## WINERVILLE NOTES

### Interesting Items from Our Hustling Neighbor.

WINTERVILLE, N. C. Feb. 7, 1906.

Last Friday night Feb. 2nd, Rev. B. W. Spilman carried a large crowd on a tour with him. We started at Winterville and stopped first in Savannah, Ga. There we saw many and beautiful buildings, and visited parks to the number of 24. They were situated in the middle of the streets, and the walks and streets encircling them made them very beautiful to us.

We next visited Jacksonville, Fla., and saw there lots of interesting scenes, but a flood had just been there ahead of us, and left some parts of the city covered in water to the depth of 8 feet. We visited the ostrich farm in Jacksonville, which was very interesting, especially seeing them being even to a buggy and carrying two men with perfect ease.

Our next visit was to St. Augustine, the city that we so much wished to visit. There we were greatly entertained for awhile looking over the Ponce De Leon hotel, but the rates being so high we did not stay in the hotel long for \$11.50 per day, was the average rate. We saw in St. Augustine 14 vestibule trains every 24 hours loaded with passengers coming from the northern cities to visit St. Augustine, and many other regular trains going to and from the city. Our stay there was delightful. A short distance from St. Augustine we visited an old fort that was built by the Spaniards for a place of protection. There we went within the walls of this fort which served as dungeons for those who needed punishment, and there some of them were left to rise on judgment day.

Next we went to Silver Springs, Fla., and just as you step off of the train there you walk out on the platform, and look down in this spring for 90 feet, the water is as clear as a diamond, you can see the white sand as it rises from bottom of the spring. It is so clear you can see how to read the date on a 10 cent piece in the water that is 80 feet deep, when boat riding out there you can see the fishes down in the water and tell what kind each are, away down at the bottom being about 90 feet you see an old cat fish moving around. Mr. Spilman showed the crowd every place of interest at Silver Springs, and then moved on to the Ladies Parlor in the same city. This was another beautiful scene, the water being 200 feet deep and clear as a diamond, and vapors forming beautiful rain bows, and many other interesting scenes.

Our next stop was at Kissimmee. A great orange market, with the trees loaded with oranges, each having from 2,000 to 5,000 oranges on it. He showed us the old method of grading oranges, and then showed the improved way, and made it plain to us why all oranges in the boxes we get here are the same size. In Kissimmee he carried us to the Alligator Mfg. establishment and showed us how the skins of alligators are made up in different articles.

Next we went to New Orleans,

and he showed us how the city was surrounded by water, and how the streets were all in a circle except Canal street, which is a straight street and all the streets branch off from Canal street. He carried us to the great levee there and explained it in full. He carried us up on what is called French Quarters where every one you see speaks French. There we saw the great French cathedral that had been built long ago. It was very interesting to us. He carried us to the cemetery and explained all that to us, which was of great interest.

Next we made a flying trip through Arizona, and noticed there their style of banking and other business interests.

We came next through California, and saw the beautiful flower gardens, and orange and lemon groves. We stayed a short while in San Francisco, and visited Chinatown in that city, but we were very glad to get out of that part of the city.

Our last visit was through Utah and Salt Lake City, and there we learned Mormonism in full.

We returned to Winterville all safe, free of charge, too.

## ACCIDENT ON THE DAM.

### Mr. Jesse Speight Thrown From Buggy.

On Tuesday evening Mr. Jesse Speight was returning to town from the north side of the river, and while on the dam just beyond the bridge met with an accident that for the time being looked very serious. His horse was trotting along at a lively gate when suddenly one shaft of the buggy came uncoupled from the axle. This threw Mr. Speight at the bottom of the embankment. As good luck would have it, he came out with only a sprained wrist and scratched face.

The accident was due entirely to the insecure fastening on the buggy. The horse was also hurt, but not seriously.

