Cox for the best and the next best paper on "Pitt County History" were won by Miss Estelle Jones, from near Bethel, and Miss Lela Roach, of Coxville, and presented by Messrs. W. H. Whedbee and P. S. Cotten. Miss Bessie Mooring, of the Winterville High School, and Mr. Clarence Barnhill, of Bethel, won the first and second prizes for the best papers on "Educational Progress in Pitt County for the Last Five Years," which were offered by Mr. L. The exercises closed at 1 o'clock with an encouraging talk by the energetic Superintendent W. H. Ragsdale. Thus closed the best meeting in the history of the Pitt County Teachers' Association. The meetings have always been good, but we believe from today's exercises that "the best is yet to be."

### IN PLAGUE TIMES.

How London Handled the Disease in  
Seventeenth Century.

During the plague of 1603 Francis Hering, "Doctor in Physicke and Fellow of the Colledge of Physicians in London, published certain Rules and Directions for the prevention of the spreading of that contagious and all devouring sickness." These he reprinted, "somewhat enlarged," in the next plague season of 1625, "to the view and use and, I hope, good of my Cittizens and Countymen." Among his rules are:

"Concourse of people to Stage playes, wakes or feasts and May pole dauncings are to be prohibited by publique Authority, whereby, as God is dishonored, the bodies of men and women—by surfetting, drunkennes and other riots and excesses—disposed to infection and the contagion dangerously scattered both in Citie and Countrie.

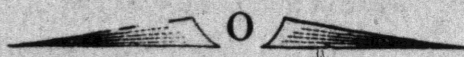
"Let not the carkasses of horses, dogs, cats, etc., lye rotting and poisoning the aire (as they have done) in More and Finsburie fields and elsewhere around about the Citie.

"The burying of infected bodies in churches, churchyards and—namely, in Pauls Churchyard, where the chiefe Magistrates of the Citie and many other Cittizens meete weekly to hear Sermons, must needs be not onely inconvenient, but verie dangerous for spreading the contagion and poisoning the whole Citie."

Some folk ate breakfast then, others did not:

"For breakfast you may vse a good draft of wormewood beere or ale and a few morsels of bread and butter, with the leaues of sage or else a toste with sweet-salade oyle, two or three drops of rose vinegar and a little sugar. They that have cold stomackes may drinke a draft of wormewood wine or malmsey instead of ale or beere. But take heed (as you loue your life) of extreme hot waters, as aqua vitæ, Rosa solis or other compound waters of like nature, which Empericks prepare and set out with vaine and boasting words they were devised to kill, not cure men." — London Notes and Queries.

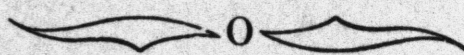

**Methods of the Mole.**

In burrowing his tunnels the mole seems to swim through the earth rather than to dig his way. Although much of the earth is never removed from the runs, but is beaten hard into the walls and floor of the tunnel, the creature finds it more expeditious in busy times to clear the runs of loose earth. This he does at a point where the run comes to the surface by pushing the earth before him with his flat forehead and face. Sometimes where the earth binds easily he pushes out the mold in solid round plugs, showing the exact dimensions of the orifice through which they have been thrust. When the mole is hunting or traveling underground he has no need to throw up the earth. This is a subsequent operation for the purpose of cleaning the runs for regular use.

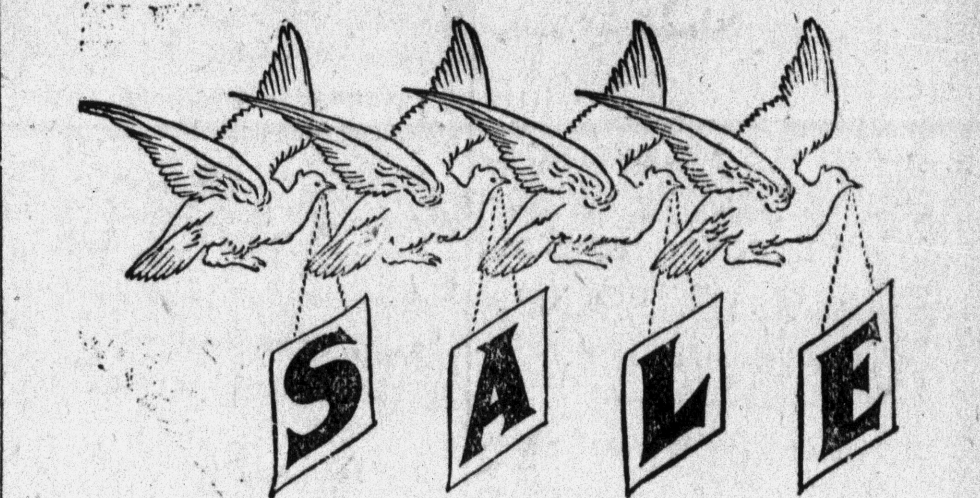
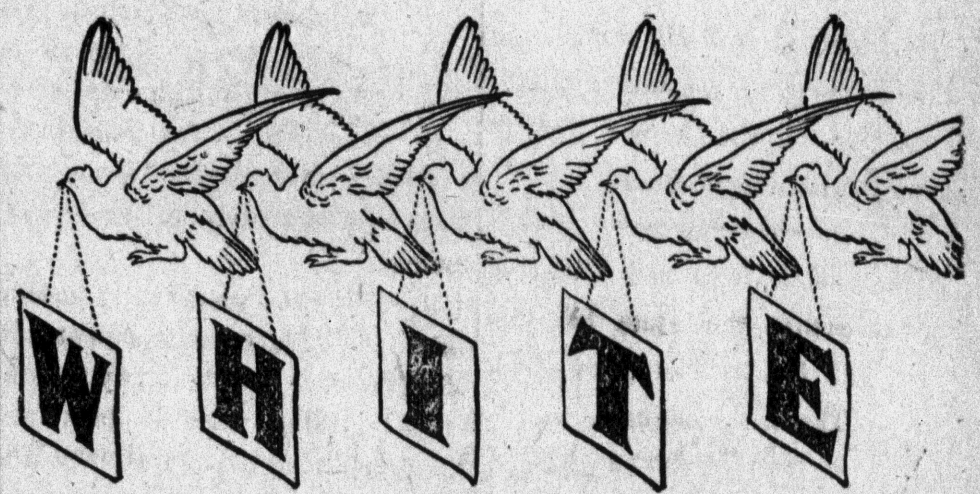

