## THE FEE SYSTEM

### County Officers on Salary.

The fee system so far as it relates to county officers in Guilford will be a back number the first Monday in next December. After that date the county officers will receive salaries and all fees appertaining to their offices will be turned over to the county treasurer. The innovation will not make a great deal of difference to the officers affected, and as to those who will assume the duties of their offices for the first time when the law goes into effect, it will make no difference at all. The county treasurer will feel the effect of the change more than any other officer, perhaps, for his salary will be from \$500 to \$800 less than the compensation in fees which that officer now receives. The law making the change from the fee system to the salary system is known as the Gordon act. It was introduced in the house of representatives at the last session of the legislature by Dr. Gordon, who has been chosen by the Democratic primaries to serve another term in the house. It does not apply to any other county, although there are some counties which, like Guilford, have special acts of the legislature making a similar change as to their officers. Under the Gordon act the sheriff of Guilford will receive an annual salary of \$2,500. He will be allowed to have an office deputy with a salary of not less than \$600 a year, the amount to be fixed by the county commissioners. The sheriff will have authority to appoint a jailer who shall receive a salary of not less than \$70 a month. He may appoint one or more deputies in every township. The deputies shall serve court process and the like and shall receive the usual fees for their services. All other fees pertaining to the office of sheriff shall be collected by that officer and turned over to the county treasurer. The clerk of the Superior Court shall receive a salary of \$2,250 annually and shall have an allowance of \$1,000 a year for clerk hire and assistance. The same provision is made for the register of deeds as for clerk. The treasurer shall receive a salary of \$1,200 a year. All county officers shall make monthly settlements of fees collected by them, turning the same over to the county fund. The county commissioners may at any time require officers to make an exhibit of books and accounts. Failure of any officer to collect a fee or diminish a fee that should be collected by him is punishable as a misdemeanor—Greensboro Telegram.

## W. J. BRYAN'S FORTUNE.

The value of W. J. Bryan's possessions as fixed today by the county assessor for taxation, is \$73,225. This does not include \$76,000 in government bonds, in which the proceeds of his first book were invested and which are not assessable.  
In 1896 Mr. Bryan paid taxes on \$5,150 worth of property. His total taxes this year will approximate \$1,250.  
The home property at Fairview is assessed at \$24,250 and the adjoining tracts of land bring the farm up to \$40,025.  
Mr. Bryan's personalty is fixed at \$10,950. He reported \$3,000 cash. Other items on his personal list are sixteen head of cattle, \$6,800; hogs \$850; bees, \$585; corn, \$5; hay, \$10; jewelry, diamonds and silverware, \$500; household goods, \$3,000; firearms, \$150; watches, \$10; watches and clocks, \$300; carriages and wagons, \$700.  
Aside from this property Mr. Bryan owes The Commoner, which is on the assessment rolls at \$22,250.  
Mr. Bryan's six head of horses on the farm were returned at \$1,200 or \$200 apiece. C. W. Bryan, his agent, called on the county board to explain that this was too high, and it was cut to \$800.—Lincoln, Neb., dispatch in New York Sun.

## PREVIOUS RECORDS BROKEN.

It is stated that for the fiscal year ending June 30th 850,000 immigrants were landed at New York, breaking all records. The previous year 788,289 aliens passed through Ellis Island to make their home in this country. The total number of arrivals of immigrants at all ports in the United States during the fiscal year 1905 was 1,037,421. The previous high figure was in 1903, when the total number was 857,046. During 1905 275,639 immigrants came from Austria-Hungary. Italy dropped to second place for the first time in six years, the total from that country having been 221,479. Russia came third with 184,837, while Great Britain was fourth with 137,057. The Scandinavian countries contributed 60,625. Since 1820, or in eighty six years, the total number of immigrants arriving in this country has been approximately 34,000,000, including this year's figures. During 1905 the number entering through Ellis Island, New York, was 788,289. Boston admitted 65,111; Baltimore stood third with 62,314; Montreal, Canada, including border stations, stood fourth, having admitted 40,488; Philadelphia came next with 23,824; San Francisco admitted 6,955; Vancouver admitted 3,913 and all other United States ports admitted 36,577. The United States are becoming more and more attractive to the foreigners and all would be well if the undesirable classes could be kept out.—Charlotte Observer.

