ORGANIZE TOBACCO GROWERS.

Col. John S. Cunningham in Favor of Forming an Organization.

Col. John S. Cunningham, one of the largest producers of tobacco in North Carolina, favors the organization of the tobacco growers and is of the opinion that the tobacco growers will soon become organized on a practical basis. He says that tobacco farmers, like young widows, are "beginning to take notice."

The wonderful success of the Southern Cotton Association has been an object lesson of extreme value to the tobacco planters, and all over the South these farmers are forming tobacco growers' associations.

The necessity for co-operation among the growers, the advisability of a reduction of the tobacco acreage, better methods for working, and co-operative warehouses are among the suggested objects of the proposed organization.

During the past year there has been much talk of organizing the Virginia and North Carolina tobacco growers into a strong association.—News and Observer.

Factory and Dwellings Burn.

Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 2.—Fire starting from an undetermined cause on the sixth floor of the knit goods factory of N. J. Rich & Company, Payne avenue and Seventeenth street, late this evening, destroyed that building with an estimated loss of \$75,000, sent at least 200 girl employes in a semi panic from the several lower floors, and before the fire was gotten under control destroyed twenty-one dwellings adjoining the Rich factory on Payne avenue and on both sides of Seventeenth street.

Barnwell, S. C., Feb. 2.—W. J. Myrick, Wade Sanders, C. W. Hogg and Tom Huggins, all prominent farmers of this county; postmaster Joseph Helford, of Ulmer, and Constables W. J. The young negro was accused of having killed Haynes Craddock, a prominent farmer of this section, at the command of his father.

For the month of January 679,684 pounds at an average price of \$7.71. In the same month last year there were sold 631,346 pounds at an average price of \$7.81.

For this season from August 1st to February 1st the total sales have reached 10,000,140 pounds.

Tall and Low Plants.

Tall growing plants are not suitable for beds near the paths, especially when those beds are close to the house. The tall growers should be given a place somewhat in the background, where they can be seen at a little distance and will not obstruct the view. Low growing plants close to the path or under the windows can be looked down upon with most satisfactory results. For such beds there are few flowers superior to the verbena, and by pegging the branches down during the earlier stage of the plant's growth the entire surface of the ground can soon be covered. The scarlet varieties are as brilliant as the geranium. If the seed pods are cut off as soon as seen, this plant will continue to bloom during the entire season.

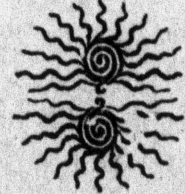

PLAN TO SECURE BUILDINGS.

Ex-Congressman T. G. Skinner, of Hertford, tells us of a plan he has originated for securing buildings in towns that looks like it should prove very successful. He is now at work raising a company or association to erect a large building for the Daughters of the Confederacy in his home town.

The plan is this: The subscribers to the stock agree to take any number of shares desired at \$10 each, payable one-fifth when the association is incorporated, one-fifth when the material for the building is placed on the site provided for it, and one-fifth on the first of each month thereafter until all is paid. Upon payment in full of the stock subscribed for, certificates of stock shall be issued, these being the exact size of a greenback bill. These certificates of stock, secured by the building, can be used as local currency, by which means the subscribers are out nothing for the erection of the building. By this means a handsome building is secured, and stock certificates equal to the value of the building placed in circulation.

Mr. Skinner says if the Daughters of the Confydray in Greenville would like to secure a building by this plan he will be glad to meet with them and talk the matter over.

While sitting around the stove these cold days is a good time to talk building and loan association.

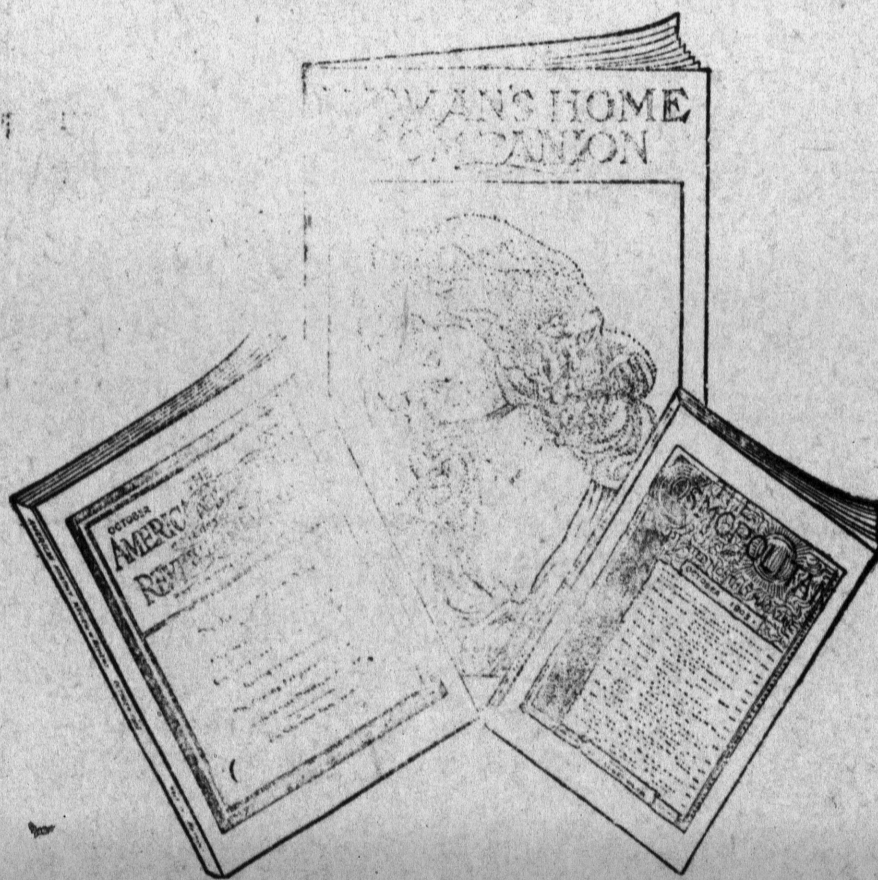

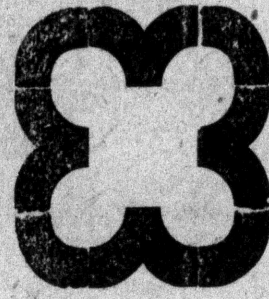
