to the record Colonel Skinner has made. This is a good pointer for our office holders of the Republican clan.

Col. Skinner has made a splendid District Attorney and has adhered strictly to the line of duty. This is not based upon hearsay testimony, but upon personal knowledge of facts. Col. Skinner has many friends in Wilmington who heartily welcome him whenever the business of the United States Court or personal matters bring him to this city.—Wilmington Dispatch.

9,721,000 Bales.

The Government graners report, issued this afternoon, places the number of bales of cotton ginned up to Jan. 1st., at 9,721,000. The market advanced 30 points following the report.

GENERAL NEWS.

Happenings of Interest Over the Country.

While the battleship squadron under command of Rear Admiral R. D. Evans was passing out New York harbor, Sunday afternoon, the battleships Kearsarge and Kentucky both run aground and the Alabama collided with the Kentucky. The latter snip was badly damaged.

At Chester, S. C., Sunday night, the warehouse of the Eureka Mills with 1,500 bales of cotton was destroyed by fire. The loss was fully insured.

The country residence near Richmond of Joseph Bryan, proprietor of the Richmond Times-Dispatch, was burned Sunday. The loss is about \$100,000 with \$30,000 insurance.

On Sunday at Elyria, O., the Hotel Andrew and block in which it was located was destroyed by fire. The loss is \$120,000.

Trade between the United States and Germany, whose trade relations are now the subject of negotiations between the two governments, aggregated in the fiscal year 1905 over \$300,000,000.

Kansas City had a slight earthquake Sunday evening. No damage was done.

Through failure of an engineer to remember orders, a disastrous wreck occurred on the Philadelphia & Erie railroad, near Corry, Pa., Saturday night. Three persons were killed and twenty injured.

A negro claiming to be 135 years old recently died in Philadelphia.

Five men were killed and four others fatally hurt by the explosion of a ton of dynamite in a rock quarry at Garry, Ill.

Put On 17,679 Horse Shoes.

Mr. W. H. Young, who conducts a blacksmith shop on North College street, is the champion horseshoer in the State, and probably in the South. During the year 1905 he with his help, drove in 17,676 shoes. Even this number, however, is smaller than the total for 1904, which was 18,185. Mr. Young probably handled more than 8,000 horses and mules during the year in putting on the number of shoes given. The price for putting on shoes is 15 cents each, making the receipts for the total number \$2,651.85.—Charlotte Observer.

John N. Moore, an engineer, has brought suit against the Seaboard Air Line railroad for \$25,000 on account of the loss of an eye.

W. H. Hood, a well known young man of Raleigh, and Violet Page, a woman of ill repute, committed suicide together Sunday. They drank a bottle of laudanum and died in each other's embrace. The tragedy occurred in the house of a negress, Hood left a young wife and two children.

M. C. Benton, aged 70 years and a farmer of Sunbury, died in the police station at Norfolk Sunday. The old man had an attack of heart failure on the street and was removed to the station, dying a short while after reaching there.

The Bank of Rutherfordton was closed Saturday by the state bank examiner and placed in the hands of a receiver. It is claimed the depositors will lose nothing as the assets are in excess of the liabilities.

The Lake of Blood.

Every polar expedition and whaling vessel which visits the Baffin bay region puts in at Yaureke bank so as to allow explorers and seamen to visit the celebrated Lake of Blood. Of it the author of "My Summer In the North" says: "It is a lake of considerable extent, lying only a few feet above the level of the sea, and appears of a deep dark blood red. Careful examination proved, however, that the water itself was as pure and clear as possible, the red effect being due to the fact that the bottom and sides of the lake as well as the few stones which were scattered about in it were coated most perfectly with the red snow plant. In some places, where the water had evaporated, the withered red plants on the soil and rocks looked exactly like dried spots of blood."

The Difference in Days.

A "solar day" is measured by the rotation of the earth upon its axis and is of different lengths, owing to the ellipticity of the earth's orbit and other causes.

An "astronomical day" commences at noon and embraces the twenty-four hours to the following noon.

A "civil day" commences at midnight and is counted from the first to the twelfth hour and then again from the first hour of the day till the twelfth at night.

The "nautical day" used by ship captains, explorers and some few others is counted as a "civil day," only that the reckoning is begun at noon, as with the "astronomical day."

An Odd Death Custom.

One of the death customs of the ancient "Wends" was odd. They were most careful at the moment of dissolution to have no one present with the dying person. The doors communicating with the rest of the house were closed and the windows of the death chamber opened to afford easy exit to the evil spirits who, with the good, leave the mortal at death. Otherwise these wandering and malicious spirits would seek habitations in the first person encountered in the house. Once outside they went to their own places of abode, and nobody was further harmed by them.

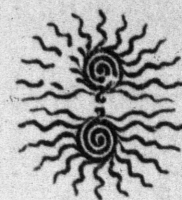

If cotton continues to beat a high figure there will likely be a considerable decrease in the tobacco acreage this year.

It might not be amiss early in the fight to advise the Cotton Association to draw the line against the politician.

The Washington Messenger has put in a new typesetting machine and new press and the paper has greatly improved. It does good work for Washington and deserves much success.

The Raleigh News and Observer, always taking its readers by surprise and doing itself proud, on Sunday published a series of letters from various towns over the state giving the progress of each during the past year. From these letters one can get a good idea of what North Carolina is doing, and it is a pleasure to note that the state is going forward more rapidly than ever before.

May College Football be Controlled and Remodeled?

We are at present undergoing a period of discussion as to the change in the rules that will cure the present football disease. We are now in a position to pass upon cures at the present time. What we need is to establish the principle and the nature of control. The changing of rules will not alter ethical relations. The chief needs at present, with reference to athletics, are ethical rather than physiological.

