## DWELLING HOUSE BURNED.

### Mr. J. B. Tripp Loses His Home and Contents.

None of the family were at home at the time, so it is not known how the fire started. Mr. Joseph Tripp, who lives a quarter of a mile distant, first saw the fire and it was then burning through the roof. He ran over there and with some help succeeded in getting out a bureau and sewing machine. The roof of the house fell in so soon that nothing else could be saved.

The loss is about \$600 with no insurance.

## HASTY FOUND GUILTY.

### Sentenced to Prison for Life.

Gaffney, S. C., March 6.—After being out all night the jury in the case of George Hasty, indicted for the murder of Milan Bennett and Abbot Davison, members of the "Nothing But Money" Theatrical Company, today brought in a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree accompanying it with a recommendation to mercy. He was immediately sentenced to imprisonment for life. He received the verdict and sentence without a tremor, but shortly afterwards, and for the first time since the trial began, broke down and wept upon being approached by a minister who offered him consolation. Counsel for Hasty gave notice of an appeal. Hasty was tried for murder of but one of the men.

### Care of the Cat.

A little powdered sulphur made into a paste with lard or unsalted butter and smeared upon the front paws now and then is an excellent thing to keep a cat in good condition, but care should be taken that there is no exposure to cold or wet until after the effects of the medicine have passed off. ### THE PORCUPINE.

He is Noted Chiefly For His Sluggishness and Stupidity.

The porcupine can hardly be said to have a home, but he uses a hollow tree as a tenement, or even a hole among the rocks. As warm weather approaches the female produces two or three young, which are of amazing size at birth, actually larger than the newborn cubs of a bear.

Their flesh is eaten by the Indians, but has never been liked by white men. The use of the quills in ornamentation by our Indians is well known, robes, garments, moccasins, pouches, weapon cases, baskets and everything else being ornamented with them by the squaws with great skill and often with truly artistic effect; but, as usual, the earliest methods and patterns, when the Indians used their own delicate dyes and sinew threads, were much better than are seen in these days of aniline colors and crude imitations of the white man's art. The longer quills of the European porcupine are turned into fancy penholders, and in India and Malaya they weave little baskets, etc., out of them, which are often as pretty as they are strange.

Reviewing his narrow life, the strongest impression left upon one's mind seems to be that of the creature's sluggishness and stupidity. These are perhaps concomitants, if not consequences, of its strictly vegetarian life, in which its tastes are so simple that it rarely seems to have to make the least exertion for food at any season of the year, and to its highly protected condition, which makes it careless of danger, and hence unvigilant and steadily inclined to sluggishness of mind as well as of body. It is not well for an animal to be too safe or too comfortable, for its mind grows rusty with disuse, or, if it never had use, lies inert, and the whole creature exists on a low plane. I do not know an animal of the American woods that is so well off and so uninteresting as the porcupine.—New York Post.

## ALDERMAN FOR ROOSEVELT'S SUCCESSOR.

Dr. Edwin A. Alderman, native of Wilmington, N. C., has been proposed by the Hartford Courant as a suitable man for the Democrats to nominate for President in 1908. North Carolina hasn't had a President since Johnson and there is no reason why the country should not be blessed with an executive from the most Democratic Commonwealth in the Republic, even if he does now reside in the State that is "the mother of Presidents." Here is the Courant's editorial: "If Col. Harvey's suggestion about trying their luck in 1908 with a scholar find favor in the eyes of the Democratic brethren, they are by no means shut up to Col. Harvey's nominee—Dr. Woodard Wilson, of Princeton, Dr. Eliot, of Harvard, is a little too old, perhaps, but there's Dr. Henry Wade Rogers, dean of the Yale Law School, not yet 53 and young for his age. He isn't a university president now, but he was. And there's Dr. Edwin Anderson Alderman, president of the University of Virginia, not yet 47 and one of the nicest Democrats living. Dr. Rogers is a New Yorker by birth; Dr.

Alderman is a North Carolinian."

Dr. Alderman was born a Democrat in a city where a man's politics and his religion are as unchangeable as the laws of the Medes and Persians. Whether in Wilmington, in Chapel Hill in New Orleans, or Charlottesville, he has been a true Democrat "voting the ticket as it was printed," and therefore always voting right, and showing that he was peculiarly qualified to be chosen as the head of the university establishment by the foremost statesman the world has known. It would be like a fresh baptism of Jeffersonian Democracy to nominate and elect the next Democratic President from Monticello, who carries the keys of the University of Virginia. He would maintain the dignity of the college president, but he wouldn't walk on stilts at the White House and forget the boys in the trenches; he wouldn't carry a Big Stick but would lean on the staff of Jefferson; he would maintain the Monroe doctrine as Monroe promulgated it; and he would take more interest in educating the children in the United States proper than in putting education into the naked Filipino at the point of a gun.—News and Observer.

## MURDER, PURE AND SIMPLE.

We quote the following from an editorial in the Greensboro Telegram:

"A bill to prohibit in New York State even the advocacy of the suggestion that persons suffering from an incurable mental or physical ailment to be put to death, has been introduced in the assembly branch of the Legislature. The bill is everlastingly right. There is no principle so firmly established by usage and consideration of common sense and decency as the one which says so long as there is life there is hope."

Shake on that, Brother! We sincerely hope that the bill will pass the assembly branch of the New York Legislature. Not only should the fact that "while there is life there is hope" put a quietus to the foolish doctrine of killing the incurable, but the eternal laws of the Bible should cause Christian people everywhere to do all in their power to eradicate such a diabolical and irreligious idea from our country.

