## DESTRUCTION OF SAN FRANCISCO.

### Former Pitt Countian Writes of the Terrible Earthquake.

Oreville, Cal., April 24, 1906.

#### EDITOR REFLECTOR:

San Francisco, the beautiful city by the Golden Gate is no more. At 5:15 Wednesday morning the populace were awakened from their slumbers by a terrible earthquake. Upon rushing to the street they found a number of their finest buildings crumbled to the earth by the terrible shock and a number of others ablaze from dome to cellar as a result of the bursting and igniting of gas pipes. At this writing the fire is under control and where there was once beautiful homes and fine business houses you will find nothing but a mass of ruins. In fact there is not a structure left on Market street, which was the main thoroughfare of the city. The entire city is gone and will have to be rebuilt from her ashes.

Homeless women and children are leaving the ruined city by the hundreds and thousands. Two days ago there was a great scarcity of water and food supplies. Bread sold for 60 cents a loaf and water at an enormous price. There is no danger of a food famine as first predicted, as sympathizing cities are rushing train loads of provisions into the ruined city to feed the hungry as fast as steam can carry them.

It is yet impossible to ascertain the number of dead but the number of homeless will easily reach the 100,000 mark.

All the newspapers, including the Call, Chronicle, Examiner and Bulletin are out of business and the people at large are dependent on the Sacramento papers for news of terrible disaster which are doing a vast business. Of all the newspaper buildings and other fine structures, the U. S. Mint alone was able to withstand the fire and earthquake.

San Jose, Napa, San Rosa, Hollister, Salinas and a number of smaller villages were all destroyed, or partly destroyed by the quake. Between Salinas and Monterey Bay there is a lake of hot water covering twenty acres of ground where there was never water before. The loss is great and one that it will take California a long time to over.

Since leaving Greenville nearly five years ago I have resided in Frisco, a good portion of the time but at present am residing in Oreville, Cal., a little way distant. The shock here was very slight.

## SERMON TO RED MEN.

### Large Attendance at Baptist Church.

On Sunday morning in the Memorial Baptist church Rev. J. E. Ayscue preached a sermon to the Improved Order of Red Men. It was an occasion that made a strong impression on all who were present and left an influence for good.

It was the best representation has been made by an order here, there being considerably more than a hundred of them. The members met at the wigwam of Withlacooche Tribe and marched in a body to the church. It was a splendid company of representative men, and showed the remarkable growth of the order in this community. Since the Red Men organized here a few years ago the growth in membership has been rapid, and several other tribes have been instituted in various sections of the county. Representatives from Falkland, Farmville, Grimesland, Ormondville and Winterville joined with the local wigwam in the services of Sunday.

The sermon of Rev. Mr. Ayscue was an able one and in perfect appropriateness with such an occasion. He began his sermon with brief reference to the three cardinal principles of the order of Red Men—freedom, friendship, charity—and said that as both freedom and charity were the outgrowth of friendship and could not exist without it, he had selected for his theme "True Friendship" and used as a text Prov. 17:17 "A friend loveth at all times." He discussed the subject under four divisions—the joy of friendship, the blessedness of friendship, the constancy of friendship, the greatest of all friendship—"for there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother."

It was a masterly sermon, beautiful in thought and forceful in expression. It gave the Red Men a keener conception and stronger attachment for the great principles of their order and bound them stronger in ties of friendship. The sermon was equally impressive upon all others in the large congregation, all listening intently and drinking in the beautiful thoughts of true friendship.

#### THE ROYAL NUN.

Should the queen mother of Spain carry out her rumored intention of entering a convent after her son's marriage she would have a precedent in the step taken some years ago by the ex-queen of a neighboring country. The widow of ex-King Miguel of Portugal, Princess Adelaide of Loenstein-Wertheim-Rosenberg, who has been a widow for nearly forty years—her husband sat on the Portuguese throne for barely six—became a Benedictine nun at Solesmes, in France, in 1897. The community of which she is a member became the tenant on the recent expulsion of the order from France of Northwood, Isle of Wight. Since her advent to England the royal nun has received visits from King Edward and several members of the royal family.

