Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

The superintendent of the graded school at Scotland contracted smallpox and the school closed for two weeks.

There are within this State 3,859.09 miles of railroad, not including double and side tracks—an increase over last year of 59 miles. Of our railroads, 2,839.51 miles are operated by the Southern Railway Company, Atlantic Coast Line, and the Seaboard Air Line, divided as follows: Southern Railway Company, 1,279.56 miles; Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, 947.83 miles; Seaboard Air Line Railway, 612.12 miles.

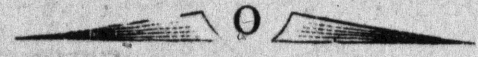

THE MOOSE YARD.

Winter Quarters of the Animal and the Hunt For Food.

The yarding of the moose is a familiar phrase that has furnished the ground for several misconceptions. Many persons think that a moose yard is a large place, with all the snow in it hammered down smooth and surrounded by a straight wall of untrodden snow which rises to the level of the deep, soft covering of the forest beyond. They imagine, further, that as soon as the new snowstorm begins the moose gets to work, hoof and horn, to hammer it down smooth and hard within the yard.

The fact is that when the snow deepens the moose family, father, mother and little ones, or sometimes several families together, settle in some place of abundant food and by winding daily in this they cover the ground with a network of pathways. The longer they stay the more and wider the pathways, so that finally there are but few spaces untrodden of twenty square yards across.

The deeper the snow in the woods the more the moose must work for their food, since the lower bushes and ground herbs are cut off, and thus the difference between the snow in the yard and that in the woods increases. If the food is sufficiently abundant in the yard and no hunters find them the moose stay there till spring. If it gives out, they must begin a perilous journey through the snow in search of another place. It is during this journey only that they fear the wolves. It is always done in single file, so that the young ones in the rear do not have a very hard time, and it is usually done with judgment founded on their memory of the country.

The moose yard is commonly frequented by the moose birds, or Canada jays. I am not sure why. The moose by tearing down and rooting up logs and dead trees may expose worms, etc., or the parasitic insects in their hair may furnish food for the bird. There are several other cases of small birds associating with large beasts, and in each the bird is believed to serve the beast as a watchman and get his return in parasitic insects.

With the melting of the snow the necessity for yarding ceases, and the moose family scatters.—Ernest Thompson Seton in Scribner's.

HEALTH RULES.

Their Observance May Ward Off or Cure Sickness.

Read carefully and remember—That the frequent use of hot baths is debilitating.

That fresh vegetables are used for keeping the blood pure.

That people who suffer from rheumatism will go a long way toward curing themselves by avoiding beer.

That the overuse of alcohol has a particularly disastrous effect upon the liver, the kidneys and the blood vessels.

That cold feet cause indigestion, liver troubles, diarrhea and other ills and should be carefully guarded against.

That underdone beef and mutton are not unwholesome, but underdone veal or pork is very unwholesome indeed and often causes illness.

That if our natural teeth have become deficient artificial ones will be of great service in preventing dyspepsia by enabling us to chew our food well.

That without thorough mastication of food we not only lose a considerable proportion of its nutriment, but also lay the foundations of indigestion.

That an escape of gas into one's bedroom is very injurious to health, even though it be a very slight one. It is frequently an unsuspected cause of sore throat and headache.

That anything over and above the quantity of nourishment required to replace the waste which is constantly going on in the body is not only unnecessary, but is apt to do harm. Overeating is as mischievous as under-eating, perhaps even more so.

That without a healthy skin one cannot have a healthy body. To insure the health of the skin nothing is more important than cleanliness.

Friiction with a rough towel is also very useful, as it stimulates the myriads of minute glands which ramify the skin in all directions and assists them to properly perform the work of secreting waste matters from the blood. When this is done vigorously the skin is said to "act" well. When it is not done well, an undue strain is thrown upon the kidneys, and they have to perform some of the waste removing work left undone by the skin, and some form of kidney mischief may be set up by the overwork put on them in this way.—Boston Traveler.

If Dr. Matthews is acquitted on the ground of insanity, as looks probable, he should not be given his liberty any more, as he might be crazy enough to kill somebody else.

Two women fought a duel with pistols on the street of Middlesboro, Ky. Neither of them was struck, but a man in a building near by was killed by one of the bullets. That might have been expected.

A Kansas judge sentenced a man to stay drunk for life, with the injunction that if caught sober he would be placed in jail. The judge said whiskey would take the man to the devil quicker than anything else, and being a bad man the quicker he got there the better.

The Greensboro Industrial News tells of a 4 year old boy employed in a furniture factory there, whose hand was badly mangled by being caught in a machine around which he was at work. It strikes us that a boy that age should be at home with his mother and not employed anywhere, much less around machinery.

BUT A REPETITION OF HISTORY.