The Republican fight at Greensboro ended in a victory for Adams.

No doubt Butler feels in high feather that his end of the machine won in the fight over the chairmanship of the Republican state executive committee.

When R. D. Douglas, editor of the Industrial News, gets in the Greensboro post office to which he has been appointed, the draft may not be so heavy on the stockholders of the paper to keep it going.

Secretary of War Taft in his Greensboro speech told the North Carolina Republicans they were not fit to hold office. That is what most of the folks in the State already knew.

As might have been expected, Blackburn declined the challenge of Hackett for a joint canvass of the eighth district. It was a little more than Blackburn could face. But he was shrewd enough to try to place the responsibility for it on the "committee."

These extremely quiet and dull days around Greenville should be an object lesson to the people. If the town had several good factories with a large number of wage earners being paid off every week there would be brisk times all the year through. As long as the town depends mainly on trade arising from the cotton and tobacco crops, dull periods may be expected when none of these crops are being marketed. Factories are what the town needs to stimulate business at all seasons.

## HOW LITTLE SAVINGS ROLL UP.

If a parent deposits \$1 at the birth of a child and adds at each succeeding anniversary of the birthday a number of dollars equal to the number of years, the amount by the time the son or daughter is twenty-one years old, computed at 4 per cent interest, compounded semi-annually, will equal \$300. This would be a substantial nest egg to begin life with. The man who deposits only 25 cents a week, draws 4 per cent compounded semi-annually, will have to his credit at the end of five years \$71, at the end of ten years \$162, at the end of twenty years \$403 and at the end of forty years \$1,274. The man who saves \$5 a week at this rate would be worth at the end of forty years the snug fortune of \$25,888.—Leslie's Weekly.

This is one of the ways in which a building and loan association works such wonders. By small savings each week and putting it where it will draw interest, in a few years a home can be paid for or a good sum accumulated almost without realizing how easily it was done.

## France Supplants England as the World's Banker.

France is now playing the role of the world's banker; England lost her claim to the title when she went to war in South Africa. A generation ago, one had to go to London to feel the pulse of the international money-market. Today, one makes a better diagnosis in Paris.

The strides toward financial supremacy which France is making have been most rapid in the past five years. In that time French investors have taken up many million francs of foreign obligations. They furnished Great Britain with much of the capital that went to finance the Boer war; they loaned enormous amounts to Russia, practically supplying the money needed in the struggle against Japan; they provided Germany with \$1,000,000,000 marks in 1904-05 to carry on her tremendous industrial enterprises; they took a liberal amount of the last Japanese loan, over half of the Russian loan of last April, and finally, they supplied borrowers in the United States with fully \$150,000,000 during the tight-money period of last winter, and are now financing the bond and note issues of some of our greatest corporations.—From "France As an Investor," by Charles F. Speare, in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for July.

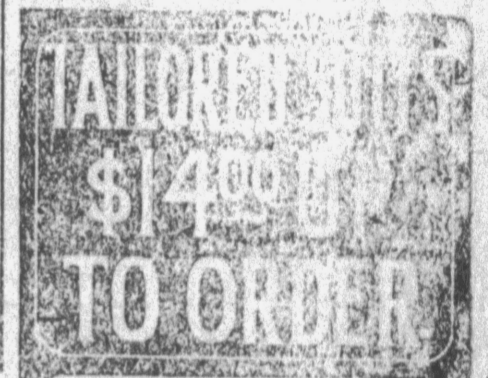

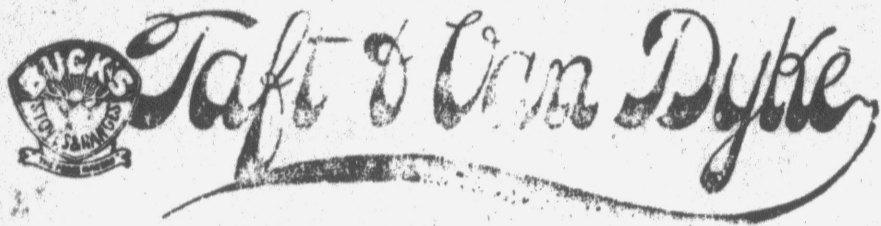