#### The Green Flash of Sunset.

One of the most rarely witnessed of natural phenomena, but one that has often been discussed in scientific journals and that always awakens wonder when seen, is the so called "green flash" occasionally visible at the moment of the disappearance of the sun behind a clear horizon. The observer's eye must be fixed upon the rim of the sun as it disappears in order to catch the phenomenon. An officer of the British navy says that he has seen the green flash, although rarely, at the instant of the setting of a bright star. Among the explanations offered is one based upon the optical principle of complementary colors. If one looks at the sun and then closes the eyes a green disk will be perceived. A sensitive eye might be similarly affected by a brilliant star.

#### Asbestos and Its Uses.

Asbestos was first mined about a hundred years ago, chiefly as interesting to the geologist and mineralogist, and of little or no commercial value. About 1868 it was first used commercially in the manufacture of roofing felt and cement. Early attempts to spin this fiber were unsuccessful, but the difficulties have now been overcome, so that a single asbestos thread weighing not more than one ounce per 100 yards, which has a pretty fair strength, may be made.

Asbestos ropes for fire departments are made entirely of asbestos or asbestos with a core of steel. With the steel wire core a three-quarter inch rope carries nearly 2,000 pounds.—Chicago Journal.

#### The Largest Picture.

Roussel Geo has completed what is said to be the largest picture ever painted. The area of the canvas is 807 square feet. The artist had to beg the loan of a studio of suitable size from the state, and he and his easels, some twenty feet high, were accommodated in the Gallerie des Machines, the largest one spanned building in the world. The picture represents the Paris crowd in 1789 rushing to the Hotel de Ville, led by Lafayette, after the taking of the Bastille, and contains more than 1,000 life size figures. It will be hung in a suburban town hall, that of Ivory.

The mediaeval law demanded that every feudal count and baron in the kingdom on the death of the king of Denmark shall provide as a tribute to the new king a good steed and a man in steel armor or in default must pay their equivalent in gold. The Danish government has already reminded the counts and barons that this tax is due. Many are inclined to think that the government's estimate of the value of an armored warrior at from \$350 to \$450 is too high.

### A Peculiar Coincidence.

"I am an innocent man. You are sentencing me to a living grave. I only hope that I may live to see those who have wronged me in the grave of death." So spoke Tinner Jackson when he was sentenced by Judge C. S. Johnson of Skaguay, Alaska, several months ago to ten years for manslaughter. On the same day recently President Roosevelt pardoned Jackson and Judge Johnson died.

### Another Yangle in Spelling.

The London chamber of commerce has included Esperanto, the proposed universal language, in the subjects upon which candidates for commercial education must be examined. When the scheme for spelling reform is put through and gets mixed up with Esperanto there is bound to be a killing collision somewhere.—Pittsburg Times.

### To Keep Bread Freshly

In Swiss and German farmhouses, where the baking takes place once a fortnight or certainly at fairly long intervals, such a thing as unpleasantly stale bread is almost unknown. It is put away in a peculiar manner, which tends to preserve its freshness. Sprinkle flour freely into an empty flour sack, and into this pack the loaves, being careful to have the top crusts of two loaves touching. Where they have to lie bottom to bottom sprinkle flour between them. Tie up the sack and hang it up in an airy place—not against a wall, but so that it can swing. The day before the loaf is wanted take it out, brush off the flour and stand it in the cellar overnight. In this way bread remains edible for three or four weeks.

NO REFLECTION ON BETHEL.

The remark has been made that Bethel is getting more notoriety out of the whitecapping case than the town should have, and that some persons not fully acquainted with the circumstances are disposed to look with discredit upon that community and regard it as surrounded by bad influences. Such an opinion is unjust and not warranted by the facts. Bethel contains as good people as are to be found, and they are as law abiding as any. It was out of this law abiding spirit and desire of the better class of citizens to break up illegal traffic in whiskey, that this last trouble has grown. Because good men whose word could be relied upon were witnesses in these matters, those whose illegal and disreputable business was effected sought revenge through still further crime.