## SIN NOW, NOT YEARS AGO.

### Was an Octogenarian on the Making and Using of Liquor.

What is now a sin and a shame was not a sin sixty years ago. This at least is the opinion of a gentleman from one of the mountain counties who is in the city. His name is Jacob Weisman and he is hale and hearty at 81. It was interesting to talk with the old gentleman. He said, in part, that he had all his life lived in a section where they made liquor. "Every man," he said, "made a little brandy and whiskey for his own use sixty years ago. Some made it in large quantities and sold it, waggoning it for hundreds of miles, but the great majority never made it to be sold; they just stilled a little for their own use and if a neighbor wanted any he sent and got it like he would anything else. In those days very few men got drunk, though almost every man would take a drink. They used it like medicine. I know a few men yet living who take three drinks a day, but no more; they take it just before their meals, but the new generation can't be depended upon. For the past 30 or 40 years the practice has been growing worse and when you see a young man who drinks at all he is mighty apt to get too much. I don't think the Almighty ever intended that liquor should be abused as it is. I don't really think it was a sin to make it and use it as they did sixty years ago, but it is a sin and an evil now of large proportions, made so because the people have abused it and it is well that the country is waking up and weeding it out. The people are abusing other things as well as liquor. It was seldom in my earlier years that you saw a man who could not eat anything he wanted to, now you run across people by the hundreds and thousands who have diet themselves. This is because they have abused their stomachs and it would be a sin for them to eat certain things, for it is detrimental to their health. Away back before the war the good old Methodist circuit rider expected to be invited to take a toddy before supper and after a long ride he was seldom disappointed, but he don't expect any such thing now and if invited would consider it an insult. Yes, things have changed and they keep on changing. A great many men are getting better, but those who are not are a great deal worse." There is a good deal of truth in what Mr. Weisman says and a good deal of sense as well.—Greenboro Record.

## EXAMINATION FOR REVENUE CUTTER SERVICE.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5, 1906. EDITOR REFLECTOR:

An examination will be held under the Civil Service Commission, on February 26th to 28th inclusive, for the purpose of securing eligibles from which to fill vacancies in the position of cadet in the Revenue Cutter service. Applicants, when appointed, must be not less than 18 nor more than 25 years of age, physically sound, and mentally qualified. Examinations will be held in Eastern North Carolina at Raleigh and Wilmington. Applicants should apply to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. ## Mental Anguish by Railroads.

The first damages for mental anguish ever awarded in the state against a railroad have been given by a jury of Guilford county to a physician of Greensboro. The defendant company was the Southern Railroad and an appeal has been taken. The outcome will be watched with interest not only by the legal profession but by the rest of the public as well. The point involved is a decidedly interesting one and may mean new grounds upon which other suits will soon be instituted against railroads. In the case in question the physician was in Chattanooga when he received news that his wife was dying and that his child was desperately ill.

He obtained a special train from the Southern, paying about seven hundred dollars for it, but the train was so delayed on the way from Chattanooga to Greensboro that it arrived only about fifteen minutes ahead of the regular schedule. The physician sued to recover the amount he had paid for the train over the regular fare and for damages due to mental anguish he had suffered. The jury returned a verdict for both, allowing him \$500 in the latter instance. Wilmington Dispatch.

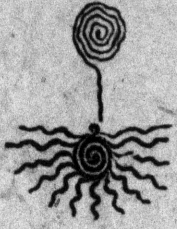

## How to Prepare Tea.

In the best restaurants of the Chinese quarter in San Francisco tea is never made in a teapot, but each cup is brewed separately. The cup itself is different. It is a small bowl covered with a strainer and a lid. A tiny bundle of long tea leaves is placed in the strainer and the boiling water is poured over it. This first infusion is invariably thrown away as being unfit to drink. This procedure has caused the leaves to swell, and when next the boiling water is poured on it filters through slowly and is allowed to steep for a few moments. When the strainer is removed the golden liquid that remains in the bowl ready for drinking, without milk or sugar, is as different from the tea ordinarily served in an English drawing room as champagne is from ginger pop.—"Californian" in London Chronicle.

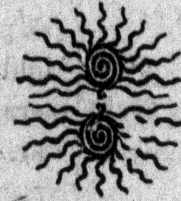

We cannot say what the railroad rate bill will amount to in the way of becoming a law, but it is giving the railroads somewhat of a scare.

