South's Rapid Growth

There is an interesting and instructive article in the February issue of the Review of Reviews entitled, "The South's Amazing Progress." The article is well worth reading and has much of value and interest to Southerners. Many facts and figures are new to those best informed.

It is shown by the report that the amount invested in cotton mills in the South in 1880 was \$21,000,000. This amount was increased in 1890 to \$60,000,000 and in 1905 to \$225,000,000. To put it plainer ten times as much is invested in Southern cotton mills today as there was 25 years ago.

These figures speak for themselves and carry a world of significance as to the marvelous growth of the South along the lines of manufacturing in recent years. The facts are more than true and they are a source of great pride to all Southerners.—Charlotte News.

TAR HEEL FIGURES.

Summary of Statistics by the Census Bureau.

Washington, Feb. 13.—Notwithstanding a decrease of nearly 6 per cent. in the number of manufacturing establishments in North Carolina for the year ending December 31, 1904, as compared with 1900, the value of products increased 67 per cent in the same period of time, according to a preliminary summary of statistics for the State issued by the Census Bureau today.

The summary excludes the neighborhood industries and hand trades, and shows that during the year 1904, there were in operation 3,272 establishments with a capital invested of \$141,000,639. The number of salaried officials, clerks, etc., employed was 4,072, drawing salaries amounting to \$3,795,471. The average number of wage earners is given as \$5,339, and the wages paid as \$21,375,294. Value of products, including custom work and repairing, \$141,520,776 as against \$85,274,083 for 1900. The five principal industries are given as cotton goods, flour and grist mill products, furniture, lumber and tobacco.

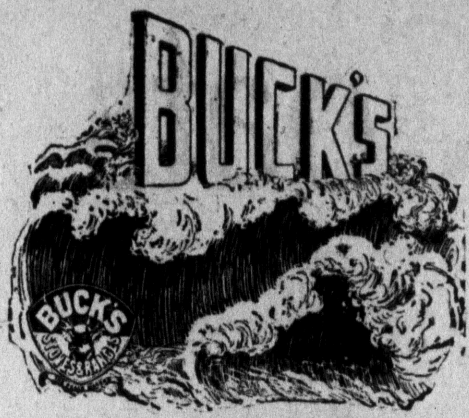

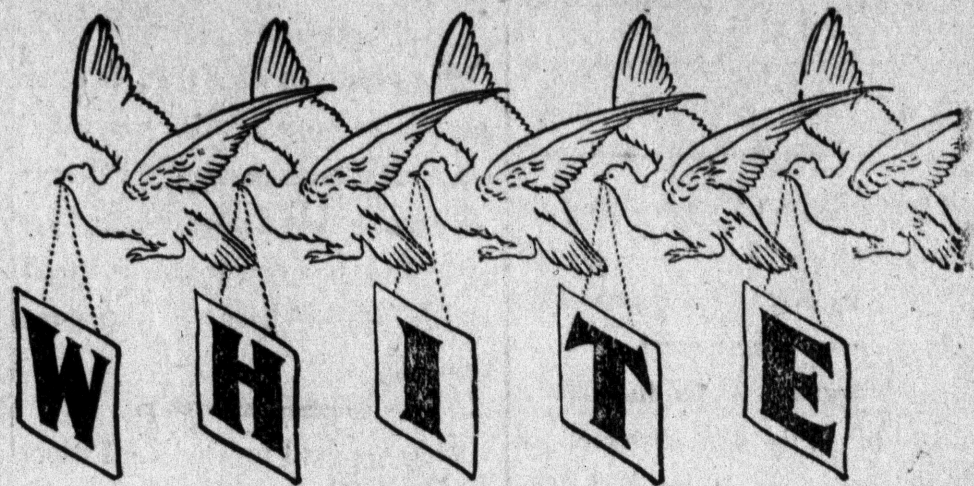

In the South \$225,000,000 are invested in cotton mills, yet not a cent of it in Greenville. And Pitt county raises 30,000 bales of cotton a year. Where the cotton is raised the mills should be located.

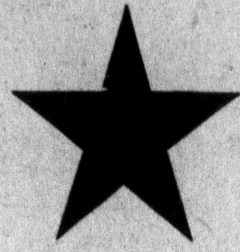

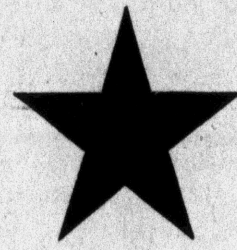

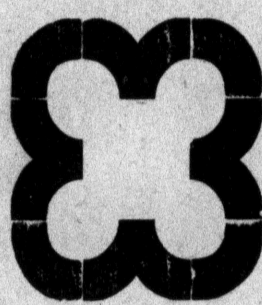
