## A REMARKABLE HAPPENING.

### Death of Young Man in Salisbury Closes a Chapter of Interesting Incidents.

In 1901 Will Gheen and Jim Earnhardt, two young white men, were tried in Rowan court for the murder of a negro, Lee Miller. They had become involved in a dispute with the negro and Gheen struck Miller on the head with a brick. From injuries thus sustained the negro died. The late Solicitor Wiley Rush was the prosecutor in the case and it is said that his speech on this occasion was the greatest one of his life and it was his last. The case was tried in November 1901. Mr. Rush went home from the court and died of pneumonia. It is stated that there was every evidence of self defense and that the boys were acquitted, Rush's speech being more of an opothesis to the law than effort to convict. On Friday last one of the defendants, young Earnhardt, died of pneumonia, after a week's illness, and on the next day, last Saturday, the other defendant, Gheen, was the victim of a tragic death. He was employed by the Southern as brakeman and while attending to his duties as such, fell under a moving train of cars in the yards, both legs were cut off near the body and he died in thirty minutes the last of three who figured in the sensational case mentioned above. —Lexington Dispatch.

### SMALL FIRE.

#### At Greenville Lumber & Veneer Co's. Plant.

About 11 o'clock this morning the whistle of the Greenville Lumber & Veneer Co., situated a mile South of town, blew a distress signal. It was caused by fire breaking out in the company's stable near the factory. The hands around the factory went to work with buckets and put the fire out before more than \$50 damage was done to the building.

General manager H. McLellan's drive horse was in the stable and was injured by suffocation. The animal was so frightened and overcome by the smoke that it had to be dragged out of the stable.

Several people from town went down to the factory to render assistance, but the fire was about out when they got there.

The fire is supposed to have started from a cigarette which the hostler went in the stable smoking.

### What the Morocco Conference is About.

The following are the landmarks in the Moroccan question, which will be threshed out at Algenciras:

First—The Anglo-French agreement of April 8, 1904, giving France paramount authority in Morocco.

Second—The appearance of Emperor William at Tangier and his sensational speech declaring that no outside influence would be permitted to interfere with the sovereign independence of Morocco.

Third—The agreement between France and Germany on July 8, 1905, concerning their attitude toward Morocco.

Fourth—The final accord between Germany and France on September 28, 1905, whereby it was agreed to submit special questions relating to Morocco to an international conference. —Baltimore News.

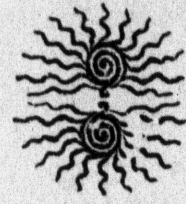

The spurt in cotton Thursday gives the farmers who are holding better hope that they will get their price.

It is time for Charlotte and Greensboro to come forward with something else. Raleigh is ahead of them so far.

If much building is to be done in Greenville this year a brick making plant ought to come along and get ready to supply the demand.

The ill-fated schooner that started off with thirteen people for a pleasure trip, gives the superstitious more cause to dread the unlucky number.

Recent reports in the papers throughout the country indicate that this is the worst time of year on fire insurance companies. The record of fires is large.

A skating rink mania has taken hold of Wilmington and it bids fair to become an exterminator of the colored population. Recently one has been killed and several crippled.

This is the year when many people will be wasting much time running around trying to get an office. The same energy expended in a business pursuit would be more profitable.

### NOT ALWAYS APPLICABLE

Marshall Field, the millionaire merchant prince who died a few days ago, is reported to have had certain inflexible rules for conducting his business. Two of these were "never borrow money" and "never give a note or mortgage." As he already had millions to do business on these rules were all right for him, but fully half of the business of the country would stop unless money was sometimes borrowed to tide over emergencies. True, debt is a hard master, unless wisely used, but there are thousands of men now owning a home or a farm, who could never have owned them without giving a note or mortgage at the time of making the purchase. Notes and mortgages have ruined many people, but they have been the making of many more. Mr. Fields' rules were good for a man already rich, but it will not apply in all cases.

### Thirteen Bales on Six Acres--How it Was Done.

It appears that Mr. N. Shaw, of Lumber Bridge, who made thirteen bales of cotton on six acres, is in the lean, as no other equal yield has been reported. It is desirable to know how he did it. Questions are being asked about it. Three facts are recalled. He put 200 pounds of kainit, 400 pounds acid phosphate, 400 pounds Quick Step and 200 bushels cotton seed broadcast on each acre, all of which cost him fifteen dollars. The land was no pot lot which had been highly fertilized a number of successive years. It was planted and cultivated skillfully. The land was no better than very much of the land through the section in which it lies. Very much of the causation for the large yield is due to the hoeing and plowing. In a word, the cultivation. It calls for as much brains and good judgment to be a successful farmer as to be the governor of the State. There is more in the man than in the land. The same land and fertilizers and seasons will furnish the same yield if men of the same skill are the farmers, but if of two one is more skilful the more skilful will get the larger yield every time—Lumber Bridge (Robeson County) Correspondence Lumberton Robesonian.

