BUILDING AND LOAN.

Directors Meet and Complete Organization.

The directors of The Home Building and Loan Association met Thursday night at the office of the president, H. A. White, and completed the organization.

G. S. Prichard was elected vice-president, H. W. Whedbee attorney, and S. C. Wooten secretary and treasurer.

The salary of the secretary and treasurer was made \$16.66 per month for the present and his bond placed at \$2,000, the association to pay premium on the bond.

The attorney's fees were placed at \$5 for legal services where a loan of \$1,000 or less is made, and \$10 for loans above \$1,000.

A committee consisting of H. W. Whedbee, R. J. Cobb and D. J. Whichard was appointed to prepare the constitution and by laws for the government of the association and submit them to the board of directors.

Saturday the 5th day of May was named as the day for beginning the first series of shares. On that day a membership fee of 25 cents per share and the first weekly installment of 25 cents per share will be payable to the secretary and treasurer.

The first series cannot exceed 1,000 shares, but there is yet opportunity for those who want to join this series, as the shares are not quite all subscribed for.

The Fancy Skater.

There was a large crowd at the Center Brick warehouse rink, Thursday night, to witness the exhibition in fancy skating by Prof. Aginton, of Richmond. He is a wonder on roller skates and some of the feats were truly marvelous. His closing figure of spinning around like a top in a small circle was the most wonderful of all. He was generously applauded.

Skating Race.

Prichard's stemmery will be open free to skaters on Monday night, and on Tuesday night there will be a race to which an admission charge of 10 cents will be made. In this race there will be a fast skater who all the other skaters will try to catch, the one catching the runner two out of three times getting a prize. A large number of electric lights have been placed in the stemmery and the skating room will be brilliant.

FOR A LARGE CROP OF TOBACCO.

The present crop of tobacco, or the crop which has just about been marketed will foot up in North Carolina about eighty-five million pounds. This of course is not a large crop. On the other hand it foots up short in pounds. The crop last year was not a large one. If seasons should be favorable for a good acreage yield next tobacco year, the crop can run from one hundred to perhaps one hundred and twenty millions. This is an exceedingly liberal estimate, and only under the most favorable conditions can such a yield be obtained. With a yield of one hundred and twenty million pounds in North Carolina, the crop would not be an abnormal one. South Carolina will not increase her acreage nor will eastern North Carolina nor Virginia. The present satisfactory prices may stimulate tobacco planters in the old belts, to plant all they can take care of, but labor conditions will prevent over planting in these sections.

We believe that tobacco will sell well next year. There is no reason why it should not. The average price is very good these days, but we contend that, certain grades are yet too low. Tobacco under existing conditions, which conditions will not be materially changed in the future should average not less than ten cents. Twelve and a half cents would be better. The weed is scarce, comparatively speaking. It is growing scarcer as the days go by. The consumption is rapidly growing. Everything else is high in prices, why not tobacco? We venture to say that prices will be satisfactory next season.—Southern Tobacco Journal.

Opera House Tonight.

The Herald Square Opera Company arrived this morning from Kinston where they gave a performance last night. They appear in Masonic temple opera house tonight, and the advance seat sale has been large.

University Catalogue.

We have received the catalogue of the University of North Carolina for the session 1905-6. It shows an attendance of 680 students. The faculty numbers 71. The University now comprises the following departments: Collegiate, Graduate, Applied Sciences, including Engineering, Law, Medicine, and Pharmacy. The additions to its equipment in the past five years amount to \$300,000. The University has grown steadily in strength and influence and stands today for all that is best and highest in education and training for useful manhood. The Summer School for Law opens June 13th. The next session opens September 10th, 1906.

OVER THE STATE.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Several colored people of Durham have organized a rescue home for the fallen women of their race.

Wilmington, N. C., April 12.—The seventeenth annual Grand Council of the Royal Arcanum adjourned today to meet next year in Raleigh April 10th and 11th.

Capt. J. G. Morrison, aide-de-camp and last surviving member Gen. Stonewall Jackson's staff, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Stonewall Jackson, in Charlotte Wednesday night.

A freight train loaded with cabbage was wrecked on the Atlantic Coast Line near Smithfield, Wednesday. Seventeen cars were demolished and there was a scattering of cabbage.

An incendiary fire destroyed the feed barn of Sheriff G. B. McLead, near Lumberton. Nineteen bales of cotton, several tons of fertilizer, a lot of feed and four mules were burned. The loss is \$5,000 with only \$500 insurance.

Wilmington, N. C., April 12.—The body of a young man, J. M. Sherman, a grocer of this city, who mysteriously disappeared from his place of business last Friday, was found late this afternoon by the side of a creek seven miles above Wilmington, on the A. and Y. road by two fishermen who were attracted to the scene by odors arising from the dead body.

Littleton, N. C., April 12.—While a little friend of Robert, the ten-year-old son of Jno. B. Patterson, of this city, was trying to push a cartridge into a rifle the weapon went off, sending a bullet through Robert's thigh. The gritty youngster walked home, a distance of about half a mile, and Dr. Picot was summoned to attend him. There is no immediate danger, and it is hoped that young Robert may soon recover.

The residence and all of the furniture but an organ, bureau and two chairs belonging to Mr. J. F. Horner, who lives three miles from the city, was burned this afternoon, entailing a loss of about \$3,000, with insurance of \$700 on the house and \$1,225 on the furniture. The fire was caused by a spark from the kitchen chimney falling on the roof and the whole roof was in flames before the ladies who were alone in the house knew it.—Kinston Free Press. 12th.

Senators Direct Vote.

