DEMANDS PARLORS FOR BEAU

The Housemaids Union the Latest Thing in Labor Circles.

"Are you a union lady?" is the question now fired at the housekeepers of this city should they wish to hire a servant.

The housemaids' union has been formed here, and it is about 200 strong, according to Mrs. Anna [redacted] framed up the affair, and who is at the head of it. It is woe to the housemaid now who cannot produce a working card.

The object of the housemaids' union is to improve social conditions. So far there has been no talk of a strike for higher wages, shorter hours or anything of that sort, but the housemaids do want to be recognized more extensively by their mistresses—and they are getting ready to enforce their demands or quit.

It is the intention of the girls to demand that they be allowed the parlor in which to receive their company at least one night in the week, the same as a daughter of the house; that their linen shall be sent to the laundry with the family linen; that they get two weeks' vacation each summer on full wages.—McKeesport Dispatch.

NEWSPAPERS ONLY MEDIUM.

A Buffalo Advertiser Tells His Experience With Circulars, Cards, and Such Things.

J. J. Kunzie a prominent real estate man of Buffalo, in an address on billboards to aldermen of that city the other day said:

"Ten years ago I started sending out circulars, folders, booklets, cards, calendars and other printed matter. I gave great thought to methods of distribution and considered myself a qualified expert. Last year I had printed and lithographed 30,000 calendars, and everybody on the east side got one. I sent out folders and other material also, and no year in ten has passed that less than 150,000 pieces of advertising material were distributed.

"I know that it was all a mistake, that it was almost useless and that I was wasting my money, and I have absolutely given up that kind of advertising matter and am reaching my people in the only approved modern manner—through the newspapers."

WINTERVILLE HIGH SCHOOL.

Prospects of Present Session Best in Its History.

It was our pleasure to spend last Friday night in Winterville and attend the reception given to the pupils of Winterville High school. It was enough to fill any heart with pride to look upon the splendid assemblage of boys and girls who are attending this school and to note the earnestness with which they have entered upon the duties of the session.

The prospects are that the present session will be the best in the history of the school. The very first week enough pupils came in to overrun the dormitories and it was necessary to obtain rooms for some in nearby homes. Every year the school has grown larger and better, and already it is apparent that there must be an enlargement of quarters before another session. Especially must the girls' dormitory and the academy building be made larger, and the trustees have already begun planning with that end in view.

The excellent work done by this school—and it is surpassed by none—has given it a reputation throughout the State and students are there from many different counties. The graduates from Winterville High school take high rank in any college which they enter, and those who do not pursue their studies further than the high school course go out well prepared to enter upon the duties of life.

It was a fortunate day for Pitt county when Prof. G. E. Lineberry came to take charge of this school at the time it was established. He has been principal from the beginning and his heart and life are enlisted in the work. Too much cannot be said in praise of the splendid work he has done. In Prof. F. C. Nye he has an excellent assistant, and the faculty this session is unusually strong. No effort has been spared to get the very best teachers that could be secured. Miss Elizabeth Boushall, of Elizabeth City, is in charge of the primary department, Miss Effie Barker, of Apex, has the intermediate grades, Professor Lineberry and Nye the higher grades, and Miss Bessie Sams, of Mars Hill, is music instructor. Each is a specialist in his or her respective department.

Winterville High school is already the pride of Pitt county and it is going to be the leading educational center of the entire eastern section of the State.

RURAL MAIL ROUTES

Washington, N. C, Sept. 8, 1906.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I am much gratified to read an editorial in a recent issue of the Reflector calling the attention of the people to the conditions upon which their rural routes could be maintained. You explained the situation so clearly that it ought not to be necessary to call renewed attention to its importance. It is the duty of a representative to have this service extended wherever possible and to exert all his influence to prevent the discontinuance of a single route and to prevent the change from a daily to a tri-weekly service, but at the same time an important duty devolves upon the heads of families who live on or near existing routes. Where there are as many as one hundred families who are in a position to erect boxes and only twenty five or thirty families have shown sufficient interest to provide boxes, the situation is discouraging and particularly to officials who have no local interest and only view it from an impartial standpoint.

Pitt county has a very fine service but there are still a few routes which are within the danger line of discontinuance. Those families who have provided themselves with boxes and are enjoying the benefits of the service, should exert themselves to induce others to provide boxes and all should unite in subscribing for one or more newspapers and periodicals and otherwise patronizing the route. I have in mind some plans for further extension of the rural services in Pitt county so that even a larger area may be covered.