The idea has had a few supporters. Every absurd and freak idea always does.

It is, however, nothing more nor less than murder pure and simple. The command, "Thou shalt not kill," has no provisions. It stands simple, and should cause the foolish advocates of public murder to slink away from the presence of law, religion and decency, with shame and disgrace.—Charlotte News.

The North Carolina Corporation Commission recommends, in its report to the governor, the abolishment of the two classes of railroad passengers—first and second—and the reduction of passenger fares. The latter, at all events, is a good recommendation. Railroad fare in North Carolina is too high. The rate, when adopted, was equitable, for then population was relatively sparse and traffic relatively light. Both have increased enormously since then and charges in both departments should be made accordingly.—Charlotte Observer.

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## CONSTELLATION OF ARIES.

The Ram With the Golden Fleece of Argonautic Fame.

Early on the 21st of March the sun enters the sign of Aries, and astronomical spring begins. Two or three thousand years ago, when the heavenly groups were originally fashioned, Aries marked the vernal equinox, the passage of the sun through which betokens the opening of spring. Owing, however, to the slow westward movement of the equinoctial points Aries in reality has no longer the honor once accorded it, but has drifted to the eastward.

The constellation of Aries represents in mythology the ram with the golden fleece of argonautic fame, and a short sketch of its history may be of interest. Athanius, a legendary king of Thessaly, had two children, Phrixus and Helle, and he also had two wives, having repudiated the first and taken a second. The stepmother was not at all good to the children and treated them so badly that she aroused sympathy in their behalf. Among those interested in the youngsters was Mercury, who sent a ram, which took them on its back, sprang into the air and hustled them off to the eastward.

In those days Europe and Asia were separated by a strait, as we find in a measure to be the case today, and the girl Helle became frightened or perhaps dizzy from seasickness in crossing the water at this very rough time in her experience, lost her hold and fell into the straits which to this day are known as the Hellespont. The boy had a better hold and kept on until he reached the far end of the Black sea. Phrixus showed a spirit of sacrifice, not of self, however, by killing the ram and presenting its golden fleece to the king of the country, who caused it to be hung in the sacred grove of the Aries under the guard of a sleepless dragon. The star marking the forehead was called by the Arabs Hamal, which means sheep. In very early times it is said that the Greeks considered this star as the sunrise herald of the vernal equinox.—New York Times.

### Condolence.

One of the hardest things in the world is to condole with anybody in a misfortune or a bereavement.

If it were not that the matter is generally serious a great many funny stories could be printed about the condolences people offer to the bereaved. But at Manchester some time ago a hardworking Irishman fell out of a fourth story window and broke his neck.

## ANCIENT MEDICINE.

The Idiotic Nostrums in Which People  
Once Believed.

If modern science can boast of anything, it can of the way in which it has rescued medicine from the realms of imagination, says the London Standard. The wonderful prescriptions of the Magi, as narrated by the Roman historian, Pliny, are examples of what the earliest doctors were, while even the "salves" of our own Elizabethans seem at first sight not much of an improvement upon those of the Chaldean M. D.'s. Let us take a few examples of Magian healing from a Latin author, of which perhaps the most useful is the following—one that in modern parlance would run thus: A recipe to make women disclose their secrets. To do the old Roman justice, he stigmatizes this statement as a "portentous lie." (No doubt he had tried it.)

Others are quite as grotesque. Feverfew, when used medicinally, had to be plucked by the left hand, after the patient's name had been spoken over it, the herbalist taking good care not to look behind him. A love charm could be easily obtained from a hyena caught when the moon was in Gemini. Sporting prophets who wish to excel in divination should change their customary chop for a few moles' hearts. It is stipulated that these be fresh. The Romans themselves, although no mean surgeons—they made use of the probe and nippers and instruments for trepanning—were not less given to prodigies than the people whose veracity they doubted. They believed that eating hare was a cure for insomnia, and even the skeptic Pliny imagined that there must be something in the superstition that people who had done so were good looking for nine days afterward. A veritable nine days' wonder! He recommended also, as a cure for quartan fever, that the dust in which a hawk had rolled should be put into a bag and the latter tied around the neck with a piece of red thread. Other cures for this same were the longest tooth of a black dog, in the same position, and a wasp caught in the left hand and then pressed against the forehead.

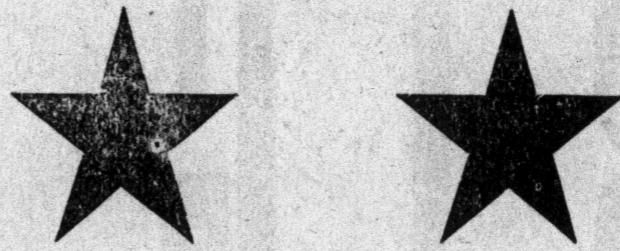
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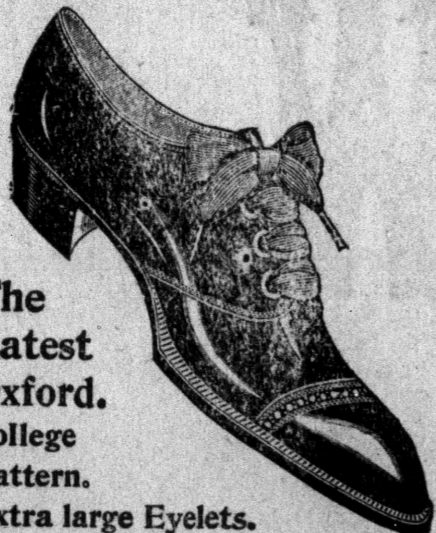
