

SCHOONER LOST.

Captain and Mate Have Narrow Escape.

A schooner belonging to Capt. Gaskill which plied between Washington and Ocracoke, was lost in Pamlico sound Thursday night in heavy weather. The mate was at the wheel and called to the captain, who was in the cabin, that something was wrong with the craft. The captain hurried on deck and saw that the schooner was badly listed. He told the mate to lower the sail but before this could be done the schooner turned turtle. Only the captain and mate were on board. They took the small boat kept on the schooner and were seven hours getting ashore. An effort will be made to raise the schooner.

Why Thunder Sours Milk.

To many persons the curdling of milk in a thunderstorm is a mysterious and unintelligible phenomenon. Yes the whole process really is simple and natural.

Milk, like most other substance, contains millions of bacteria. The milk bacteria that in a day or two, under natural conditions would cause the fluid to sour are peculiarly susceptible to electricity. Electricity inspires, invigorates them affecting them as alcohol, cocaine or strong tea affects men. Under the current's influence they fail to work with amazing energy and instead of taking a couple of days to sour the milk they accomplish the task completely in half an hour.

It is not the thunder in a storm that sours milk; it is the electricity in the air that does it. With an electric battery it is easy, on the same principle, to sour the freshest milk. A strong current excites the microbes to supermicrobic exertions and in a few minutes they do a job that under ordinary condition would take them a couple of days.—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

Federal Taxation.

Let us all bear this fact in mind; all subsidies, petty or great, are paid out of the revenue collected by taxation from the pockets of the people. The idea that this government is rich is a false idea. It has nothing but what it takes from the poor man's pocket. The rich pay Federal taxes only in the proportion of the number of the rich to the number of the poor; and that is an insignificant proportion; and even that proportion is offset by the special "protection," or advantage, which the tariff gives the rich over the poor.

Democracy and A New Deal.

The disclosures made in the divorce cases of Corey and Hartje and the murder case of Thaw have shown us samples of the kind of men tainted prosperity breeds in the "higher class." Their wealth is due to the tariff or other special privileges, which gave them a monopoly, and their morals are due to the ill gotten wealth. The last, worst curse of the earth is the adulterated prosperity of ours. We need a new deal and a square deal; but we can get only one through a Democratic administration and an honest tariff for revenue only.

AS TO MAD DOGS,

Town Officials Will Enforce State Law.

Mayor F. M. Wooten, that the people may be informed about the law relative to mad dogs, requests us to publish the following section from the State Code:

"If the owner of any dog shall know, or have good reason to believe, that his dog, or any dog belonging to any person under his control, has been bitten by a mad dog, and shall neglect or refuse immediately to kill the same, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars to him who will sue therefor; and the offender shall be liable to pay all damages which may be sustained by any one; in his property or person, by the bite of any such dog, and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and fined not more than fifty dollars or imprisoned not more than thirty days."

The town officials will do all possible to protect the people against the danger of mad dogs, and this is to give warning that any who violate the foregoing may expect to be dealt with as the law directs.

HORRIBLE BUTCHERY.

Four Members of one Family Murdered.

The home of Isaac Lyrely, who lived near Bowden's Junction, in Rowan county, was the scene of a horrible murder Friday night. Lyrely, his wife and two younger children who occupied the first floor of the house were murdered with axes while they were asleep, and one of the beds they occupied set on fire.

Three older daughters occupied a room up stairs, and one of these was awakened by smoke. She went down stairs to investigate and discovered the crime. She went back up stairs to awake her sisters and the three girls put out the fire and saved the bodies and building from being burned.

Five negroes who lived on the Lyrely farm were arrested and one of them confessed the crime, implicating the others. The negroes were placed in Salisbury jail and later the sheriff removed them to Raleigh. Saturday night a crowd went to Salisbury jail intending to lynch the negroes, not knowing the sheriff had moved them.

Edible Birds' Nests.