This jealousy sometimes gets into the household, in the office, in the church, in schools, and when it does creep in we find one ever mindful of self but neglectful of the rights of others, and business, character, good name, social standing and whatnot are driven to the winds, so long as these concern some one who stands in the way or holds something desired to be obtained. There is a legitimate field of effort for all, and only the slothful do not attain.

Build yourself up through the individuality and merit you stamp upon your work or business—concern yourself not with the sphere assigned to or occupied by another. Home, business relations and all, should always be amicable as between men and women who live in the open and have nothing to conceal, and good will should always prevail. Harmony, shoulder to shoulder, all working together, differences in belief buried so far as they effect friendship, these things will help any community. He is treacherous who would not subscribe to these, and is one who would seek to establish himself by the ruin he would wreck upon others—Stanley Enterprise.

## TEN RULES FOR SUCCESS ON AN EMPLOYER TOWARD AN EMPLOYEE.

1. Always set a good example.
2. Do not lie to your clerks and expect them to tell the truth to you.
3. Command the respect of your employees by the integrity of your business methods.
4. Have confidence in the ability of your employees until they prove themselves unworthy.
5. Pay a just amount for labor performed. A cheap man is a poor investment.
6. Treat those beneath you with respect and they will return the compliment.
7. Do not waste your breath in swearing and storming around the office. The same amount of energy expended toward improving your business may make you a wealthy man. No amount of swearing ever sold a dollar's worth of goods or improved the work of an employee.
8. Be courteous and considerate to all of your employees if you wish them to be courteous to your customers.
9. Do not be continually finding fault. A little encouragement will often do more good than any amount of fault finding. Let it be known that when you give a reprimand it is for just cause. Do not reprimand for the same mistake repeatedly. Get rid of that employee, if once has not been sufficient. A number of cheap, useless hangers-on clog the wheels of business.
10. Be just and honest in the office, as well as outside of it, and the success that crowns work well done will be yours.—Printers' Ink.

## WARNING ABOUT IMMIGRATION.

Just now while the South is so enthusiastic over immigration from Europe the Washington Post sits up and sounds a note of warning. This great newspaper insists that this section shall be careful, extremely so, in the matter of bringing new laborers to the cotton fields and cities of Dixie.

The Atlanta Journal is of the opinion that there is no doubt but that this immigration matter has almost reached the proportions of a fad in this part of the country, and throughout the land meetings and conventions are being held and innumerable speeches made on this very interesting and important topic. There is also no doubt about the fact that immigration it badly needed in the South, for the negro laborer has become very much disorganized and in a large measure thriftless. But the Journal, like the Washington Post, thinks that great care should be exercised in regard to the importation of labor from any foreign country. There are many classes of people in Europe, some of whom could be easily assimilated by the South and who would become in time valuable citizens. But there are other classes over there who could never understand our institutions and would be menaces to them.—Durham Sun.

The Bible will no longer be used for swearing witnesses in the municipal court of the Bronx, says a New York dispatch. In removing the Bible from the witnesses, Justice J. M. Tirney said:

"Its use is a desecration. So many lying words come from the mouths of witnesses that the use of the holy book is a travesty, a mockery. It is shocking to see men swear on the Word of God to tell the truth, and then deliberately lie. I now affirm a witness—that is all."

The justice is right. In these modern days swearing a witness on the Book adds nothing to the sanctity of an oath and we believe the custom should be abolished. If a witness is disposed to tell the truth

he will tell it without placing his hand on the Bible and going through the motion of kissing it. If he is disposed to lie swearing him on a stack of Bibles as high as his head will not make him tell the truth. An oath is lightly regarded and the amount of perjury in the courts is heart sickening.—Statesville Landmark.