While two instances of whitecapping have occurred in which both the victims were citizens of Bethel township residing about three miles from that town, developments so far show that those engaged in this whitecapping were from other sections of the county. Not one of those so far arrested on the charge of implication in this crime is a citizen of Bethel township. Because the whitecapping occurred in Bethel township the people of that community, out of the regard for the safety and sacredness of their homes, naturally feel indignant and want to see those guilty of such outrages dealt with as the law directs, and this feeling should be shared by every law abiding citizen of the county regardless of section.

From comments The Reflector hears, Mr. Long will get the vote of Pitt county in the convention on this platform.

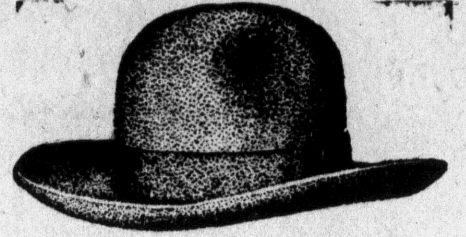
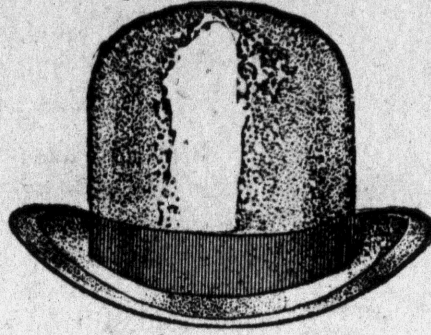
## MILLIONS IN FARM MORTGAGES

Western farmers have grown rather peculiar about their indebtedness. One of the common requirements of the modern mortgage is that the mortgagee shall accept any portion of the principal at the time of any interest payment. This means that the harvesting of a good wheat crop, or the fortunate sale of a bunch of cattle, may wipe out the debt and the loan agent must find another borrower. However, one insurance company has \$40,000,000 in Western farm-mortgage loans, and the interest thereon is sufficient to pay all its death losses. Another company has \$20,000,000 in these loans, scattered over the Mississippi Valley. The larger sums are in Illinois, with about \$28,600,000; Minnesota, with \$16,000,000; Missouri, \$11,000,000; Iowa, \$10,700,000; Ohio, \$8,000,000, and lesser amounts in a dozen other States. It places approximately 4,000 farm-mortgage loans every year, and has in its history loaned \$250,000,000 in this way, practically no loss. A report in the Annals of Science gives the amount of mortgages held by the life insurance companies at \$490,632,508, or 27.7 per cent. of the companies' assets. This, however, includes loans on city property as well as those on farms. The percentage is second only to that invested in bonds, indicating the partiality for this form of investment by the most conservative of investors.

The insurance-company loan is safeguarded in every possible way. The interrogatories of the application cover four large pages, and include everything from the size of the borrower's family to the use he proposes to make of the money. They even inquire into his habits and his standing in the community; for the well-informed investor realizes that the best part of his security is the personality of the borrower.

Thus, it happens that the insurance companies have few foreclosures and practically no losses on this class of investments. Of recent years the value of land has increased so rapidly that every loan, made, as these investments are, on a basis of 40 per cent. of real value, became "gilt-edged," and was the best possible security. **CHEWING COFFEE.**

**A Pernicious Habit That is Liable to Ruin the Health.**

Physicians claim that the habit of tobacco-chewing is dying out, but as insidious a habit has come to take its place. This is coffee chewing, which is a very bad thing for the health, for it creates nervousness, makes the skin yellow, blackens the teeth and diminishes the appetite.

The habit seems to have originated in the coffee roasting establishments. When visiting one of these plants one sees nearly all the men taking coffee grains from a little pouch which is sewed on the front of their jumpers. Every little while they take a half dozen or more grains from it and chew them with great relish. The women who work there are addicted to the same habit.

A specialist of Philadelphia has made a study of the coffee chewing habit and says: "It is a habit easily contracted, for the taste of the crisp, roasted berries is not unpleasant, and the exhilaration, the stimulus, that the berries give is quite as marked as that which would be obtained from a glass or two of beer or from a drink of whisky."

"It is this exhilaration, I am convinced, that causes the habit to be formed and that makes it a hard habit to break away from. It should be broken away from. Its effects are highly injurious. They are more injurious than those of tobacco-chewing."

