PRIZES AWARDED.

Many Received Gold and Silver Badges.

At the Methodist Sunday School Sunday prizes were awarded for attendance, all members having attended every Sunday during 1905 received a gold badge or a Bible, and those who attended every Sunday but one received a silver badge. These prizes were offered the first of the year by Superintendent Prichard in the name of the school, and were presented Sunday by Gov. T. J. Jarvis with very appropriate and befitting remarks.

Prichard, who is ever awake to the interest and development of the school, assisted by a corps of officers and teachers who are men and women of rare ability and integrity, is doing a work that is already being felt in our town and community, and that promises to yield more abundantly as the days go by.

POOR POTATO MARKET.

The Outlook Anything But Encouraging for the Planter.

According to reports published in a Norfolk paper the prospect for a large shipment of early potatoes to Northern markets from Eastern North Carolina are now encouraging. The planters claim that their experience for the last two years has shown them that there is not enough money to go into any extensive shipping.

It is said by some dealers who are in a position to know that the crop will be less than 50 per cent that of former years. Railroads and steamboat lines which have derived a large source of revenue for hauling this product will be affected by this decision of the farmers as are the farmers themselves, and so far as can be seen now there are scarcely any sign of better prices this year. It is possible that the curtailment planned by the planters and the consequent lightening of freight receipts will have its effect in getting a better market for potatoes.—New Bern Journal.

OVER THE STATE.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Washington is moving to establish a factory to can fruits and vegetables.

Friday night a Chinaman in Rocky Mount was murdered by unknown parties.

Henry Clark Bridgers, one of the most progressive and successful young men of the State, and the youngest railroad president in America, is in the city. He advises us that he is making his arrangements and plans to build an extension of 15 miles to the East Carolina Railway, that is 15 miles from its present terminus, Farmville, in Pitt county, to Hookerton, in Greene county, and at last Greene county is to have a railroad. It is one of the few counties in the State that hasn't a railroad within its borders, and some sections of it are the best and most fertile lands in the State. The new extension will be a model road in all respects, it is to be laid with new 65 pound steel rails and will probably be completed this year.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Governor Glenn issues a special personal letter to each sheriff in the State urging that they do everything in their power to enforce rigidly and execute promptly, all laws, especially those arising under the Watts and Ward acts regulating or prohibiting the sale of liquor, as to enforcement of which he says numerous complaints are coming into his office. He also requests all newspapers and citizens who know of any officers refusing or neglecting to discharge their duty to call the governor's attention to it and he will at once put the matter in the hands of the solicitor of the district for investigation and see that the officer is punished.

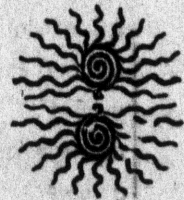

TAX DODGERS AND HIGH TAXES.

Now and then some State comes forward with a movement to bring the tax dodger to time—that is compel all persons to give in their property for taxation. The idea is to make the wealthy class who give false lists of their possessions uncover what they have so that the greater part of their property will not escape taxation. While not so intended by the law, taxes as at present levied and collected bear very unequally upon the people—those least able paying a larger proportion according to ability than those more able. We do not believe this will be remedied unless there is a change in the method of giving in taxes. The present method is all right for the honest man, but not for others. As long as it is left to people to list their taxes, there are those who are going to make false lists of what they possess and swear falsely as to values.

A board of appraisers to go from house to house and place values on personal property as well as real estate would be an improvement. And as to solvent credits, require a list of the name and amount of every note and mortgage, making it unlawful to collect any that are not listed, also making it a misdemeanor for a man to possess stocks or bonds or other evidences of wealth and fail to disclose the same for taxation. This will get more property on the tax lists.

But a suggestion on the other side: One thing, and the main thing, that leads to so much false giving in of taxes, is that the tax rate is too high. A high levy puts people to planning how they can keep as much of their property as possible from being taxed. A low being under a different method of levy would accomplish just as much in revenue raising as a high levy under the present method. If all property was put on the tax list at its actual value, the rate of levy need not be more than one fourth of what it is in North Carolina. There should be lower taxes, and then a method that will compel people to list all they possess at its value.

The Wilmington Star says the police records for January show a larger number of arrests in that city than for the same month in years. With fifty saloons there we do not see how it could be expected otherwise.

Instead of trying to catch the ground hog with blood hounds, the Charlotte Observer might look up his hole in advance and plug it up so he cannot come out next time.

AN ENDOWED NEWSPAPER

The Insurance Press discusses the remark of Mr George F. Seward that insurance papers will become absolutely independent "when the advertising columns cease to be necessary to their success," and says "how we would like to see and have a share in conducting endowed insurance journalism." While he was subsidizing everything else, including Town Topics, why didn't Hyde endow an insurance journal? Carnegie has endowed libraries and aged college professors, Rockefeller has endowed churches and colleges. Why should not some millionaire with big money endow newspapers?

Would it not be a good thing for the public, if at the national capital, for instance, a great newspaper was endowed so as to give it the best talent and make it independent of advertisements and subscription money? Up to date all the endowed newspapers have been printed by concerns that had an axe to grind. It would take much money to endow a newspaper, and it would be worse than wasted if there were any strings tied to the endowment.—Raleigh News and Observer.

We do not see why an endowed newspaper could not be made as helpful and of as much benefit to people as an endowed school or library. There are numbers of homes into which newspapers never go and papers in such homes would prove of untold benefit. If some provision could be made for supplying such people with good newspapers the good accomplished would be incalculable.

The Editor Has Duns Also.

An exchange says that a subscriber once received a dun through the postoffice, and it made him mad. He went to see the editor about it, and the editor showed him a few dunes of his own—one for paper, one for type, one for fuel and several others. "Now," said the editor, "I didn't get mad when these came, because I knew that all I had to do was to ask several reliable gentlemen like you to come and help me out, and then I could settle all of them." When the subscriber saw how it was he relented, paid up, and renewed for another year.

Sometime ago a prisoner on trial in Arkansas was sentenced to the penitentiary for ten years. He appealed, secured a new trial and now he has been sentenced to death. More good work of that kind would stop this everlasting abuse which comes from the habit of appealing.—Raleigh Times.
