BOARDING WITH SHERIFF.

Negro Goes to Jail on Three Charges.

Julius Gray, colored, was before Mayor Wooten this morning on more counts than he could stand up against. Saturday night Gray filled up on bug juice and went to the home of a colored woman on Short street where he drew a pistol and threatened her. The woman slipped away and sought safety with a neighbor. Gray went on to another house to which he thought she had gone and broke in. Chief of Police Smith stopped the escapade by landing Gray in the lock up. The mayor bound Gray over to court on three charges, carrying concealed weapon, assault with deadly weapon and house breaking. In default of bail Gray went to jail.

Burial of Mr. W. R. Parker.

The funeral of Mr. W. R. Parker, who died Friday night, was held Sunday morning. The body was taken to the Christian church where service was conducted by Rev. H. H. Moore, and then to Cherry Hill cemetery where the Odd Fellows performed the last sad rites over their departed brother.

At the church Rev. Mr. Moore paid an eloquent tribute to the deceased in speaking of his life as citizen, friend, husband, father, Christian, and Odd Fellow.

The attendance at the funeral was large. There were a hundred Odd Fellows in the procession, many coming from Ayden to join the lodge here in the service.

The pall bearers from the Odd Fellows were Messrs. E. A. Moyer, R. L. Carr, D. L. James, E. G. Cox, D. C. Moore, D. G. Berry, J. L. Smith and J. B. Moore. The honorary pall bearers were Messrs. R. Williams, J. A. Lang, J. L. Wooten and D. J. Whichard. The floral tributes were beautiful.

Two Raleigh Men Killed.

Raleigh, N. C., March 10.—W. J. Weir and John Whitelaw, two of Raleigh's best known and most highly esteemed citizens, met a horrible death about 1 o'clock this afternoon by being caught under a huge boiler which they were having placed in position at the rock quarry of the Wake Granite Co., two miles east of the city. They were having the boiler delivered at the quarry. It was on a big wagon for moving boilers and was being driven down a steep incline to the quarry when the wheels on the right struck a kind of boulder that protruded in the road six inches or more. A big iron cuff about the rear axle snapped in two and the wagon lurched to the left with such force as to over turn wagon and boiler. Both Mr. Weir and Mr. Whitelaw were walking on the left side of the boiler and were caught under it in such a way that Mr. Weir's chest was crushed in and the side of Mr. Whitelaw's head crushed in. It was necessary for the boiler to be jacked up and considerable digging to be done before the two men could be extricated.

MAIL CLERK GOES ON.

Another Improvement for "Reflector Special."

Postmaster R. C. Flanagan informs us that he has received advice from the post office department that on Thursday, 15th inst., the handling of pouch mails on trains 56 and 57, known as the "Reflector Special," will be discontinued and a mail clerk will be put on these trains giving the regular R. P. O. service. This will be a great convenience to every town between Tarboro and Kinston, as now all can have benefit of the mail service by these trains, while heretofore only some of the towns received pouch mails.

Sometime ago The Reflector wrote our congressman, Hon. John H. Small, who is always ready to serve the people of his district, relative of getting a mail clerk on this train, and through him and the efforts of Postmaster Flanagan the service has been secured. The putting on of this service by the government practically secures the permanency of this additional passenger train. The Southern Express Co. should now arrange for the handling of express on it.

HORRIBLE DISASTER.

Twelve Hundred People Perish in Mine.

Paris, March 10.—A mining catastrophe of incalculable horror and magnitude has struck the coal center of northern France. An explosion of fine-damp at 7 o'clock this morning carried death and destruction throughout the net work of coal mines centered at Courrières and fire followed the explosion, making rescue difficult, and almost impossible.

The intense excitement and confusion in the vicinity prevented early estimates of the exact loss of life, but a dispatch received here at 4:35 p. m. gave 1,404 miners entombed and probably lost. At 8:45 o'clock this evening a brief dispatch from Lille announced the total of 1,193 dead.

All France has been profoundly shocked by the magnitude of the disaster, which is said to be the greatest in the history of continental mining.

Mrs. E. A. Little Dead.

Castoria, March 9.—Mrs. E. A. Little, of this place died Wednesday night at her home here, in the 85th year of her age. She was a splendid woman, a staunch member of the Baptist Church. The funeral was held Thursday. She is survived by two children. Mrs. Dora E. Carr and Mr. James B. Little.