NO CURE FOR THIS DISEASE. "Medical science has not yet penetrated the secret of spotted fever," said Dr. W. W. King, passed assistant surgeon in the public health and marine hospital service. Dr. King has just returned from a several months study of the disease in the Bitter Root valley of Montana. "There are many baffling characteristics about spotted fever," said Dr. King. "In the first place, the disease is only known in a few valleys in the west. It is exceedingly dangerous, but not even prevalent where it occurs. For instance, in the Bitter Root valley there were ten cases this year, with eight deaths. "A peculiarity of the disease is that it appears only on the east side of the Bitter Root valley. People on the west slope have never been affected. "Many theories have been advanced regarding the transmission of spotted fever, none of which has been proved. For instance, some of the people maintain that the wood tick spreads the disease in the same manner as the mosquito does yellow fever. Others believe that it is caused by drinking water contaminated by the refuse of sawmills."—Washington Post.

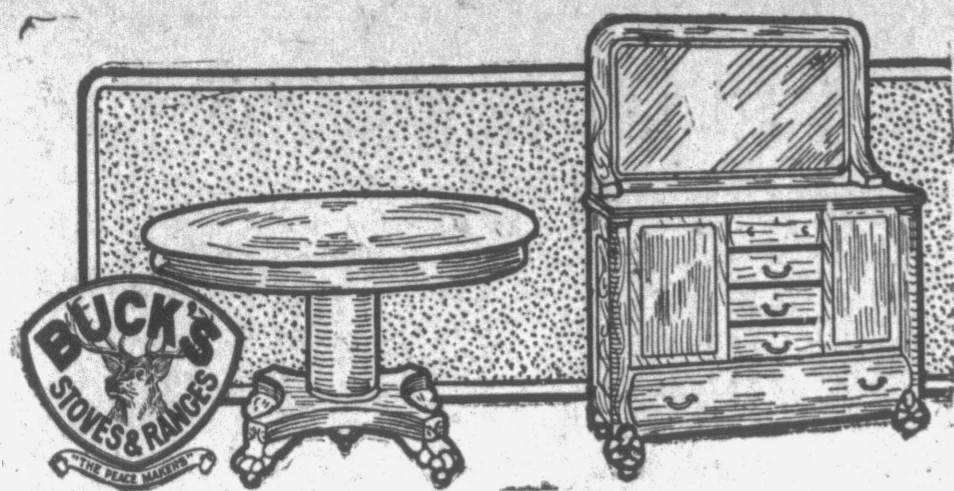

The Big Locks at the Soo. The greatest attraction at Sault Ste. Marie is the locks which raise the vessels from the level of Lake Huron to that of Lake Superior. Fifty years ago the first lock was opened. It was a small affair compared with the present canals. On the American side two locks are in operation. The larger of these is 800 feet long, 100 feet wide, deep enough to permit the passage of vessels drawing twenty-one feet of water and big enough to permit four large vessels to pass through at once. On the Canadian side there is also a lock, greater in length, but of less width, and of sufficient dimensions to allow three vessels to be raised or lowered at once. All the shipping from the upper to the lower lakes must go through the three locks. The commerce passing through the locks is by far the greatest in the world. In 1904 12,000,000 bushels of grain, 100,000,000 lbs of shipping, in the same year, a canal at Sault Ste. Marie cost \$1,500,000. It is all the work of the U. S. Government. It was done in seven months, while the Suez canal took ten years to build. It is a year round.—our Trade News.

How to See the Wind.

Take a polished metal surface of two feet or more and with a straight edge. A large handsaw will answer the purpose. Take a windy day on which to make the experiment, paying no attention to atmospheric conditions, for such an experiment can be as successfully made on a year day as it can on a cloudy one, and the results will be equally good in summer and winter. The only thing you need to look out for is that you do not attempt to "see the wind" on a rainy or murky day, as conditions are then very unfavorable. When everything is in readiness, hold the metallic surface at right angles to the direction of the wind—i. e., if the wind is in the north hold the metal east and west, but instead of holding it vertical incline it about 42 degrees to the horizon. When this has been done sight carefully along the edge of a sharply defined object for some moments and you will see the wind pouring over in graceful curves almost like water.

DOES THE DOG REASON?

Authentic Instances That Seem to Warrant That Conclusion.

A dog I owned suffered a great deal with indigestion. The least indiscreet diet would bring on these attacks, and as they occurred very frequently I had a large bottle of medicine always on hand and kept it on a shelf in his kennel. The dog seemed to have acquired a thorough comprehension as to the relief bringing quality of that bottle. Whenever he was ill and food was placed before him he would scent it, walk away without touching it, then turn to the shelf and, gazing steadily at the bottle, indicate plainly his wants. He took the medicine without the slightest balking, which is rather exceptional, as any one who ever tried to dose a dog will agree.

This dog when let out would never disturb anything in the poultry yard, but the moment a stray chick lost her way into his yard the savage got the better of him. He would catch the unfortunate straggler, kill and devour it, leaving only a few feathers as evidence of the "murder." Punishment always followed. The remnants of feathers were shown to the dog so as to impress on him his wrong doings and make the cause of the punishment clear to him. From time to time young chickens would be missing, and all efforts to locate the guilty one were vain. The dog's yard was always scrutinized, but nothing found.