Some of the papers tumbled to the Cincinnati man's letter and gave the desired advertisement of his proposed visit to organize local branches of the fraternal order he represents.

It will contain all the comforts of home from the dainty bedroom with its bed, as distinguished from berth to the kitchen and pantry, everything except a bath.

The car abounds in snug nooks and corners for the bride and bridegroom to spoon in, the color scheme being Miss Alice's favorite, red and green. The wood is Dutch oak and highly polished mahogany. First there is the observation room at the rear, looking upon a platform as large as the average porch and guarded by brass railings. A wide armed sofa faces the platform.

When the material needs of the hour send the bridal couple to the dining table, the bride will sit at the head of a table which will accommodate six. Another sofa is just behind where her husband's chair will be; at her right hand is a dainty little china closet of Dutch oak containing the silver which will do service during the honeymoon. In the left hand corner is a Dutch oak writing desk.

Adjoining the parlor and observation apartment are the two bedrooms, each containing a large brass bedstead. Both are heavily carpeted in green and hung in green, the wood being highly polished mahogany. A dwarf bureau with a mirror is in one corner. The pressure of a button in the wall produces a wash-stand of nickel at which hot and cold water may be had.

Between these two rooms are the tete-a-tete sections, done in green and mahogany. They are convertible into staterooms with an upper and lower berth each. In one of the other sections two seats face each other with a window between. The whole of the other section is occupied by a semi-circular divan.

The observation room and the parlor are equipped with tiny reading lamps, electric bulbs which fit into the wall when not in use.

Should the newly made wife desire to boss the cook she has but to walk into the forward corner beyond the parlor. Crowded into this space are a pantry and a cook's galley, each about three by ten feet. The white capped chef has just about room to turn around in amid his pots and pans.

### SUPPLY AND DEMAND MEANS FIFTEEN CENT COTTON.

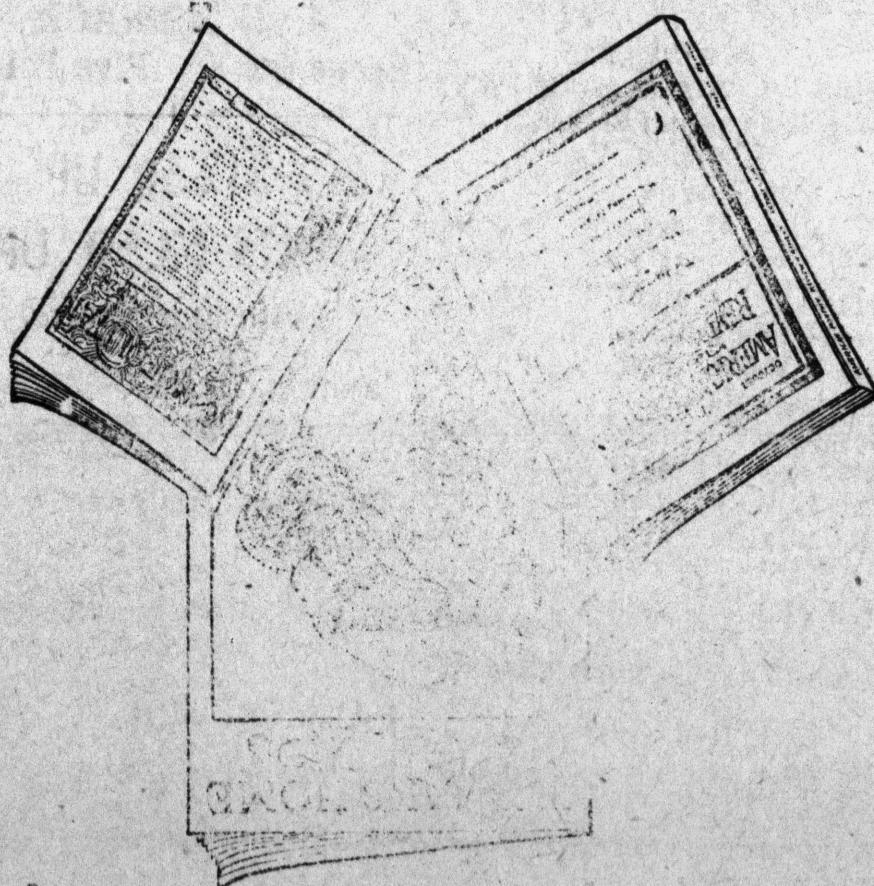

**FLOOD PREDICTIONS.**

About the Most Remarkable Were the Warnings of 1903.

