Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Miss Kate McGhee, sister of Thomas McGhee, of Goldsboro, died in that city Monday.

The residence of R. L. Crisp, at Kinston, was damaged to the amount of \$2,000 by fire Tuesday night.

D. M. Murphy, aged 70 years, a Confederate veteran of Cabarrus county, fell in the fire at his home and was so badly as to cause his death.

Church Advertises in Newspaper.

The Raleigh Baptist Tabernacle church, of this city, recognized as one of the State's most progressive and aggressive religious bodies, has inaugurated a new method of reaching the people of Raleigh. Realizing the inestimable benefits of newspaper advertising in secular affairs, this church has decided to adopt this means for the furtherance of the Lord's work.

The pastor of the Tabernacle has contracted for a regular display advertisement to appear in The Raleigh Times each Saturday. This does not interfere with the usual announcements of Sunday services published in The Times. The Baptist Tabernacle is probably the first church in North Carolina to run a regular display advertisement in a newspaper, although it is common in some Northern cities.—Raleigh Times.

Renewed Effort For Immigrants.

North Carolina officials have set on foot an effort to induce some of the idle laboring element of England and Scotland to locate in North Carolina as farm laborers and tenants. Secretary of State J. Bryan Grimes is in correspondence with an immigration agent North who is on the eve of departure for England to undertake the work inducing immigration to several States he will represent and he is anxious to include North Carolina in his list, charging per capita for immigrants located to be paid by the State or by the landowners where they are settled. He has written Secretary Grimes who wrote a favorable answer today and took the matter up with Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson who though Secretary T. K. Bruner has been conducting an immigration campaign for several months.—Raleigh Times.

WINTERVILLE.

New Buggy Shop—Old Industries Encouraged—Electric Lights—Glory of the Town is its Schools.

To the Editor: Though the year of 1905 has brought to us no eventful changes, still I am glad to be able to say that Winterville is thoroughly in harmony with the spirit of progress so general in our State today. In all branches of our industry there has been gratifying growth.

More than a dozen new dwellings have been added and several others are in progress of building.

A new shop for the exclusive manufacture of buggy bodies and seats, and a whole block consisting of four handsome concrete stores, in one of which the Bank of Winterville, which has recently been organized, will be operated, have also just been completed.

Many of our old enterprises have made extensive improvements. Among these might be mentioned the large shop recently added by the A. G. Cox Manufacturing Company to their already mammoth plant, and new machinery just put in by the Pitt County Oil Company, which doubles the capacity of their mill.

An electric light company has also been formed and the town and most of the dwellings are now lighted by electricity.

I must also say a word for our educational development. The Winterville High School which has justly earned such a wide reputation for its excellent discipline through scholarship, and progressive spirit, opened the fall term with 40 per cent. of its entire enrollment in the boarding patronage. While it already had two large dormitories, one built at a cost of \$5,000 and another at \$2,000. It was found necessary to erect another. This was immediately done at a cost of \$2,000.

Electric lights have been put in all the buildings this year; also a new Stieff piano has been purchased for the music department, 140 books added to the library and the reading room much improved. It is doing the finest work in its history.

Taken all together our people have much reason to be encouraged, and we confidently expect greater improvement during the present year than in the past.

A landslide at Haverstraw, N. Y. Monday night, wrecked twelve houses and sixteen persons are missing, all supposed to be killed.

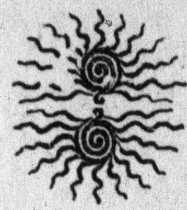

If the President could abolish the offices in the South, as his wish to do expresses, there would be nothing at all left down this way to hold his crowd together.

The prophets are predicting things that they say will happen in 1906. You need not get frightened in advance, as it will be time enough when the calamities come.

The old saying is that the weather of the first twelve days in January is an index to the corresponding months of the year. If it is true, this year will give us a plenty of the changeable kind.

If the farmers win out in the fight for higher cotton they will be boss of the situation hereafter. We hope they will win, for being the producers they have more right than the other fellows to say what the price shall be.

A good night school in Greenville would be an advantage to young men and boys who work during the day. It would give opportunity for an education to those who cannot spare the time from labor to attend school during the day.

At Newport News, Va., there is a movement to inaugurate the "Jim Crow" law on the street cars and require the races to ride in separate apartments. The negroes are fighting the movement and have ordered 5,000 buttons bearing the words "I Will Walk" for distribution among the race. Unless the city council takes water the darkies will have to walk if they stick to the motto on their buttons.