Washington, April 12.—A resolution providing for the election of Senators by direct vote of the people has been favorably acted upon by the House Committee on Election of President. The resolution which was introduced by Mr. Norris, of Nebraska, makes the term of members of the House four years instead of two. Both propositions are to be accomplished by amendments to the Constitution.

Reasons why the term of members should be four years are stated to be because no party can inaugurate its policy in two years.

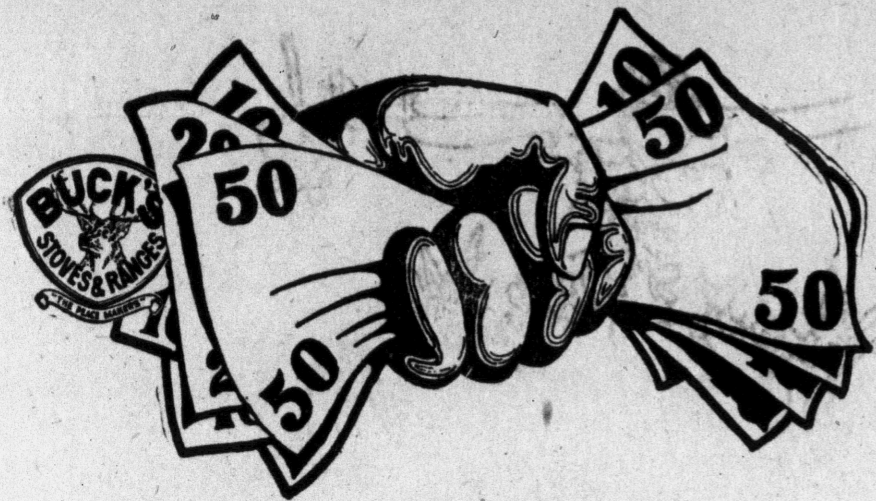

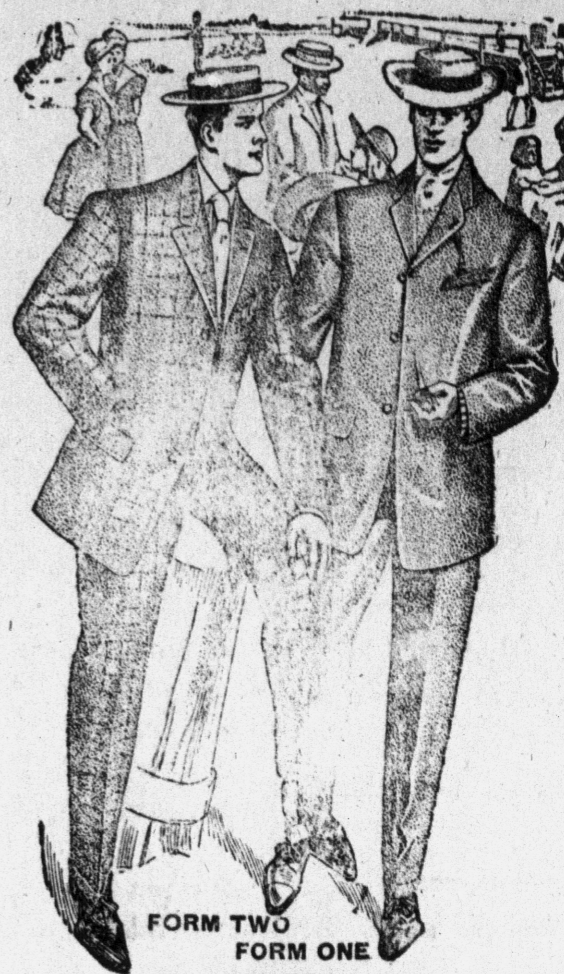

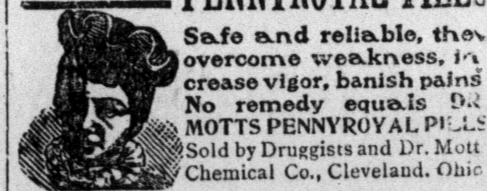

To Bake Fish.

In baking fish use a special dripping pan. Place three or four thin slices of salt pork or bacon in the bottom of the pan, lay the fish on top, with or without dressing; cut gashes across the fish at inch intervals, and put into these tiny strips of fat pork. Dust with salt, pepper and flour. Lay thin slices of pork or bacon on to the fish, or simply brush with pork drippings, olive oil or butter. Pour in a cupful of boiling water, cover closely and bake in a hot oven, basting often. Allow about fifteen minutes to each pound of fish. When done lift carefully on to a hot platter, garnish with thin slices of lemon and parsley and serve with hollandaise or sauce tartare.

Removing Stains.

For grass stains rub the spot with molasses and the stains will come out in the ordinary process of washing.

Iron rust may be removed by rubbing oxalis (sheep sorrel) over the rusty places and then washing in alcohol, which will remove grass stains, and finish by a good scrubbing in warm soapsuds.

Stains of fruits, vegetables, meats and drinks on table linen may be removed by persistently rubbing the spot in sweet milk.

Cleaning Gold Braid.

Gold braid that is only slightly discolored may be cleaned by treating it with a soft brush dipped in fine whiting, calcined magnesia or fuller's earth. If badly spotted and blotched the stains may be removed by carefully brushing with a brush dipped in a warm solution of potassium cyanide—one dram to one-half pint of water—then in clean warm water. If the braid is of a poor quality all attempts at cleaning will only make its appearance worse.

Spots on Wall Paper.

To remove grease spots from wall paper or any colored material a capital plan is to mix fuller's earth to a paste (about the consistency of rather thick mustard) with water and ammonia, leaving the paste to dry for twenty-four hours or so. When dry it will brush off and should have absorbed all the ugly spots. Sometimes, however, a second application is necessary.