To reduce this discussion to a definite proposition, let me say that I believe the athletics of educational institutions should be under the absolute control of a man whose relation to the faculty is the same as that of any other head of a department whose training for his work, both in practical knowledge and scholastic attainment, is as extended and technical as is demanded of a professor in any other branch, and whose tenure of office is as certain as that of other college professorships. The primary qualifications of this man, so far as practical work is concerned must be the ability to get a very large number of the students actually engaged, voluntarily, in wholesome out of door athletics rather than to defend other collegiate team upon the gridiron or cinder path.

College football needs to be controlled and remodeled, but this can only be wisely done by men who continuously administer the college sports; who administer the games as a means to exercise rather than as an intercollegiate means of contest. We need continuous trained control of the situation by high-grade men whose situations are not dependent upon victory.—From "Shall Football Be Ended or Mended?" by Luther H. Gulick, M. D., in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for January.

The Revolver.

The stories of the hazing outrages at Annapolis grow worse and worse, and yet one hardly knows whether to be more exasperated at the hazers or contemptuous of the hazed. The punishment and humiliation of the latter could be quickly ended by themselves if they would. It is no wonder that he was to be hazed, the prospective victim would go to bed with a revolver under his pillow and use it when assaulted, he would never be bothered again and would purchase exemption for his associates. If he were seized suddenly and hazed, and were to go after his assailants the next day with the weapon referred to, and make the best use of it, the result would be equally effective. It is altogether in fashion these days to decry the revolver; they make laws against it and educate public sentiment against it. Just the same it is a great institution and one of the handmaids of civilization. Its bark is heard not too often, but too seldom, and this is not saying that it is not employed often unnecessarily and wrongly. But in North Carolina, we may say for illustration, it has become common to handle too lightly the names of women, and men's characters are aspersed, their integrity called upon, and no notice is taken because of a maudlin sentiment which is thought would throw upon the person who would meet the situation properly.

There must be a change some time. Men of courage do not relish the idea of invoking the law to right their personal wrongs; they prefer to do that themselves. But as the case now stands before a perverted public opinion and an inequitable law, which says no words justify resentment, the original offender is held guiltless and the avenger comes in for punishment which he does not deserve.

Carpet knights and milksops, who shoot from ambush behind the law to which they look for protection for anything their licentious tongues or pens may utter are not expected to subscribe to the sentiment, but The Observer is a friend of the revolver as an agency which makes for good speech and writing, for good behavior, good order and wholesome society.—Charlotte Observer.

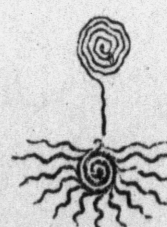

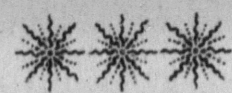

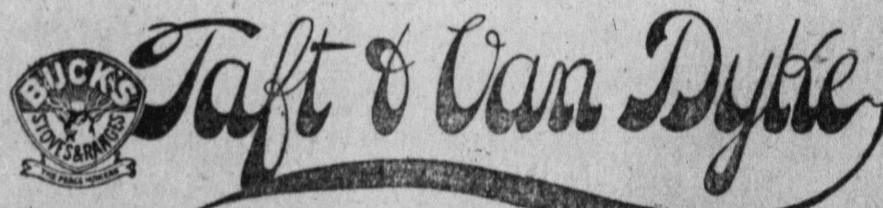

WEDDINGS IN KOREA.

The Ceremony is a Test of Endurance For the Bride.

The marriage ceremony in Korea is conducted under conditions that are practically tests of endurance. On the day of his marriage a Korean has the right if he can afford it to assume the costume of any official of the imperial court. Usually he selects that of minister of state.

In this guise, borne by six bearers, in a highly decorated chair, preceded by two red parasols, the insignia of the official he is copying, he leaves his father's house and proceeds to that of the bride. He finds her ready to receive him, her face elaborately painted, her eyelashes gummed together, temporarily blinded, so that she may not see his features until night.

When the bridegroom enters the bride's house he retires to a corner, where he makes oath to be a good husband. He then approaches the bride, who, being unable to see, is informed of his proximity by an attendant.

The bride and bridegroom are now bound together with long blue and red strings by a woman, part sorceress and part servant. Wine of friendship is tasted by the couple in turn. Then follows a grotesque scene. Its intention is to test the earnestness of the bride.

The young man may laugh, but this is strictly forbidden to the girl. If she succumbs to the temptation to laugh the marriage is then and there annulled. The bride having safely passed through this ordeal, she is now tested for capacity to remain silent.

The young man tries every device to make her speak. If unsuccessful he cries out that he will not marry a dumb woman. Usually the girl is proof against the temptation, but if she is resentful and makes retort that is sufficient to annul the marriage.

This happens when the girl is opposed to marrying the man. She adopts that method of escape. Generally the bride goes to live with her husband's parents, where she becomes the slave of the mother-in-law, the Korean species being considered the most terrible of the whole world.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

Boiled Ham, German Style.

To cook a ham in German style all day and a night before boiling the ham must soak in a boiler of foot water on the back of the stove, over a slow fire, this to draw out the salt and to make the ham very tender. Next morning the ham is to be removed, the boiler filled with cold water and in this the ham slowly boils for the rest of the day. Then, at about 6 o'clock in the evening, take the ham out of the water and while it is yet warm carefully remove the skin. After sticking in cloves all over the fatty surface apply a coat of sugar glaze and set the ham away where it will cool. Do not eat a slice of that ham until the next morning and you will have a juicy morsel.—Philadelphia Ledger.

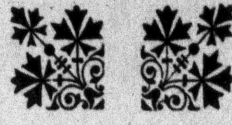

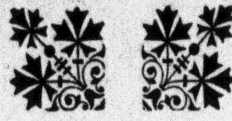
