GREENVILLE 9 ROBERSONVILLE 7.

Both Towns Played Good Ball and the Game was Snappy.

The game of baseball here Friday afternoon between the teams of Greenville and Robersonville was about as good for amateur players as is seen. There was some nice playing on both sides and the result showed almost an evenly matched contest. A good crowd witnessed the game and it was interesting all through.

Greenville was first at bat with Anderson up. He fanned and Lipscomb quickly followed the same feat. Forbes found the ball easily but died on the way to 1st.

In Robersonville's half of the first inning Mizelle A. hit safe to 1st. Ferrall sent a fly to left field but it had as well gone in a net as anywhere in the direction of Gus Forbes. Pope performed the same act Mizell stealing 2n din the meantime Taylor sent a fly to centre and retired the side.

2nd inning: Greenville—James went down on a fly. Lanier hit but could not reach 1st. Blow lifted a fly and three were out.

Robersonville—Roberson hit but that was all. Mizell W. knocked a fly that was like tossing an apple at Bert James. Lane hit and the ball beat him to 1st.

3rd inning: Greenville—Lassiter, Laughinghouse and Lyman all hit in succession and all likewise perished on the first lap.

Robersonville—Bullock felt the sphere but it was no good. Holden made 1st on a safe hit, stole 2nd and scored on a passed ball. Mizell A. failed to reach 1st and Ferrall fanned.

4th inning: Anderson made 1st on hit and was forced to 2nd by a base on balls for Lipscomb. Forbes made a safe hit for 1st, advancing the two ahead of him. James came up with one of his famous two-baggers and scored all three of the others. Lanier struck out. Blow made a centre drive scored James and going to first, stealing on to 2nd and 3rd. Lassiter found the air but not the ball. Laughinghouse scored Blow and went to 1st. Lyman executed a fly to center field and retired the side.

Robersonville—Pope hit but never reached 1st. Taylor ditto. Roberson played a fly and out they went again.

5th inning: Greenville—Anderson's fly put him on the bleacher. Lipscomb perished between the plate and 1st and Forbes retired the side with a fly.

Robersonville: Mizelle W. went to 1st on a hit. Lane followed suit, passing Mizelle to 2nd. Bullock died for flying too high. Holden got out on the way to 1st while Mizelle did the same thing trying to reach home, it being a

double play. Mizelle A. finished the inning with a fly.

6th inning: Greenville—James, Lanier and Blow all hit safe to 1st. Lanier was caught stealing and expired at 2nd, James doing likewise at 3rd. Lassiter put the side back in the field with a fly.

Robersonville—Ferrall made 1st and Pope did likewise, passing Ferrall on to 2nd. Taylor put the fielders running after the ball and scored Ferrall. Pope went to sleep on 2nd. Roberson was too slow to get to 1st, and Mizelle W. had a bat with holes in it that the ball went right through.

7th inning: Greenville—Laughinghouse found it easy to get to 1st. Lyman made a two-base hit and sent Ned on to 3rd, from which point Anderson scored him. Lipscomb found nothing but wind Lyman got careless at 3rd and had to walk and Forbes finished it by failing to reach 1st in time.

Robersonville: Lane died before reaching 1st, Bullock on a fly and Holden just beat the air.

8th inning: Greenville—James got to 1st again and Lanier pushed him on to 2nd, taking 1st himself, but James lost his stand there. Blow tried his stand on 1st and sent Lanier on to 2nd where the latter was also buried. Lassiter hit spitefully and scored Blow but went down himself at 1st.

Robersonville—The thing was looking too shaky for the visitors and they pulled themselves together and got busy. Mizelle A. scampered down to 1st and worked his passage to 3rd while Ferrall was getting ready to die on the way to 1st. Pope put himself at 1st and scored Mizelle. Taylor hit safe for 1st and advanced Pope. Roberson also made a hit and scored Pope. Mizelle went up after a three-bagger scoring both Taylor and Roberson. Lane wanted to help the score but didn't do a thing but pump wind and Bullock collapsed hunting for 1st.

9th inning: Greenville—The home boys got a little scared over the close score and came up for their last turn determined to do something. Laughinghouse got a free passed to 1st on balls. Lyman passed him on to 2nd by making 1st. Anderson scored Laughinghouse, moved up Lyman and took 1st himself. Lipscomb added one more by scoring Lyman, but got put out while trying to steal 2nd. Forbes got out somehow but in the excitement we could not tell how come, and Anderson being caught napping the side retired.

