METHODIST SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Increase in Interest and Attendance.

WILL HAVE BOX PARTY AND MUSICAL ENTERTAINMENT.

Although Sunday was one of those gloomy, rainy days, the large crowd present at the Methodist Sunday school and the interest manifested from the time Superintendent Prichard called for order until the close, showed the school to be in a most excellent condition. Each officer and teacher was promptly in place, and the work of the school moved with celerity and system. A very large number of members of the infant class answered roll call and were entitled to the "Stormy day," badge while each of the higher classes seemed to be competing for honors of attendance and efficiency.

After the preliminary services and recitations, Superintendent Prichard announced that he had obligated the school to seat and furnish the Sunday school room of the handsome new Methodist church now in course of construction in Greenville. Mr. Prichard announced that on account of the increase in attendance it would be necessary for the new room to be furnished without delay, so as to accommodate the large membership of the school, and this will cost about \$500. The officers, teachers and scholars accepted this arrangement joyfully, and plans were laid before them for raising this amount. Every teacher has agreed to take their own class separately and work with them, and the whole school is to combine and have a musical entertainment and box party at an early date, the time and place to be announced later.

The members of this large and flourishing school are to be congratulated on the most excellent progress that has been made during the past few months, for they are doing a work that is resulting, and will result in much good to our town and community.

Buried by the Red Men.

Mr. Joe Smith, of Contentnea township, who about two weeks ago was gored by a vicious bull, as told at the time by our Winterville correspondent, died Friday night from his injuries. The funeral was held Sunday near Bethany church, about four miles from Winterville.

Mr. Smith was a member of the Winterville Tribe of Red Men and was buried with the honors of the order. About twenty-five members of Withlacooche Tribe of Greenville attended and took part in the ceremony that was beautiful and impressive. During the exercises a perfectly white pigeon was released from the grave which was emblematic of purity, its flight typical of the spirit's return to the Great Spirit.

The Great Sachem F. M. Hodges was present to lead the ceremonies for the Red Men, and the religious service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Corbett of the Free Will Baptist church.

CLOSE OF COURT.

It Was a Busy Term.

The January term of Pitt Superior court closed Saturday afternoon, occupying the full two weeks allotted to the term, and Judge Long left for Jones county to hold court there. This court transacted a large amount of business and disposed of many cases. More than \$2,300 was collected in fines and costs, about half this sum being fines and going to the school fund. The amount collected for jury tax was about \$250.

BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Remarkable Progress Being Made

The spirit of progress has taken hold of the Baptist Sunday school under the direction of Superintendent W. H. Regsdale, and recently such development has taken place that reorganization of old classes and forming new classes became necessary. The school now has eleven classes and all are doing fine work. As disagreeable Sunday as was the last one showed an attendance record of 134 with one hundred per cent present in several of the classes.

To encourage regular attendance of the scholars a handsome banner has been purchased, and the class making the best record in a month holds the banner the succeeding month. Another handsome banner goes to the class making the best percent of collections during the month.

GENERAL NEWS.

Happenings of Interest Over the Country.

The secretary of the Navy has directed the dismissal of Midshipman Chester A. J. Bloebaum, of Missouri, in execution of the sentence imposed by court martial at Annapolis on conviction of hazing.

At Newport News, Va., fire destroyed the First Baptist church in Twenty-ninth street. The building was only recently paid for and was constructed of brown granite at a cost of \$55,000. There is \$25,000 insurance.

Harry St. George Tucker, president of the Jamestown exposition, had a talk with President Roosevelt about the results of his visit to foreign countries in the interest of the exposition. Mr. Tucker met with great success on his trip. The president assured him of his sympathy in the efforts he is making to insure the success of the exposition.

To Merge 3 R. R. Companies.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 27.—Application was today made to the state corporation commission for permission to merge the Virginia & Carolina Coast Railroad company, the Suffolk & Carolina railroad company and the Carolina Coast railroad company, under the head of the Carolina Coast Railroad company, with the principal offices in Norfolk. The president of the merged company is J. T. Odell, of New York, who is prominently connected with the steel trust and immense lumber interests in the Eastern States, and the capital stock, it is said, is to be \$7,500,000.