While there is every indication that the tobacco acreage in this section will be decreased this year, the farmers should think well before they decide to increase the cotton acreage. The surest way to keep up the price of the staple is to keep down the size of the crop. A small crop of a high price pays much better than a large crop at a low price

One of the pressing needs of Greenville is a day electric current. With the good municipal electric plant here the day current could be installed without a large additional expense for operation. With a day current available many small industries that want power could readily obtain it, and it would be the means of creating more industries that would help the town grow and develop and increase the revenue of the electric plant. We need to make the town grow and encourage every enterprise, even if it costs a little more to start with.

EXTRACT

From Gov. Warfield's Message to the Maryland Legislature.

"The last Legislature recognized the importance of the Jamestown Exposition on the shores of Hampton Roads, Va., which will begin on May 13, 1907, by passing a joint resolution requesting the Governor to appoint a commission of thirteen members to represent the State and to make suggestions concerning a suitable and proper representation by Maryland

"Acting under this authority, I have appointed a commission consisting of thirteen representative men of the State.

"The commission report that they have made a thorough inspection of the grounds and of the working plans; that they believe the exposition to be an assured success, and that it will afford a great opportunity for the exhibition of Maryland's patriotism, trade and industry.

"Maryland is closer to Virginia in historical association and trade relationship than any other State.

"As the gateway of the South, we have large interests at stake. This exposition will not only celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of the first permanent settlement of Englishspeaking people on the American Continent, but will bring together the people of the South as has no other event in our history, and bind them, if possible, closer together.

"The officials in charge of this exposition have tendered to our State a position of honor upon the grounds second only to that of Virginia.

"It is, therefore, eminently fitting and proper that Maryland should have an adequate building and an exhibit of its historical, educational and industrial achievements and resources that will be creditable to us all. The Government of the United States has made a substantial appropriation and the President has deemed it of such importance as to merit special reference in his message to Congress. New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey have decided to participate, New York having appropriated \$150,000 for a building and exhibit and Pennsylvania \$100,000. Of all expositions ever held in this country, it will be of the largest direct and practical importance to Maryland.

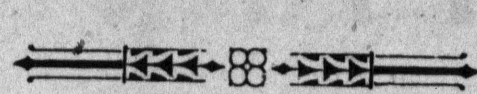

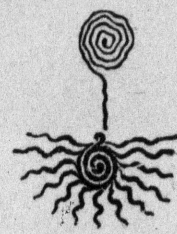

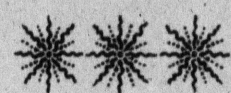

THE FASTNET LIGHT.

Visitors Have to Be Swung Ashore by Means of a Jib.

The first glimpse of Great Britain that the American tourist gets on his European tour is that of the Fastnet lighthouse.

It stands on a rugged and solitary rock, situated nine miles south of Crookhaven, at the extreme southwest corner of Ireland, and is perhaps more storm beaten than any other around our coast. The rock is eighty feet in height, and the lighthouse towers another seventy feet above, yet in winter gales the Atlantic billows literally bombard the massive structure and have even smashed in a portion of the lantern at the summit of the erection, the seas frequently sweeping over the rock with tremendous force. Some dozen or so years ago the stormy weather then prevailing prevented all communication with the rock for many weeks, so that the store of food was consumed, with the exception of some flour. At last a schooner managed to approach sufficiently near to enable a small quantity of food to be dragged through the sea by the hungry men, and fortunately the next day the sea moderated, and the stores were once more fully replenished.

Except in very calm weather the Fastnet is surrounded by a fringe of foam, and the only means of landing is by the aid of a "jib" fifty-eight feet in length, so placed on the rock that in moderate weather its end reaches outside the surf. When a visitor wishes to land (an unusual occurrence) he is rowed in a small boat as near as the waves permit, and the light keepers throw out a small buoy attached to a rope, which is secured by the man in the boat. The jib is then swung out, and the visitor, placing one foot in the loop and catching a tight hold of the rope, is hoisted about forty feet vertically, and then the jib, being pivoted at its foot, swings him horizontally about 100 feet on to a safe landing.—London Telegraph.

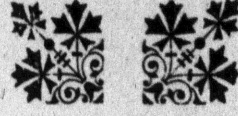

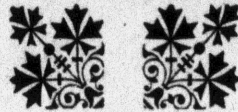
