## MAKE YOUR OWN BOXES

### Privilege Granted to Rural Route Patrons.

A copy of the Daily Bulletin sent out to the postmasters all over the country from Washington contains an important piece of information to rural route patrons.

The new order is to the effect that people in the country receiving the rural service can make their own letter boxes hereafter if they desire.

There is only one proviso attached and that is that they must submit a plan of the box, with a list of materials to be used, and these must be in accordance with a former order of the department as to general plans, and varieties of material that will be acceptable to the postoffice authorities.

The new order also grants the privilege to those who wish, to make boxes for rural routes, if they are submitted to a first or second class postmaster, or approved by the superintendent of the division, and that if the design is accepted, the words "Approved by the Postal Department" or something similar, prescribed by the department must be painted on such boxes.

The new rule will likely be taken advantage of by many people in the country who want to make their own boxes, provided they have the required sorts of material.

### Horse Commits Suicide.

Mr. Frank C. Arant, who runs a grocery store at 1200 South Tyrone street, owned a horse named Bill. Yesterday afternoon some friends called to take Mr. Arant to ride in an automobile. Bill looked over the fence at the parting, puffing machine, and after his master had gone out of sight, fell into a deep study. A fit of acute melancholia took possession of him. He saw his finish. After having deliberated on the past and forecasted the future he decided to end his life in some way. Therefore, he jumped over the back fence, strolled down to the railroad track, along the south side of the Pipe Foundry, and took his stand to await a train. There was no train in sight. Bill looked first one way and then the other, but not a whiff of smoke could he see. But, having plenty of time, he waited. In the meantime he forgot his purpose and fell to eating grass at the end of an empty box car. Some time later a fast freight came from toward Pineville and, in passing the foundry, blew a loud blast. Old Bill became frightened, jumped on the track and was killed instantly. That was the last of a good horse. His mangled remains were dragged 100 yards up the track and tossed off like so much rubbish.—Charlotte Observer.

## DESPERATE PASSENGER KILLED

### Tragedy on Sunday Excursion.

Fayetteville, July 8.—An unusual tragedy was enacted on an excursion train between Wilmington and Stedman, this county, at an early hour this morning, in which a man named Elliston, from Auryville, was shot and instantly killed by a Mr. Bledsoe, a citizen of Stedman.

The train, crowded with passengers, who had enjoyed a day's outing on the coast, was passing between Roseboro and Auryville in Sampson county. Rising in a crowded coach, and displaying a revolver in each hand, Elliston, who was the worse for drink, announced that he was going to kill everybody in the car.

"That you won't," exclaimed Bledsoe, who sprang to his feet, pistol in hand, and taking deliberate aim, fired. The bullet struck Elliston in the forehead, killing him instantly.

At Auryville Bledsoe gave himself up to Sampson county authorities. The dead man still grasped his revolvers, each with every chamber loaded, and near him was a jug of whiskey.

Others still do not wish to offend their wife's kin, the members of their church or lodge, or a powerful interest that might otherwise throw a crumb in their direction. Therefore they sit idly by while the forces of Evil and Wrong march to victory. They deplore it but pipe out, "I couldn't help it. I didn't want to make any enemies."

But the men who have civic courage increase and in every contest when they are aroused they win. Wrong and Evil cannot stand before Right and Good in the open field. The duty of every good man is as much to make sacrifice for good government as to refrain from personal wrong-doing. If he shrinks from making himself felt in a cause that means better things, he cannot evade responsibility for the evils that corrupt society and threaten his own home.—Raleigh News and Observer.

So long as a nation can purge itself, it has nothing to fear. And when it can do this in the midst of its greatest prosperity it is beyond question in a state of health.

We hope the good work will go on until the colossal pension and tariff frauds have been ventilated; and we expect that it will.—Biblical Recorder.

### ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Importance of Teaching Children Table Manners.

Parents even in a humble cottage home should pay attention to the conduct and manners of their children at mealtime. They cannot tell what position they will fill in after life, and a man or woman who is ignorant of the most simple laws of table etiquette is terribly handicapped. Were the parents to reprove the child who conveys its food to its mouth with a knife, who drinks its tea from the saucer or who sticks its elbows out at right angles the lesson so taught would never be forgotten. There is a certain amount of freedom at the family table, where one scarcely expects to find the ceremonious deportment of a set dinner party, but even in the home there are minor rules and observances which should always be followed, says Woman's Life.

### Almond Macaroons.

Half a pound of sweet almonds, a coffee cup full of white sugar and the whites of two eggs; blanch the almonds and pound them to a paste, add to them the sugar and the beaten whites of the eggs, work the whole together with the back of a spoon, then roll the mixture in your hands in balls about the size of a nutmeg; dust sugar over the top and lay them on a sheet of paper at least an inch apart; bake in a cool oven a light brown.

### To Darken Floors.

Put into a bottle two tablespoonfuls each of linseed oil and good vinegar and one teaspoonful of spirits of turpentine (naturally the quantities may be increased, though the proportions must be kept), cork this up and shake it well to mix. Wash the floor thoroughly with hot soap and water, then while the boards are still warm, though fairly dry, apply the polish, shaking the bottle well before each application, rubbing it well in.

### Yellowed Clothes.

Soak the clothes overnight in lukewarm water and next morning wash in good clean suds; then put them in the wash boiler with cold water and some pieces of white curd soap and a teaspoonful of powdered borax. Boil for twenty minutes, rinse immediately and leave them for another night in clean cold water to which a little powdered borax has been added.

### To Cleanse Chamois.

It is not generally known that to cleanse a chamois leather for plate cleaning or any other polishing purpose "the best way" is to wash it in lukewarm soapy water and to leave plenty of soap in the last rinsing water. This makes the wash leather as soft and pliable as when new. To rinse all soap out will make it hard and dry. Dry in the open air if possible.

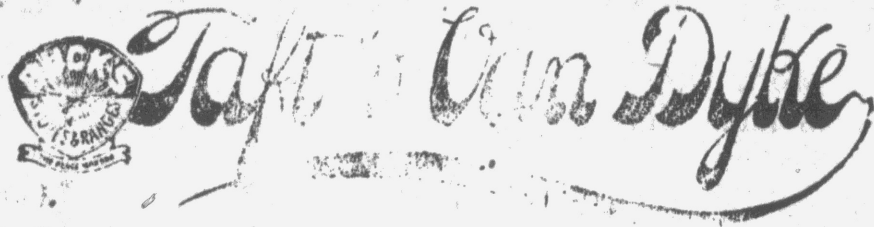