Back of the merger, it is also said, are plans for the opening up of large iron deposits in North Carolina and the construction of a steel-making plant at Norfolk.

Splitting Paper.

Wet both sides of the paper with a weak solution of glue and stick a piece of calico on each side, taking care to keep the paper flat, so as to leave a double margin all around.

When the glue, which should be of good quality, is quite dry, place it all on a flat surface, and fix by tacks or otherwise the under piece of calico. Now turn back the upper piece and pull gently until it comes away, bringing with it one-half of the paper, which will split in two. The paper and calico can be separated by soaking in lukewarm water.

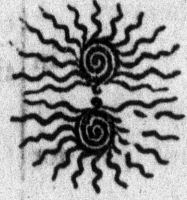

WORDS OF WISDOM.

During the progress of the court during the past two weeks Judge B. F. Long said many things that left an impression upon his hearers. A trial for illegal selling of whiskey in prohibited territory came up for judgment and the usual plea for leniency had been made by counsel for the defense. Judge Long remarked that this was a business that should be broken up. Any stranger could come to Pitt county and see that whiskey being sold, legally or illegally, at little villages over the county was making large business for the criminal court dockets. If he had the privilege of a vote in the matter it would be cast against the sale of liquor anywhere that ample police protection could not be had. The little towns and cross roads villages have no protection. They may have a constable or police officer at these places, but they are not going to do anything against the man who sells whiskey, being under their influence with eyes and mouths closed with a liberal supply of free whiskey. These officers will never stop whiskey selling.

At another time a man of good raising and fine intellect plead guilty to the charge of being a nuisance through common drunkenness. Judge Long said this was one of the cases that positively made him sick and he did not know what to do with such a man. He had shown that there were times when he could control himself, even for a long period, and again his appetite for drink made a hog and a nuisance of him. The man professed to love his little five-year-old boy, who was motherless, better than anything in the world. The judge said the acts of the man did not support this declaration—the power of love had not taken hold of his heart sufficiently to make him love that little boy enough not to disgrace him. He ought to be an honor to his boy and set him a good example, but instead of that he was disgracing the child every day he lived in debauchery.

Oh, the roads, the beautiful roads; only fit for ducks and toads.

Down here we got rain and slush out of the bad weather, while up the State they had snow, sleet and almost a blizzard.

VEST POCKET WONDER.

Marvels of the Watch—Distance Traveled by Wheels Each Year.

How often is it that things we see and handle many times in a day are seldom thought of! How few of those who possess a watch have ever thought of what is expected of it and the work it has to do!

This little machine is expected to work day and night without stopping (as our pulse has to work from birth till death). We expect it to show us the right time in winter and summer and in whatever position it is placed.

Now, if we open an ordinary gentleman's Geneva horizontal watch we can see the balance about five-eighths of an inch in diameter, which gives a three-quarters' turn at every tick of the watch, so that the little pin seen in the balance travels at every tick of the watch about one and a half inches, and as a watch of that description has to make 18,000 vibrations in an hour the little pin has to make a journey of about ten miles every twenty-four hours.

Now, well made watches are generally expected to go for two years, so the little pin in the balance would have made the long journey of 7,300 (English) miles.

The balance in a lever watch makes generally one and a half turns at every tick, and therefore travels double the distance—viz, 14,600 miles. To be able to accomplish this all the materials must be of the best and hardest. The oil also must be of the best and so fine and fluid that one drop will suffice to oil 200 pivots, or bearings, and keep good in the watch for at least two years.

Equally astonishing are the means by which a watch is regulated. This is done by lengthening or shortening the fine spiral spring, generally known as the hairspring.

If a watch should be half a minute slow a day the hairspring is a fourteen thousandth part of a second too long. Should a watch be only a minute a week slow it would then be the ninety-eight thousandth part of a second too long.

All that is expected of the user of a watch is that it is regularly wound up and be not too carelessly treated. Everything else has to be left to the mechanism of the watch and to the clever skill of the watchmaker.—Pearson's Weekly.