Robersonville: The visitors tried hard to tie the game, but fell down. Mizelle A. got to 1st but was nabbed off guard. Ferrall worked up to 1st and stole 2nd. Pope took a good whack for 1st and scored Ferrall. Taylor sucked wild so bad it killed him. Bullock was about to meet the same fate, two strikes being up against him when he tried to kick the third one and umpire Forbes called him out.

Edible Birds' Nests.
Some authorities have contended that the edible birds' nests are constructed of a glutinous matter secreted in the mouths of the birds, and others think that these nests are composed of a kind of seaweed. The latter theory has now been practically abandoned, and it is generally conceded that the robbing of the nests before the hatching of the young is an act of great cruelty, since the birds immediately set to work to build new ones, and the excessive drain on their saliva exhausts their strength to such a degree that they are often found dead in numbers near the spot where they had meant to rear their broods.

There was no better behavior in the recent "lilly white" Republican State convention than when such gatherings were largely dominated by negroes.

That the Republican party "has expended the national revenue wisely and with absolute honesty," as claimed in their State platform, is not borne out by facts. On the contrary it has reeked with extravagance and graft.

It has been a long time coming, but Dreyfus has at last been vindicated. The Supreme court of France has announced its decision annulling the condemnation resting upon him and he has been restored to his position of brigadier general in the army.

What the Republican party says in their platform as to what they would do in North Carolina if given the power, is not at all in keeping with what they did do when they had power. It is their same old cry of wanting to get back in office, but the people do not want to see the State plundered again and are unwilling to trust them.

The board of aldermen of Greenville would do the proper thing to hold a special meeting at once, adopt a resolution declaring it a nuisance for any dog to run at large on the streets for thirty or sixty days, and issue an order to the policemen to shoot on sight any dog seen on the streets. It is not the safe thing to wait for some child to be bitten by a rabid dog before taking any steps for protection. One person is worth more than all the dogs, and their safety demands that some stringent action should be taken.

STATE'S COTTON CROP BELOW LAST YEAR.

Secretary Thomas B. Parker, of the North Carolina Cotton Growers' Association, has now secured pretty nearly all the reports of the cotton growing counties of the State and of these the Observer correspondent has made quite a study. It may be stated, on the strength of these reports, that it looks something like the crop will be about 75 or 80 per cent. of that of last year. The wet June did a great deal of damage. Cotton has had a hard time this year, between the drought, the unusual cold in May with widespread frosts and the great rains, which in many sections continued day after day and which caused a great growth of weeds in the east where the rainfall has been greatest and in some other sections of the State here and there towards the west, the central belt faring better than the other parts. The increase in the labor troubles, due principally to the exodus of negro field hands to factories and railways, has become more grave and there is a story of complaint from every county reporting as to this matter. Cotton dealers, with few exceptions, say they regard the crop as much below last year. Some of them, it is true, say they get good reports. The wet June prevented the proper development of the tap root, the main root of the plant, and thus affected the latter vitally. The outlook therefore is not good. In fact, it is not what it seemed to be ten days or two weeks ago.—Raleigh cor. Charlotte Observer.

Growth of the Telephone.

Only thirty years ago was the first telephone operated at Philadelphia. Its growth has been wonderful. People had had the telegraph, we believe, only a little more than thirty years then; and when the first words were heard over the telephone doubtless no one thought that by this time people would be able to talk to each other in audible voice, known and recognized, from lakes to gulf and from sea to sea. We need wonder no longer at the great strides science and human effort are making; and we need not try to foretell the limit of these things. Recently a man sailed about Washington City in a flying machine with as much ease and directed it with as much certainty as a man can drive a gentle buggy horse over the best roads in Halifax county. Hush up that prophecy that we have about reached the limit of achievement. We have really just commenced and the end is far out of sight, hid away behind the hills of the future.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

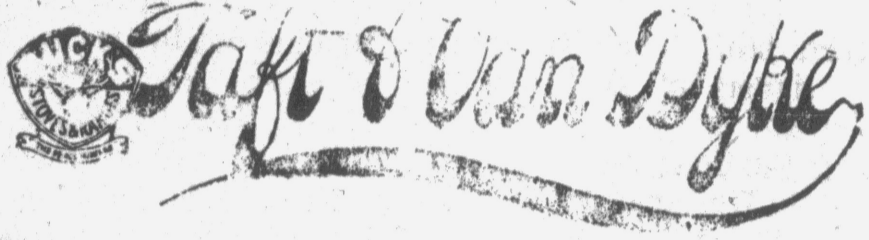
