OVER THE STATE.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Frank Spence, a boy from this State who was working at Pine Beach, a resort near Norfolk, was shot and killed by a man named Connor.

Two young white men who were brakemen on the Southern railway, have been arrested at Spencer for robbing freight cars on which they worked.

G. W. Bennett, of Mt. Olive, was found dead in his bed Wednesday morning. Later his sister, Mrs. T. M. Merritt, after viewing the body walked out on the porch and fell dead.

Arthur Huggins, 10-year-old son of T. L. Huggins, of Kinston, was killed Tuesday afternoon. The father and another man were on a house painting the roof, while the boy was on the ground waiting on them. When the men had finished they threw a ladder off, calling to the boy to look out. The boy dodged the wrong way and the ladder struck him on the head, breaking a hole in the skull from which he died in a short while.

ABOUT THE REFLECTOR.

A Reference That is Appreciated.

A late issue of the Merchants Journal and Commerce, of Raleigh, made a reference to The Reflector that escaped our attention just at the time but is none the less appreciated, even though we were a little late in acknowledging it. The Journal says:

"There is no paper in North Carolina that serves its community with greater zeal and fidelity than The Greenville Reflector. It has urged the business men to stand together and to co-operate for the development of the community. It has been a strong factor in the city's growth and persistently hammers for additional railway accommodations, when the business men of the city, who were to receive all the benefits, did not manifest enough interest to give it any aid.

Now Greenville has a good set of merchants. Their stores are modern and they have a good 'rating.' They have done well, as it were, but they have neglected to show the proper spirit in promoting their city and we trust that the earnest appeal made by the Reflector will cause them to pay more attention to their association."

The Dewey Arrives.

Officials of the Navy Department are greatly pleased over the news from Manila of the safe arrival at Olongapo, P. I., of dry dock Dewey. When it was first proposed that this immense steel structure be towed half way around the world many wise sea dogs shook their heads, predicting that the expedition would meet with disaster. It was a trip marked with several mishaps, but none so serious as to damage the big craft. A start was made from Chesapeake Bay on December 28th last. Never before in the naval annals of the world has such a feat been attempted.

GREAT FLEETS OF THE WORLD

War Vessels Built and Building by Leading Maritime Powers.

A Return showing the fleets of Great Britain, France, Russia, Germany, Italy, the United States of America and Japan, on March 31, 1906, distinguishing battleships built and building, torpedo vessels, torpedo boat destroyers, torpedo boats and submarines, built and building, was issued as a Parliamentary White Paper recently.

The number of battleships of these countries is as follows: Great Britain, 61; France, 29; Russia, 12; Germany, 31; Italy, 16; United States, 15; Japan, 11.

Coast defense vessels, armored: France, 9; Russia, 6; Germany, 11; United States, 11; Japan, 3.

Cruisers of all classes: Great Britain, 114; France, 57; Russia, 13; Germany, 47; Italy 25; United States, 35; Japan, 36.

Torpedo vessels, torpedo boat destroyers and torpedo boats: Great Britain, 251; France, 301; Russia, 247; Germany, 128; Italy, 152; United States, 54; Japan, 111.

Submarines: Great Britain, 25; France, 39; Russia, 13; Germany, 1; Italy, 2; United States, 8; Japan, 5.

Great Britain is the only country retained scouts, the number entered being 8.

Under the building returned it is shown that Great Britain is building 6 first-class battleships, 10 armored cruisers, 18 torpedo boat destroyers and 15 submarines. France: Six first-class battleships, 23 torpedo boat destroyers, 52 torpedo boats and 32 submarines.

Russia: Four first-class battleships, 5 armored cruisers, 1 first-class protected cruiser, 29 torpedo boat destroyers and 15 submarines. Germany: Six first-class battleships, 2 armored cruisers, 6 second-class protected cruisers, 29 torpedo boat destroyers and 1 submarine "experimental." Italy: Four first-class battleships, 2 armored cruisers, 4 torpedo boat destroyers, 20 torpedo boats and 4 submarines.

United States: Eleven first-class battleships, 8 armored cruisers, 3 scouts and 4 submarines. Japan: Four first-class battleships, 3 armored cruisers, 1 second-class protected cruiser, 25 torpedo boats, destroyers and 2 submarines.

Sheriff Wilson's deputy immediately shot and killed the negro. Wilson was very popular. He was recently married. His young wife is prostrated with grief.

Rural Delivery Routes.

On July 2nd there were 1,150 rural delivery routes in operation in North Carolina, an increase of 175 in twelve months. It will be a gratifying fact to know that only two routes have been discontinued during that time. There are now a total of 132 applications for new routes pending. The number of petitions for the establishment of routes received from North Carolina totals 2,327, of which 1,050 have been reported adversely. There are more routes in operation in Mr. W. W. Kitchin's district than any other in the State. He has 185 routes, Mr. Small 96, Mr. Claude Kitchin 104, Mr. Thomas 99, Mr. Pou 106, Mr. Patterson 102, Mr. Page 115, Mr. Blackburn 141, Mr. Webb 125, Mr. Gudger 77. The number of routes turned down in Representative Blackburn's district is 220, being a larger number by far than in any other district.—Raleigh News and Observer.

An Interesting Relic.

Mr. John Nott—passing the evening of his life in the retirement of the old Nott homestead five miles west of town after a long and useful life, worthy of his forbears—has in a cellar of his dwelling carefully preserved, the body of the old-fashioned but stately coach in which LaFayette rode into this place on the occasion of his memorable and historic visit to Fayetteville in 1825.

Mr. Nott at one time had the silver plated harness which flashed in the light on the backs of the prancing horses of the chariot; but the vandalism of one generation after another, callous to sentiment and greedy of gain, filched by piecemeal these reminders of the past.—Fayetteville Observer.

The most common type of backbiter and one most easily detected is the fellow who wants to root somebody out of a job. We have countered him and have on all occasions given him mighty small comfort. There are other types of backbiters; but to our mind, all are in the same class "and worthy of death." That, of course, is the final sentence, but before that penalty is paid, they should be kicked and spit upon.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Displaying big fakiresque placards in show windows saying "Watch Blufftown Grow," is not going to make Blufftown grow. Whooping and hurrahing doesn't get money out of a bank. If you want the money and the bank has it to lend you quietly put up the stuff the bank wants; then the bank quietly writes some figures on the right hand side of your pass book and the thing's done. No brass band and Fourth of July parade about that. It is all a very calm transaction. New industries needed? Start them. Want more business enterprises? If there's room for them, start them.