My best broilers were disappearing at a rapid rate, and I decided to have the dog watched. Soon he was caught in the act and the mystery solved. The moment the dog had finished his meal he scratched the feathers in a heap and carried them with his teeth to a corner of his yard, where he buried them. The dog had the most embarrassed and helpless expression at the time he was caught that I ever noticed on a dog. An extra severe punishment was dealt out, and I do not know if the mortification of being trapped or the punishment did the work, but the dog was cured from that moment on.

The related observations show reasoning in order to accomplish something for a set purpose. I believe most animals possess the quality in some degree, more or less, according to their mental development.

In the last case described the dog's instinct led him to catch and kill the chicken, but memory told him that punishment would follow if found out. He reasoned that by hiding the evidence of his guilt he would escape punishment for his actions, which he understood to be wrong. The very fact of being able to discriminate between right and wrong and trying to check the consequences of the latter shows the necessity of thinking and therefore of reasoning power.—S. L. De Fabry in Outlook

Splitting Granite With Air.

The expansive force of compressed air is employed in a very interesting way by the North Carolina Granite company. On a sloping hillside, composed of granite which shows no bed planes, but splits readily in any direction when started, a three inch bore is sunk about eight feet deep, and the bottom is enlarged by exploding a half stick of dynamite. A small charge of powder is fired in this hole, which starts a horizontal crack or cleavage. Charges increasing in size are exploded until the cleavage has extended over a radius of seventy-five or a hundred feet. Then a pipe is cemented into the bore, and air is forced in under a pressure of from eighty to a hundred pounds. The expansion of the air extends the cleavage until it comes out at the surface on the slope of the hill. A horizontal sheet of granite several acres in extent may thus be separated.

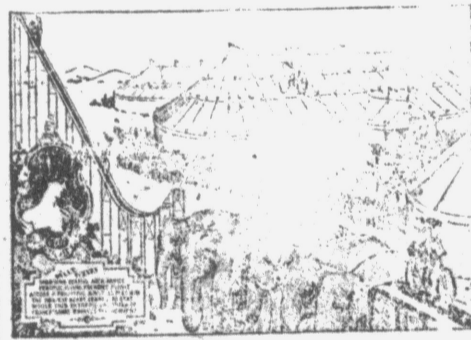

Have Killed Birds on the Wing and Caused a Sheep to Drop Dead.

It does not often happen that a bird falls a victim to a golf ball in its flight, although such a mishap has occurred in two or three instances, says London Tit-Bits.

Not long ago an incident of this kind was reported from Raynes Park Golf club. It took place in the course of a bogie competition. One of the players, a Mr. Crocker, having driven off at the eleventh tee, his ball created some astonishment by coming in contact with a lark in midair and literally knocking off its head.

A similar incident happened last season but one on the ground of the Birkdale club. Two members were playing a round when one of them made a brassie shot. The ball was in full flight when a bird of the wagtail species was seen crossing the line of flight, and the next moment both objects came into collision at a distance of about forty paces from the striker.

The consequences were fatal to the unfortunate bird, which was not only killed, but decapitated. As for the golf ball, its flight was stopped by the impact, the ball falling to the ground within a few yards of its slaughtered victim. The incident had the further object of losing the player the match, he having to make an extra stroke or two to cover the distance short covered, thus costing him the game.

A still more extraordinary freak of a golf ball resulted in a tragedy on the Balcomie links in Scotland. In the course of a match one of the players, in his drive from the sixth tee, put so much vigor into it that the ball struck a sheep on the head with such force as to cause it to fall dead on the spot.

A very different, but no less interesting, story was reported from another links in Scotland about the same time. In a foursome match, played at North Berwick, one of the golfers drove his ball against a wall. It rebounded into some rough grass and for a few minutes could not be traced, but ultimately the caddie found the ball lying in a lark's nest, in which were four eggs all unbroken. For a ball to drop into a nest of eggs without breaking any was surely an extraordinary occurrence.

It is not long since a player at Woking in approaching the hole landed a ball on the top of the clubhouse. This little incident did not, however, upset his equilibrium very much. As nimbly as he could he followed the ball to the roof and from that coign of disadvantage played it so well that he was successful in securing a half of a hole which everybody considered irretrievably lost.

A similar scene was once witnessed on the St. Andrews links in the course of a three ball match. One of the players happened to drive his ball on to the corrugated iron roof of a shed and, in the belief that he had consequently given up the hole, the other two calmly proceeded with the match. But they had not long to wait for their host, for the next moment there was a great clatter of feet on the iron roof. It proved to be the player who had been supposed to have given up, and who had merely been playing from that unexpected position.
