BUILDING AND LOAN.

Home Association Organized With 781 Shares.

Greenville did herself proud Monday night in the organization of a building and loan association. The meeting in the mayor's office Monday night was attended by the largest and most representative gathering of business men of the town that we have ever seen come together, and the interest they took in the organization was most gratifying. Let this interest be carried on and Greenville will show one of the best working building and loan associations in the state.

The meeting was temporarily organized by the selection of H. W. Whedbee as chairman and D. J. Whichard secretary. Chairman Whedbee stated that the first business should be filling out the application for a charter, which should begin with the selection of a name for the association.

Four names were suggested—Greenville, Home, Pitt County and Tar River. A vote was taken, a majority favoring the name Home Building and Loan Association. It was also decided that the operations of the association shall embrace Greenville township. The shares were designated to be \$100 each, the minimum with which business should begin being placed at 500 shares and the maximum number to be in existence at any one time not to exceed 10,000 shares and the maximum number in any single series at 1,000 shares.

It was decided that twelve directors be elected to manage the association. The first seven of these were elected by acclamation one at the time, the remaining five by ballot. These were D. J. Whichard, B. W. Moseley, H. A. White, R. J. Cobb, R. O. Jeffress, H. W. Whedbee, G. S. Prichard, D. C. Moore, C. T. Munford, R. C. Flanagan, C. O'H. Laughinghouse and S. T. White.

H. A. White was elected president of the association, and the secretary and treasurer will be elected by the directors.

A count of the shares showed that 781 had been subscribed for, and it is believed the number will easily increased to 1,000 before business is begun with the first series on the first of May.

Application for charter will be made at once and arrangements made for beginning business May 1st.

A Called Meeting.

The Daughters of the Confederacy will have a called meeting tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock at the residence of Mrs. John L. Wooten. Business of importance requires the presence of every member.

Authorized to Begin.

The Comptroller of the Currency has authorized the National Bank of Greenville to begin business, every requirement of the law having been complied with. This bank, which has \$50,000 capital, will begin business on the 16th. Advertisement appears in this issue.

HUNTING WITH A LEOPARD.

How the Swiftest Animal on Earth Goes After His Prey.

Four miles beyond the palace gates of Jaipur you may see a cheetah hunt. Now and again in the noonday heat you may have seen a leopard crouching along beside his master—querulous, uncertain, half timid, heavily hooded with blue silk, and finding the trimmed stone of the pavement maddening hot beneath his silent pads. But it is a different animal when at last, after a tedious stalk of a herd of black buck, the leopard is unhooded from the whining bullock cart and left to his own work.

In all the world there is little left so savage and so beautiful as this steel springed cat when he scents his quarry. In a flash he has dropped to the plain, belly flat upon the hot stones, while he works his way to a ten inch patch of sagebrush, all elbows and seemingly but four inches above the ground. You may see the trail of him as he goes. From one bush he makes for another or a fold of ground. One watches him with a touch of his own silence, though the little caravan of bullock carts must still be kept moving lest their stopping should alarm the buck.

So it goes on, this yellow demon edging himself nearer and nearer to his chosen prey till, while fifty yards away yet, the buck raises his head. Whether he temporizes his danger at once or not, there is no chance of stalking him a yard farther, and the cheetah makes his dash. There is not a sound on either side. Two of the fastest animals on earth—the cheetah is beyond all question the swiftest—engage in a life and death race. It is soon over, for if the cheetah does not bring his prey down in 250 yards he throws up the chase and returns ignominiously to his master. If he catches the buck there is another final of jetting life-blood and convulsive limbs and glassing eyes, interfered with by the cheetah's master, who brings a huge wooden spoon filled with blood and entrails, which he forcibly substitutes for the buck itself under the still sucking muzzle of the sated leopard. But whether he catch it or not the cheetah's flight over the ground for 200 yards is a thing that is worth going to Jaipur to see.—Jaipur Letter in London Telegraph.

The fact that you are twenty-one years old and possess every other electoral requirement, will cut no figure in the next election if your poll tax is not paid the first of May.

Every vacant lot we see reminds us how much better it would look with a building on it. The building and loan association will ere long have homes occupying these lots.

Between Greensboro and High Point must be considered a good field for a trolley line, that three different companies are trying to occupy it. Why not one of them build there and the other two go elsewhere? That would insure more money for the promoters.

Those who were waiting for the organization of the building and loan association to take shares should now come on with their names. Only one thousand shares will be taken in the first series and those who are too late will have to wait for another series to open.

Push up the day electric current. Mr Superintendent and Commissioners Greenville needs it to develop small enterprises and give them a chance to operate. Every new enterprise secured or enlarged adds that much more to the prosperity of the town. Bring on the day current.

If Greenville had a chamber of commerce or business men's association that took as much interest in matters as was shown in the organization of the building and loan association, what an incentive it would be to the rapid development of the town. There is already a Retail Merchants' Association, but its membership is composed of so small a per cent of the business men of the town that it seldom has a meeting and accomplishes but little. The town should have some organization that will bring all business interests together and all work in harmony for advancement.

WHAT IS A "GENTLEMAN"?
