THE MURDER TRIAL.

Testimony in the Case Against

Jerry Cobb and Sylvester Barrette.

At the afternoon session of the court J. F. Case continued his testimony:

It was very short time after defendants passed me before gun fired, it was between 9 and 10 o'clock. I saw the body of Lovitt soon after, was lying on back in road; his clothes were scorched around wound. Dick Carr and Lovitt's father were in buggy. I heard persons running through woods after gun fired, sounded like two people running. I heard deceased cry "Oh, Lord" three times after gun fired. I did not see the buggy before gun fired. Watt Parker was standing with me, he had a light by which I recognized defendants. I also knew their voices. Tragedy occurred near Parker's house. I was not present when Barrett was arrested.

Cross Examination—I went to Farmville about one o'clock Saturday and left about sunset. The trouble with negroes in road was before dark. Several negroes were in the road, they were walking. Bill Smith and two colored men were on wagon with me. I had drunk some but was not drunk. I went back to Farmville after going home and went to help find the negroes. I was in 25 yards of shooting and heard three shots fired. This was about 2 miles from my home, was in front of Parker's house when the shot fired. When the negroes passed I halted them; made no threats and heard no threats. Parke brought lantern out of his house. Could not tell whether shots were from gun or pistol. I was in 3 feet of defendants when they passed.

DR. C. C. JOYNER.

I knew Walter Lovitt and was present when he was killed. He was constable and I went to show him where Jerry Cobb lived. We stopped at places on the way to search houses for him, and not finding parties wanted went on the Centre Bluff road. A short distance from Watt Parker's house we saw two men walking in road. Lovitt told them halt that he had warrant for them. Lovitt got off buggy and gun fired almost immediately. My horse jumped off, but I stopped him and went back; heard men running through woods. I saw the light near Parkers house. The men were on side of road next to Parker's house. I did not recognize the parties who did the shooting. We searched Sylvester Barrette's house, the shooting took place about 300 yards from Barrette's. Mr. Carr fired a shot at the parties running. Lovitt lived only a few minutes after shot. He was lying in wheel track. My buggy was in front, not over 12 feet from men in road. Lovitt stepped off his buggy in 5 feet of them and gun fired almost immediately.

Cross examination—There were warrants for five or six when Lovitt left Farmville. I knew where all lived and went to show the way. One of the men we met in the road did the shooting. I did not see the gun. When I saw Case after shooting I thought he was drink

ing. I did not see the smoke from gun but know one of the two men fired it.

R. R. CARR.

I knew Walter Lovitt. A little after 9 o'clock he came and asked me to go with him to arrest some men. Went and searched some houses, Barrette's house among them, only his wife and children were there, looked for gun found none. We went on down road. When near Watt Parker's I heard Lovitt, who was in buggy ahead of me tell some men in road to halt, and he stepped off of buggy. I saw two men near him in road, one of them shot him. The men run off in woods and I fired a shot at them. They were not over 3 or 4 feet from Lovitt when the gun fired, I was looking at them. Was not present when Barrett was arrested.

Cross examination—I do not know how many Lovitt had warrants for, he called Jerry Cobb's name. We stopped one crowd on road to see if Cobb was among them. Later we met the two men where the shooting was done. Case came from toward Parker's house a minute or so after the shooting.

HENRY LOVITT.

Walter Lovitt was my son. He told me he had warrants for Barrette and Cobb and asked me to go with him to serve them. Several of us went on. Met one crowd in road where some arrests were made. We went to Barrette's house, then started on towards Cobb's house. Met two men in road near Parker's. Walter halted them and stepped off buggy. I did not recognize the men. Gun fired almost as soon as Walter got off, I went to him as the men were running off, I tried to shoot one of them but pistol I had would not fire. The front man shot. One of them had on light coat and the other dark coat.

Cross examination—My son and myself were in Dr. Joyner's buggy. There was a gun in this buggy.

WATT PARKER.

I know the defendants. About one minute before the shooting I was standing in front of my house, within 5 feet of road, talking to Case. Two men came along. I had lantern and recognized them as Jerry Cobb and Sylvester Barrette. It was 25 or 30 yards from where shooting took place. No one else passed in the meantime. One of the men had light suit and the other dark suit. I got to where shooting occurred within a minute after gun fired.

Cross examination—It was 25 or 30 yards from my gate to where shooting occurred. I don't know if any one was in woods or field. No one else went by but these two defendants. Case and Fulford came up to my gate together. Case told the men to stop but they did not stop. I did not see them have a gun.

W. L. FULFORD.

I went to Farmville Saturday evening. Lovitt asked me to go out with them to serve warrants. I went out with Case. We went to Jerry Cobb's house and found no one there. We left there and going along road saw a light at Parkers and stopped there. Parker came out with lantern and was talking to us. Barrette and Cobb

came along. Case told them to stop as there was a warrant for them. They did not stop. A minute later the gun fired. We went there and found Lovitt lying on ground. Am certain as to the identity of the men who passed. They were on side of road next to Parker's. I saw Barrette again about one o'clock that night when he was arrested.

Cross examination—I saw many other colored people that evening; do not know how any of them were dressed. It was about a minute after they passed Parker's when the shooting occurred. We were at Parker's two or three minutes. I did not see them have a gun. I did not see a gun in Dr. Joyner's buggy. I saw a gun some of the crowd carried to Parker's after the shooting. I do not know if Case was drinking. No one else passed where we were in front of Parker's between the time the defendants passed and the shooting.

DR. C. C. JOYNER.

Recalled—I do not know if gun was in my buggy. Lovitt had my gun but said he did not need it and did not load it. Case told us when he came up to where shooting occurred that Barrette and Cobb had just passed in that direction.

