TILLMON DENOUNCES PRESIDENT.

Because of the Mrs. Morriss Ejectment.

Washington, Jan. 17.—The recent forcible removal from the White House of Mrs. Minor Morris was made the subject of emphatic denunciation by Mr. Tillman in the Senate today. His remarks called out remonstrance from Messrs. Hale, Hopkins and Daniel and led to the very abrupt closing of the doors and the sudden adjournment of the Senate in the middle of the afternoon.

The speech abounded in Mr. Tillman's peculiar expressions, and was characterized by many severe and exceptionally personal thrusts at the President. At times he wept over what he regarded as the indignities to Mrs. Morris, and his eyes were full of tears when he declared in the face of protest from his fellow Senators that he would demand an investigation of the White House incident.

CRAZY DRUNK.

Makes Trouble for the Officers.

ONLY ONE SAVED.

Schooner Grounds on Diamond Shoals.

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 17.—Adrift on a gang plank from nine o'clock last Saturday morning until five o'clock Monday afternoon, without food or water, Karl Sumner, the only known surviving member of the crew of the four masted schooner Robert H. Stephenson, was picked up by the German steamer Enone, bound from Philadelphia for Savannah, Monday afternoon at five o'clock, and was brought to Savannah today. Besides the ship's crew, there were four women aboard, the wife of the captain and two relatives and a colored servant, all going to Havana on a pleasure trip, making a total of thirteen people aboard.

Sumner says the schooner grounded on Diamond Shoals. All save four seamen, himself included, took to the boats, one boat being smashed, and the first mate and two men being drowned. This he saw. He thinks the other boat capsized.

A Word of Caution.

Nineteen hundred and five was a year of almost unexampled prosperity, and, at least thus far, there is nothing to indicate that 1906 will be less bountifully laden with the good things of the world.

Fire in the Capital Club building at Raleigh caused \$5,000 damage.

The King's Daughters are making an effort to build in Durham a home for aged ladies.

Joe Herring, aged about 50 years, was found dead in his field about three miles from LaGrange.

John Phillip Sousa will visit several points in this State in March and give concerts.

Claudius Dockery has been appointed marshal for the eastern district of North Carolina.

The Durham Jr. O. U. A. M. is moving to get the orphanage to be established by the order located in that city.

There is a case on trial in the Federal court at Greensboro in which there are over two hundred witnesses.

C. C. Dermid, a conductor of the Southern Railway, was killed at Balsam, Wednesday, by being crushed between two cars.

A heavy loaded wagon run over the two-year-old child of Larkin Kivett, of High Point, and the child will probably die of the injury.

Insurance Commissioner Young has issued an order to the colored lodges of Good Samaritans and Daughters of Samaria in the state to disband, as they are operating in violation of the insurance laws.

Two negroes attempted to rob a jewelry store in Wilmington while a 14-year-old boy was left in charge. The boy grabbed a pistol from the shelf and opened fire on the would-be-robbers, putting two balls in one of them.

A party of seven Dutch immigrants arrived yesterday on the Lyde Line steamship from New York. Not one in the party can speak the English language. They will be employed at farming on the farm of Capt. T. M. Thompson, near Southport.—Wilmington Dispatch.

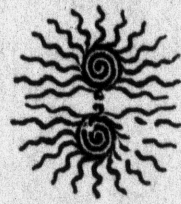

The Common Sense.

He does not pause to feel the public pulse or take counsel of the many minds about him, while the man of common sense, thinking of others rather than of himself, balances the conflicting opinions of those about him, and out of the Babel of voices weighed in the scales of his calm reason reaches the same and safe conclusions that satisfy the public mind. It is not toadying to the opinions of the populace, but it is the great truth so often quoted, that in the multitude of counsels there is wisdom. The fact is, that exactly at this point the highest wisdom may be found, and the man who first discovers and gives it expression is he who is gifted with what we call good old common sense. And one of the vital elements in his success is his ability to bridle his own tongue, for the man whose words outrun his thoughts will never command the confidence of his fellows.—Charity and Children.

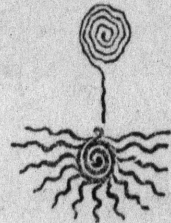

SOME ENGLISH RULERS.

The Good and the Bad of Royal Folk of Other Days.

Charles I. is generally accepted as a gentleman as well as a martyr because he was most fortunate in the artists commissioned to execute his portraits. In real life he was by no means the mild and polished individual he looked on canvas. His queen, Henrietta Maria, gave it as one reason for her wish that her sons should be taught courtesy that her husband was so harsh mannered that he had made many enemies through it.

The only Stuarts who shone by civil speech and ways were those who had been well drilled in France—Mary, queen of Scots, for one and Charles II. for another. James I. of England was an awkward creature, undignified, familiar, sometimes grotesque. The real Charles I. lacked graciousness as well as "gumption" and was little beloved outside his own family circle. James II. was never popular, and as for his daughters, Queens Mary II. and Anne, they were heavy women with but little of the reputed Stuart elegance about them.

The boorishness of the first and second Georges, supposed by Jacobites of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries to afford such a contrast to the perfect manners of the Jameses and Charleses, simply fitted the times these Hanoverian princes lived in, for at most of the courts of Europe a lack of good taste was then general, and royalties were much as other people in spite of their fine clothes.

As kings the old and young pretenders might have cut no better figure than these Georges. Bonnie Prince Charlie did not wear well, as he became a heavy drinker early in life and finished as a downright sot, with whom his wife could not live. Somehow the Stuart dynasty never rooted strongly in England. In the person of Queen Mary's son James it was accepted as a necessary evil in 1603, and in 1688 it was expelled in the person of James II.

The interval had been distinguished by a revolution, the execution of Charles I., the protectorate of Oliver Cromwell, the restoration of Charles II. and an unsuccessful rebellion in favor of James II.'s illegitimate son, the Duke of Monmouth. The two daughters of James II., Queens Mary II. and Anne, though of the Stuart line, have always been considered usurpers by true Jacobites.

James I. came to England in 1603 as a stranger who had never before been in the country and whose claim to the sovereignty as Queen Elizabeth's successor was founded on his descent from Henry VII., first of the Tudor line, his mother, Mary, queen of Scots, having been Henry's great-granddaughter. George I. came to England in 1714 as James I.'s great-grandson and the successor in accordance with the act of settlement of 1701 of Queen Anne, his kinswoman. He had previously visited England in the reign of Charles II.—London Modern Society.

Lincoln.

Sir Wemyss Reid wrote of Abraham Lincoln: "One must not blame Englishmen too severely for their lack of appreciation of Lincoln. It is doubtful if even now he is appreciated at his true worth by Americans themselves. Some years ago I had the pleasure of taking in to dinner a charming lady who was Lincoln's direct descendant. I said to her: 'You can hardly understand how pleased I am to have met you. There is scarcely any man whose name is familiar to me whom I honor as I honor the memory of your grandfather.' The young lady opened her eyes in innocent amazement and confessed subsequently that she had been very much surprised at my little speech. 'At home they never say anything about grandpapa.'"

He Never Told a Lie.

"Father," said Tommy, looking into his eyes, "I have not touched one."

"Then how is it your mother found five apple cores in your bedroom, and there is only one left on the plate?"