A BIBLE FROM THE KING AND A LECTURE FROM THE PRESIDENT

President Roosevelt has joined King Edward in a notable gift to the old Bruton parish church at Williamsburg, Va. When Harry St. George Tucker, president of the Jamestown Exposition Company, was abroad a few months ago, King Edward presented him with a handsome Bible for the church, which is a successor to the original church at James town. Today Mr. Tucker called on the President and while talking with him of exposition matters, told him of the gift of King Edward. The President immediately offered to provide a lecture on which the Bible might rest. On behalf of the congregation, Mr. Tucker accepted the President's offer, assuring him that such a gift would be appreciated deeply by the parish.—Washington Dispatch.

IN A HERONY.

It is Not a Pleasure to Either the Eye, Ear or Nose.

A writer describes as follows the abode of a colony of herons near a large city in this country: "The herony of which I am writing is situated in a piece of swampy woodland not more than 200 yards from a main traveled road. Let one attempt to enter the confines of this city of birds and he will immediately be made aware of the nature of the place. At first he will be greeted by a few croaks from the outlying members of the colony, the suburbanites, as it were, and then, as he inadvertently steps on a dry twig that breaks with a cracking report, such din will suddenly arise as will cause him to think he has entered bedlam. Birds appear by the hundreds where before not one could be seen. The air is full of the rustle and rush of wings, and each bird vies with his fellows in making the most noise until their combined efforts produce a racket that can be likened to nothing I know of and that can easily be heard from a quarter to half a mile away. The voices of the night herons are anything but musical.

"Everywhere are pieces of half digested and decaying fish and the bodies of young birds that have met an untimely end by falling from the nests, and consequently the odor is not what might truthfully be called savory. Altogether it is hardly the place one would choose for an early morning jaunt unless one had a particular object in doing so, especially as there is but little solid ground, the rest being mud, water and decaying vegetation. And yet, despite all these unpleasant features, it is altogether a delightful place to visit for one who is a lover of birds.

"Occasionally a resounding thump coming from some part of the swamp announces the fall of a young one too eager to obtain its portion of food. These falls when the herons are fairly well grown seem to trouble them not at all, even when the drop is fifty or sixty feet. But they must be able to climb again into the trees or provide for themselves upon the ground if they would live, for the old birds appear to be entirely oblivious to the cries of the fallen."

Greensboro must hurry with something else to keep in the public eye

Raleigh is going on the theory of buying water and not watered stock.

They have let up on the revenue officers and are now arresting the postmasters in the western part of the State.

Uncle Sam has a big elephant on his hands in the Philippines. Pity but what he could give the whole push away.

They have gone to fighting again over in the Philippines and Uncle Sam's expense fund will increase proportionally.

The President is losing his grip. Congress is about to go back on him on both the statehood and railroad rate bills.

The Republicans would now like to quiet it all up, but they ought to have thought of this before washing so much dirty linen in public.

Asheville is about to do something good. The authorities have started in with a determination to rid the city of bawdy houses, and it looks like they will succeed.

North Carolina, too, seems to have turned over a new leaf and resolved to punish some murderers. Dr. Matthews was convicted in the face of the insanity plea.

It was all in French, yet Asheville and Salisbury raved mightily over Mme. Bernhardt. She comes high, but there is some satisfaction in knowing they had her.

Of course North Carolina should have a building at the Jamestown Exposition. It would make a large percent of the people of Norfolk feel like they had come back home, to say nothing of the good it will do the State to have a building there.

THE WORK OF THE BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION.

The first building and loan association of Statesville was organized in February, 1887, and has been in operation more than 19 years. Few people who haven't stopped to think about it realize the amount of business the association does.

Up to Monday, for instance, 1,062 shares had been taken in the new series of stock—the 39th—which began the 3rd of February. The weekly payments of dues, and interest on loans, on all outstanding stock now amount to about \$1,200 per week, which is \$62,400 a year. Practically all this money is being paid out for homes, or business houses, or something that goes to build up Statesville. In making loans the first consideration is given

a man who wants money to build a house; the man who wants to buy a house comes next and the man who wants to pay off a mortgage comes third.