ROBERT BELCHER.

My brother carried Walter Lovitt's buggy back to Farmville before shooting occurred. There was a gun in it which he said was Dr. Joyner's.

JASON JOYNER.

I know Sylvester Barrette. He came to my house between 12 and 1 o'clock Saturday night, knocked at my door, told me he wanted to leave a gun there, that some parties had been after him, he had shot but did not know what he had done. I took the gun and went back to bed. Later I was awakened by hearing dogs and some one was taken out of his fathers house.

Cross examined—Barrette worked on my place, have known him since he was a boy. Cobb married Barrette's sister.

R. HYMAN.

I was present when Sylvester Barrette was arrested. Had on same clothes then as now. He made statement to me of his whereabouts that night. No inducement was offered or threats made. He said he and his brother started to a ball but got there and found no ball so went back home.

W. H. SMITH.

I went before Justice for warrant for Cobb, Barrette and others. (Here this evidence is objected to and ruled out, also evidence of fight in afternoon.)

Does not know defendants, went back to Farmville that night. Don't know what time Lovitt left to serve warrant. Did not see defendants that night. Have never seen the defendants. Took several drinks at Baker's bar.

Court here took recess to resume session at 9 o'clock Friday.

At Friday morning session of the court the State resumed examination of witnesses.

TIM HUNTER.

I know defendants Cobb and Barrette, saw them evening before killing at cross roads near Farmville, this about half mile from Barrette's home. I left Barrette at his home about dark, left Jerry at Will Barrette's, Cobb had on cap.

I saw Cobb again about 8 o'clock at Peyton Barrette's house and told me he was going to stay out of the way until Monday morning. I next saw him Sunday morning in the branch near my house. He called me to come out to him. I asked him what he had been doing, that a man was killed up the road last night. Cobb said he did not know anything about it. Robert Foreman came up and Cobb asked Foreman to go see if anybody was killed. Cobb then asked me to get him something to eat. I told him my wife said her father told her a man had been killed and that he and Sylvester Barrette were accused of it. When I got Cobb some breakfast I told him you fellows are accused of that killing and asked him about it. He said he and Sylvester did kill a man, that Sylvester shot him.

[Counsel for Barrette objected to this testimony because Barrette was not present when Cobb made this statement to witness. The court ruled the testimony out so far as it applied to Barrette.]

Cross examined—I was home at time killing said to have taken place. I live two miles from there. I have talked about this to police and solicitor. I was brought here as witness and placed in guard house. Mr. Smith went in guard house to see me. I spent Sunday after shooting at home. Don't know when preliminary trial was held; was not a witness then.

[Here counsel for Barrette moved for severance in the trial, the evidence of Hunter being ruled out as to Barrette, yet the evidence was made in hearing of the jury and was prejudicial to Barrette. This motion was denied.]

W. C. JOYNER.

I remember the day of homicide. I am a justice of the peace (a warrant was shown him) I issued that warrant, it was sworn out by W. H. Smith and I gave it to Constable Walter Lovitt, just before 9 o'clock Saturday night. The constable asked his father, Henry Lovitt, Dr. Joyner and R. R. Carr to go with him to serve the warrant.

Cross examination—I issued warrant Saturday night, it came back to me Sunday morning at preliminary hearing, in meantime Lovitt had been killed. I held preliminary trial of Sylvester Barrette. Tim Hunter was not a witness and was not at the trial.

ROBERT BELCHER.

I got the warrant (shown) in my possession Sunday morning from T. H. Smith. The paper was wet. (Witness was given cross examination as to names in the warrant and the warrant was offered as evidence.)

Here the State closed its testimony. Neither of the defendants, Cobb or Barrette, offered any testimony.

At 11 o'clock the attorneys began their arguments before the jury.

RECEIVING A BURGLAR.
 What to Do When Mr. Thief Gets Into Your House.
 "In these days," said a retired policeman, who lives in Washington Heights, where there have been several small burglaries lately, "it is no harm for men who live in detached houses in neighborhoods where the patrolmen have long beats to know one or two simple rules about protecting themselves from burglars. It is sheer foolishness and sometimes suicide to rush from your bed, light the gas and run out on the landing, pistol in hand. The burglar will find you a good deal quicker than you will find him. He is wide awake, while you are only half awake, and he has ascertained where you are likely to appear if aroused.
 "Stay in your room if the burglar is elsewhere in the house and make as much noise as you can. The burglar will know that you are awake and get out of the house as quickly as he can. Burglars are easily frightened off. They don't want a scrap if they can help it. In the majority of instances they will get out of the place as fast as they can without taking their plunder with them.
 "If the burglar is prowling in your room and awakens you, do not jump out of bed. Lie perfectly still and try to get in your mind some of the man's physical characteristics. Get his height, which it is easy to do from some article of furniture in the room—if, for instance, his head comes so far above the bureau. He will give you ample opportunity for this between the flashes of his dark lantern. Such information is usually very useful to policemen assigned to burglary work.
 "When your burglar goes away with his plunder he usually departs through the rear door or window. Watch which way he goes and follow him in as quick time as you can dress. On the road you may find a neighbor out late willing to go with you, or it is possible you might meet the policeman on beat. The rest is easy.
 "The main point is when you find a burglar in the house keep quiet if he is in the room and make as much noise as you can if he is not in the room. Above all things, do not light the gas and open your bedroom door with the intent of attacking him. You are at his mercy then."—New York Press.

SMALL FIRE AT A. T. FACTORY

Slight Damage to Drying Machine And Tobacco.