"The coffee chewing habit wrecks the nerves, it makes the skin sallow and it destroys the appetite. I have had occasion to treat a number of men for it. I always advise such men to break off by imperceptible degrees—to give three or four months to the task. Some succeed and some do not. Men who work in coffee plants find it almost impossible to succeed."

Coffee experts seem to be the only employees connected with the coffee trade who have not this habit, for if they had their sense of taste would be dulled. The experts, by smell only or by taste only, distinguish without the slightest difficulty or uncertainty between the Arabian, the Javanese, the Guatemalan, the Costa Rican, the Bogotan and a dozen other coffees. They could not do this if they were coffee chewers.  
—New York Herald.

**He Took the Hint.**

A clever if somewhat sharp-tongued West Philadelphia girl has finally succeeded in discouraging the attentions of a young man whose intentions may have been matrimonial and whom she did not care to consider because of his fondness for intoxicating liquor. It had not got to a point of rejecting his proffered offer, so she was unable to tell him in kind but explicit language that she could never share his heart with the corner saloon. But the opportunity came the other night, when, being alone with him, she had stirred his emotions by her playing on the piano. "Why," he asked when she would play no more, "do I have such a passion for the music you make?" The girl paused, as if considering. "Perhaps it's because it's so full of bars," she said, and the man has not been back since.—Philadelphia Record.

**Largest Loaves in the World.**

The largest loaves of bread baked in the world are those of France and Italy. The "pipe" bread of Italy is baked in loaves two or three feet long, while in France the loaves are made in the shape of very long rolls four or five feet in length and in many cases even six feet. The bread of Paris is distributed almost exclusively by women, who go to the various bakehouses at 5:30 a. m. and spend about an hour polishing up the loaves. After the loaves are thoroughly cleaned of dust and grit the "bread porter" proceeds on the round of her customers. Those who live in apartments or flats find their loaves leaning against the door.

## LOVE AND PERSONALITY.

Goethe's Gretchen, the little bourgeoisie, without apparent attractiveness, yet inspiring his mighty genius—what is this mystery of man and woman? The beauty of nations differs very much. The Latins are less beautiful than the Anglo-Saxons. The angularity of the north German woman is notorious—an uncharming person. Why? It has nothing whatever to do with race. The growth of the Hanseatic cities brought great wealth in north Germany. Money bags married money bags. The result was a people of severely plain aspect. There are not many money bags in America, although there are many money bags in the hands of the few.

The Americans are a beautiful race. The American is insulted if mention of dowry is made in his wedding arrangements. He marries because he loves the woman and she him; hence the American people have become exceedingly beautiful. Then the facilities for divorce presented in the United States are an important factor in the beautification process. Love is really at the bottom of it all—not money bags or race, but love.

The French are always talking about "l'amour, l'amour!" But really there is no "amour" there at all—people generally talk most about what they haven't got or don't know. Yes, indeed, so rare is "l'amour" in France that it accounts for the decline in facial beauty of the Frenchwoman—not in movement, for in movement she excels the world, but in face. Rome and Greece were ruined by treating marriage as a matter of business.—Dr. Emil Reich in a London Lecture.

### Mexican Water Jars.

The Mexicans do not use ice, but nevertheless there is no country where a man can get a glass of cool, sweet water quicker than in Mexico. The water jars are made of a porous pottery which allows the water to ooze through the material of the tanks, and the evaporation keeps it always cool. It is not cold, like our ice water, but it is all the better on that account, as a man can drink twice as much and never feel in the least injured, no matter how large his drafts. Australian ranchmen frequently put water into skin bottles which they suspend from the veranda, and the air swaying the skins back and forth cools the water and renders it more palatable.

### Insects and Cold.

Insects which spend the major portion of their lives in a torpid or semitorpid state are but seldom injured and never killed by being frozen. Instances are numerous of travelers in mountain regions finding beetles or butterflies above the snow line which were frozen stiff and apparently stone dead. However, when these same insects were carried down into the warmer atmosphere of the valleys or into a mountaineer's cabin they completely revived in a very short while. It appears that their normal vital powers are so low that a degree of cold that would prove fatal to a more highly organized creature seldom hurts them.