One of the most remarkable cases of flood prediction on record was the warning of the disastrous floods of 1903. Twenty-eight days in advance of its coming the forecaster at Washington announced the exact time when the crest of a flood would reach New Orleans and said that the height of the flood would be twenty-one feet. Punctually to the hour the flood came, and its crest was twenty feet and seven inches, only five inches less than the height predicted. The immense ocean of water had started 1,000 miles away. It had dropped from the skies over a territory six times larger than the state of New York (over 300,000 square miles). But the weather man knew its rate of march as surely as the engineer, with his eye on the indicator, knows the speed of his locomotive. The people at Memphis were warned that the waters would rise to forty feet and overtop their levees, and they were given seven days' notice. The people of Cairo were told to prepare for a height of fifty feet. But as they were nearer the starting point of the flood they received only four days' notice. Such seasonable warning gave time to the people to prepare for defense. Thousands of men were set to work to raise and strengthen the levees and embankments, to clear the wharfs and river banks, to remove women and children, to drive the cattle to places of safety. When the flood arrived the people were ready for it. Comparatively few lives were lost, and the damage to property, while terrible, was millions and millions of dollars less than it would have been if the people had had no sentinel to cry out the march of the waters.

The devotion of the dike watchers of Holland has been the theme of children's stories for generations, but the sleepless watch of the hundreds of weather bureau observers when a flood threatens the land passes unnoticed and unpraised. The scientific precision of American science has made the work appear so simple that it has been robbed of its romance.—Century.

**Eloquence Interrupted.**

During a political campaign a well known lawyer in a western state was addressing an audience composed principally of farmers. Like a wise speaker—and a shrewd candidate—he tried to suit his speech to the occasion.

In a tone which he evidently considered both cordial and honest and with a winning smile he began:

"My friends, my sympathies have always been with the tillers of the soil. My father was a practical farmer, and so was my grandfather before him. I myself was born on a farm and was, so to speak, reared between two stalks of corn."

Here his eloquence was rudely interrupted by the trumpet tones of a farmer in the rear of the hall.

"Jimminy crickets," he shouted, "if you ain't a pumpkin!"

The house "came down," and the candidate, for the moment at least, was sadly embarrassed.

**No Need For His Gun.**

A certain Massachusetts doctor who lived among the Berkshire hills was very fond of hunting, and at the same time he was very slow in answering the calls of his patients. One morning he was aroused by a servant of one of his patients who lived at a distance, and told to go and see him right away. The doctor began to prepare, but was, as usual, very slow. After he went out to the buggy he turned to go back into the house. He thought he would be able to do some hunting on the way after he had seen the case. Reaching the door he turned and asked the nervous servant: "Do you think I had better take my gun along?" "Gun? No! The man will be dead enough at this rate before you get there."

**Fooled the Censor.**

During the South African war the censorship of soldiers' letters home was very strict. One soldier, who always sent an account of the doings of the regiment, which account was always blotted out by the censor, laid a plan for revenge. At the foot of his next letter he wrote, "Look under the stamp." The censor did so, after spending considerable time in steaming the stamp from the envelope. And he found these words: "Was it hard to get off?"

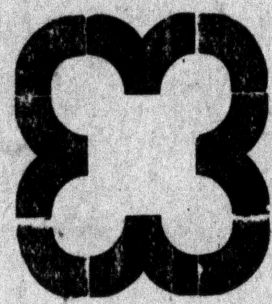