Some authorities have contended that the edible birds' nests are constructed of a glutinous matter secreted in the mouths of the birds, and others think that these nests are composed of a kind of seaweed. The latter theory has now been practically abandoned, and it is generally conceded that the robbing of the nests before the hatching of the young is an act of great cruelty, since the birds immediately set to work to build new ones, and the excessive drain on their saliva exhausts their strength to such a degree that they are often found dead in numbers near the spot where they had meant to rear their broods.

After much talk the building of a trolley line from Greensboro to High Point seems assured.

The scrap iron, steel, brick and other marketable debris in the late San Francisco disaster has been sold to junk dealers for approximately \$20,000,000.

The State board of elections will appoint county boards at its meeting on the first Monday in August. Not more than two members of the county board shall belong to the same political party. County chairmen should send in recommendations to the State chairman at once.

The Republican policy of protecting the trusts through the tariff forces them to do many queer and inconsistent things. For instance, the products of Hawaii and Porto Rico are allowed to enter this country free of duty but the products of the Philippines are compelled to pay 75 per cent of the Dingley tariff rates. These countries are all on a par politically but inconsistent as it may seem the late Congress refused to place them on an equality as tax payers. If the tariff is not robbery under such conditions, what would you call it?

The proposed ship-canal bill from Pittsburg to the Great Lakes, from the rear rest backing it receives from Mr. Dazell and other Republican leaders, who have been warm advocates of the ship-subsidy bill, leads one to think there is, at least, a stock jobbing subsidy in the proposition. The fact that the canal is solely in the interest of the Steel Trust which is making millions out of the monopoly that the tariff gives it, throws suspicion on the project as another monopoly proposition.

It is now declared by experts that the cigarettes made by our highly protected tobacco trust, are "worse than tinned meat." It is also said that much of the highly protected American whiskey is worse than tainted beef; that even breakfast foods and sugar are adulterated. But what are we going to do about it? The Republican party has stood by consenting to trust adulterations as well as to trust protection.

Like most other Republican leaders, Senator Lodge thinks the question of campaign contribution "quite important." But with his secretary in jail for the larceny of \$225, and the promise of a consular ship still unredeemed the people of Massachusetts may deem it of "enough importance to ask Lodge some troublesome questions.

TRUFFLE HUNTING.

Dogs and Pigs Trained to Locate the Hidden Treasures.

Truffle hunters of Italy frequently employ trained pigs in their search for that delicacy, which is found most abundantly in the depths of forests. Men who derive a livelihood from truffle hunting with pigs are firm believers in the importance of family traits in the animals. They think certain strains possess the hunting instinct to a greater degree than others.

When the hunter desires to secure a new pig for his work he visits the nearest country fair. With a truffle tied to his boot he stands beside a road along which the hogs are driven. Should one stop to sniff at the delicacy it is at once bargained for by the hunter.

Taken into the forests, the pig's sense of truffle detection is further developed until it has little difficulty in picking out the edible growths, no matter how well they may seem to be concealed.

Other truffle hunters in Italy and many in England employ dogs to aid them. Two small poodles once discovered a rich harvest of truffles for their owner, a Surrey farmer. Poodles in fact are more valuable for this work than any other canine breed.

These dogs are trained to such hunting. Almost as soon as one can walk he is given a truffle as a plaything. Paving and gnawing it at first like a rubber ball, he is taught to retrieve it.

Then as soon as he has grown accustomed to his new plaything, like a trick dog, he is taught to find it when hidden.

Gradually he is trained to search for it on his own initiative. Then the system of rewards and punishments comes into play. Each time he finds his hidden treasure he is taught to bring it unmolested to hand, and a small piece of cheese or raw meat is given him.

In exchange for the truffle, which is probably not specially treasured by him, some dainty his soul hankers after is offered to him.

Finally the truffle dog, for such he is now called, is brought to the open woods where the truffle is suspected to lurk, and his career begins in sober earnest, for now he has to depend entirely on his sharp scent and to put the reality of his training to work and test.