"Curiously enough, the development of the South as a manufacturing section is but a repetition of history, seeing that in 1910 North Carolina and Georgia were ahead of New England in the output of manufactured articles," said Col. B. Frank Mebane, of North Carolina, at the New Willard.

Col. Mebane is extensively engaged in cotton spinning in Rockingham county, being the owner of not less than ten plants which turn out cotton fabrics.

"The region south of the Potomac river," he continued, "is now producing more cotton goods than the North produces. In twenty years from now I predict that the mills of the Southern States will require not less than 10,000,000 bales of cotton, which is as much as this country now raises. But by that time the cotton belt will be growing 25,000,000 bales in order to keep pace with the world's constantly increasing demand."—Washington Post.

MODERN PIRATES.

The oldtime sea rover who was wont to swoop down on a merchantman and loot his cargo was regarded by all civilized nations as a criminal of the most dangerous type. If caught, he was usually hanged along with his crew. In these more peaceful days there are pirates who prey on commerce, but they are far less engaging to the imagination. Among them may be called the "trademark grafter," as he is sometimes called, who, despite the laws, still prospers. Instead of holding up a ship laden with merchandise he attacks the business of some other manufacturer, and by imitating his rival's brand, the style and cover of the packages in which the wares are sold, and also by throwing out to the public the bait of a cheaper price, he diverts the revenues of his victim into his own pocket.

So great has become the depredations of these land buccanniers that American manufacturers are now asking for a national law which shall make the imitation of trademarks a penal offence. A bill has been introduced at Washington which provides that the maker of goods which are articles of interstate commerce and which bear labels in imitation of other brands shall be liable to \$1,000 fine or imprisonment for two years, or both. The manufacturer who fleeces the public by means of a counterfeit label is as much a swindler as the green goods man or the gold brick financier. If, as the advocates of the bill assert, it will be supported by the courts as constitutional, it should be passed.—New York Tribune.

The millennium is nigh at hand. Judge Allen went to Madison county a few days ago to hold a two weeks' term of court and the docket was cleared in two days. There were only 30 cases and of this number the State secured 29 convictions. But, most wonderful to relate! there was not a single murder case on the docket. Usually there are a dozen or so murder cases on the docket in Madison, but as nobody is ever hung there for murder, killing in that county has probably become an uninteresting pastime, or it may be so the Madisonians got disgusted and quit because the citizens of Wilson county, in Eastern North Carolina, have surpassed them at their own game.—Statesville Landmark.

The government expects people who live on the rural routes to put up boxes for their mail. The government is doing very much for the people in the rural sections by sending out men and paying them good salaries to put the mail near the doors of most of its citizens. Surely our good citizens on all routes will be appreciative enough to put up boxes for their mail, and meet Uncle Sam part of the way.—Ayden Baptist.

In a case from Augusta, Ga., it was recently held that a street fair or carnival, including the usual booths, side-shows, spiels, etc.; is a public nuisance. This will be good news to citizens of towns who have not been annoyed by so-called carnivals. It did not, however, require a decision of the Supreme Court of Georgia to brand the street carnival as a public nuisance—it has been that all along.—Charlotte Observer.

CARE OF THE SKIN.

Some Things That Are Essential to Good Health.

To most persons the skin represents simply the organ of touch, and because it is customary to keep nearly all of its surface concealed its relation to the welfare of the body is overlooked. It has, however, most important functions, such as the casting out of waste matter and the maintenance of an even body temperature, disregard of which may lead to serious disturbances of health.

But aside from its purely physiological purposes the skin is an important influence for or against personal appearance, and its proper care is therefore worthy of consideration from this point of view alone.

Cleanliness is the greatest essential in the care of the skin. For the cleansing bath water as hot as can be borne is best, and a good soap should be freely applied with a moderately stiff bath brush. If the water is at all hard it is well to soften it by the addition of a little ammonia or borax. A quick sponging of the entire body with cold water should follow in order to cause the pores relaxed by the heat to contract, and the drying should be accomplished by brisk rubbing with a coarse towel.

Although the habitual use of hot water on the face is sometimes condemned on the ground that it tends to favor the relaxation of the skin and produce wrinkles, there is no danger of this if the washing be concluded with cold water.

The sponge is a thing to be avoided, as it is difficult to keep clean and forms a beautiful lurking place for germs. One washcloth should be kept for the face alone, and this should be boiled frequently.

At night it is a good plan to rub a little pure cold cream into the skin of the face and then wipe it off with a piece of soft linen. It is surprising how black the latter will appear when the operation is finished. Cold cream and talcum powder and some of the cosmetics are safe and useful, but other cosmetics do more harm than good.

The development of wrinkles can be retarded, and if present they may be lessened by gentle massage with the finger tips anointed with cold cream. A good general rule is to let the direction of the rubbing be upward and outward.

Above all, it should be remembered that cleanliness, exercise, fresh air, simple food and attention to the digestion are the most important considerations in the care of the skin.—Youth's Companion.