Since the association was organized it has collected and paid out for homes in Statesville, directly and indirectly, hundreds of thousands of dollars, for by far the greater portion of the money goes into homes. Within the past two weeks the association has passed loans aggregating \$25,000, all of which is to go into buildings in Statesville, and it has calls for much more money than it can supply.

As a home builder a building and loan association cannot be surpassed and no live town should be without one. For a person who doesn't want to borrow money the association is a splendid savings bank and pays a good rate of interest on the savings of non-borrowers—Statesville Landmark.

The above tells its own story so well that comment is not necessary. By reading it carefully the people of Greenville can see what this town is losing by not having a building and loan association here. A number of people have recently said to us that they would like to build houses here if they could get the advantages of a building and loan association.

WILL SURPASS EIFFEL TOWER.

An English Company has applied for a concession to erect at the Jamestown Exposition a tower, which will surpass in height the famous Tower Eiffel of Paris, which for 17 years has ranked as one of the wonders of the world.

This lofty structure, though it will be situated nearly 20 miles from the sea coast, may be seen by captains of the coast steamers plying the Atlantic. Ten thousand or more incandescent lights will be attached to the tower and a mammoth searchlight placed at its apex will bathe the tower for miles around with bright light.

It will require no less than six relays of elevators to reach the top. These various "lifts" as they are called in England, will terminate at platforms or stories, where it will be necessary to change cars. The cable required for each series of elevators will be not less than 250 feet long, or equal to the length required for a fair-sized skyscraper.

The company planning this gigantic enterprise have also under contemplation a scheme of amusements to be located on the several different floors, and they propose making the tower a veritable exposition in itself. When it is realized that today seventeen years after the Eiffel masterpiece of engineering was reared, it is still a profitable investment, it will be imagined what interest will be created by this loftier structure.

Hon Albert G. Tuxhorn, one of the Illinois Commissioners to the Exposition, said after visiting Norfolk that in his opinion the 1907 celebration would do more towards uniting the two sections of the country than any event or combination of events has been able to accomplish. In this sentiment his fellow commissioners seemed heartily to concur. Mr. Tuxhorn's expression was very gratifying to the exposition officials, who have all along contended that such would be the outcome of the celebration.

WATCH SOLUTION.

The Progress From the Time of the First Portable Timepiece.

Peter Henlein of Nuremberg, in Germany, about 1500, is now generally credited with the invention of the portable watch. The earliest watches were naturally rather crude. This is shown by the few specimens still in existence. They were circular in shape, not oval or egg shaped, and entirely made of iron. In place of the round balance was a straight one, called foliot. Like almost all watches up to the year 1790, they were provided with the verge escapement. The hairspring is absent. It was not invented till 150 years later. In order to obtain a tolerably uniform rate an upright hog's bristle was used, against which the foliot strikes. The uneven traction of the spring they endeavored to prevent by means of a brake. Great accuracy was not aimed at, which is shown by the fact that the oldest watches with very few exceptions up to about the year 1700 indicated only the hours, the minute hand being entirely absent.

While the first watches were rather crude, there appeared only twenty or thirty years after their invention works that are termed almost technically perfect. The iron plates and wheels had given place to finely gilt brass ones. The pinions were of steel and polished, the cocks artistically engraved and the pillars neatly turned. Greater precision was obtained when, about the year 1660, the hairspring was invented by Dr. Hooke and also, but entirely independent of the latter, by Huyghens. This opened the way for the introduction of the minute hand, which is found quite generally around the year 1700. Some of the oldest watches were already furnished with a striking mechanism. About the year 1600 watches with alarms were made, and in 1691 Barlowe, an Englishman, introduced the repeating watch.

Toward the year 1800 there was made for the first time the second hand in watches. The cylinder escapement is known to be quite old, for it was originated as far back as 1710, but was not generally adopted until about 1840. The lever escapement, the one used in the majority of American watches of the present time, was invented about 1765 by Thomas Mudge.

Snakes and Eating.

Snakes in menageries often fast many months. Cases were recorded at the Paris museum of a rattle-snake which refused food twenty-six months and a python which fasted twenty-nine months. But the record belongs to a Japanese python which arrived in Paris in November, 1899. It died in April, 1902, after having refused food for two years, five months and three days. During that time its weight had decreased from seventy-five kilograms to twenty-seven.