### Biggest Farm in the World.

In a moment of vinous enthusiasm Daniel Webster put his hand in his pocket, asked how much the national debt was and offered to pay it himself. A Mexican farmer, Don Luis Terrazas, a great friend of President Diaz, once offered to assume the Mexican national debt; and it wouldn't have kept him awake nights if his offer had been accepted. Don Luis has what you might call a tidy little farm at Chibabau, about 8,000,000 acres. Takes the Mexican Central trains more than half a day to cross it. Whew! Don Luis is thought to own more than a million cattle, but a bagtail of a hundred thousand or so more or less never bothers him. His stables consist of some 100,000 horses; his sheepfold of 70,000 sheep. From 200,000 to 300,000 calves are branded with his brands every spring. More than a thousand cowboys and so on keep his cows on a thousand hills. By the way, his farm includes a few mountains for diversification. At his slaughter and packing houses, near Chibabau city, 25,000 cattle, as many sheep, and hogs innumerable, are killed; and away they go in his own refrigerator cars. Some 40,000 persons dwell on his estate and are ruled by the Arabian Nights farmer, who lives in a \$2,000,000 (silver) castle, and is a swell and nabob such as these United States knows not.—Everybody's.

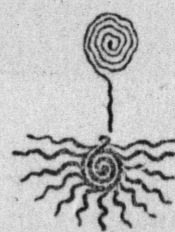

## STORY OF AN OCTOPUS.

Adventure With One of the Terrifying Marine Monsters.

Here is a true story of an octopus: Two fishermen were plying their vocation off Great Belle Island, Conception bay, off the Newfoundland coast. Suddenly they discovered at a short distance from them a dark, shapeless mass floating on the surface of the water. Concluding that it was probably part of the cargo of some wrecked vessel, they approached it, anticipating a valuable prize, and one of them struck the object with his boathook. Upon receiving the shock the dark heap became suddenly animated, and, spreading out, disclosed a head with a pair of large, prominent, staring eyes, which seemed to gleam with intense ferocity, the creature at the same time exposing to view and opening its parrotlike beak with an apparently hostile and malignant purpose. The men were petrified with terror and for a moment so fascinated by the horrible sight that they were powerless to make a move to defend themselves.

Before they had time to recover their presence of mind the monster, now but a few feet from the boat, suddenly shot out from around its head several long, fleshy arms, grappling with them for the boat and seeking to envelop it in their folds. Only the two longest of these arms reached the craft and owing to their length went completely over and beyond it. Seizing his hatchet, with a desperate effort one of the men succeeded in severing these limbs with a single well delivered blow, and the creature, finding itself worsted, immediately disappeared beneath the waters, leaving in the boat its amputated members as a trophy of the encounter.

One of the arms was unfortunately destroyed before its value was known, but the other when brought to St. John's and examined by the Rev. M. Harvey was found to measure no less than nineteen feet. The fisherman who acted as surgeon declares there must have been at least six feet more left attached to the monster's body. The story is preserved in the proceedings of the British Zoological society.

The widow hesitated; then she turned a riotous scarlet; then she said: "Gracious goodness! I can't remember whether it was Jan. 26 or 27. I'll go home and find out."

**SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST.**

**How Dr. Wallace Came to Formulate His Theory.**

Dr. Alfred Russel Wallace in his autobiography tells how during his long sojourn in Borneo and the Malay peninsula he formulated independently of Darwin his theory of evolution: "I was suffering from a sharp attack of intermittent fever and every day during the cold and hot fits had to lie down for several hours, during which time I had nothing to do but to think over any subjects then particularly interesting me. One day something brought to my recollection Malthus' 'Principles of Population,' which I had read about twelve years before. I thought of his clear exposition of 'the positive checks to increase'—disease, accidents, war and famine—which keep down the population of savage races to so much lower an average than that of more civilized peoples.

"It then occurred to me that these causes or their equivalents are continually acting in the case of animals also, and, as animals usually breed much more rapidly than does mankind, the destruction every year from these causes must be enormous, as otherwise the world would long ago have been densely crowded with those that breed most quickly. Vaguely thinking over the enormous and constant destruction which this implied, it occurred to me to ask the question, Why do some die and some live?"

"And the answer was clearly that on the whole the best fitted live. Then it suddenly flashed upon me that the self acting process would necessarily improve the race, because in every generation the inferior would inevitably be killed off and the superior would remain—that is, the fittest would survive."
