## FATE AND ANDREW JACKSON.

During the young manhood of Andrew Jackson, when he rode the circuit in Tennessee, knowing more law than most of his brethren at the bar, afraid of nothing on earth, ready to challenge to a duel some trained lawyer from the older settlements when that lawyer trespassed upon his own preserves and made fun of his ignorance—as Waightstill Avery did—thus holding his ground against all comers, partly by brute force and partly by mental superiority he was probably nearer to happiness than he ever was afterward.

From court to court he rode his race horse, pistols in holsters, carrying his gun and his pack of hounds, ready for the court house, ready for the deer chase, ready for the shooting match, ready for the horse-race, ready for the house raising and log-rolling, ready to go out himself and drag into the court house the desperado whom the sheriff feared to arrest.

Rough-and-tumble times these were in backwoods Tennessee, with rude and lawless element-boiling and bubbling in that inevitable period of unrest and struggle which prevails in border settlements before the community takes form, and everybody snugly congratulates everybody else on the "reign of law and order."

In just such a state of society young Jackson was peculiarly fitted to lead, dominate and prosper.

Had he gone eastward instead of westward, had he cast in his lot with the lawyers that were striving for advancement in the cities of the original thirteen seaboard states, nothing is more certain than that the world would never have heard of him.

His back of knowledge of the law would have made him easy prey to those who were masters of this profession; his fiery temper would have kept him constantly in battle array, and in fighting those lawyers who got the better of him in the citation of legal authorities he would, in the nature of things, have met the wrong man, sooner or later—Tom Watson, in his Magazine for September.

The Library of an Emperor.

In 1808 Napoleon formed the idea of having a traveling library in order to make his hours of intellectual recreation independent of the exigencies of a campaign or the delays of a courier. The proposed library was to form about a thousand volumes. The books were to be of small duodecimo size, printed in good type and without margins in order to save space. They were to be bound in morocco, with flexible covers and limp backs. The boxes for their conveyance were to be covered with leather and lined with green velvet and were to average sixty volumes apiece in two rows like the shelves in a library. A catalogue was to accompany the collection and any desired volume. The distribution of subjects was as follows: forty volumes on religion, forty of epic poetry, forty of the drama, sixty volumes of other poetry, sixty volumes of history and a hundred novels. "In order to complete the quota," said the instructions, "the balance shall be made up of historical memoirs."—James Westfall Thompson in Atlantic.

In and Out of Cork.

The Soane museum in England contains a cork model of the Colosseum. This was probably acquired by Sir John Soane chiefly because cork is difficult to eat. Mr. Clouston tells in "The Burlington" a story connected with it. The late keeper, Mr. Birch, was showing a party of American visitors over the museum and mentioned that this was "made in cork." Snails as Food.

The Lancet advocates the use of snails as food. The snail, it says, has been called "the poor man's oyster." It makes an excellent fish sauce and may be used for the same purpose as oyster sauce. It may be exercised in the choice of snails for food purposes, as it is well known that snails feed on poisonous plants, and it is the custom in France to allow a few days to elapse after they have been taken from their feeding ground in order that any poisonous matter may be eliminated.

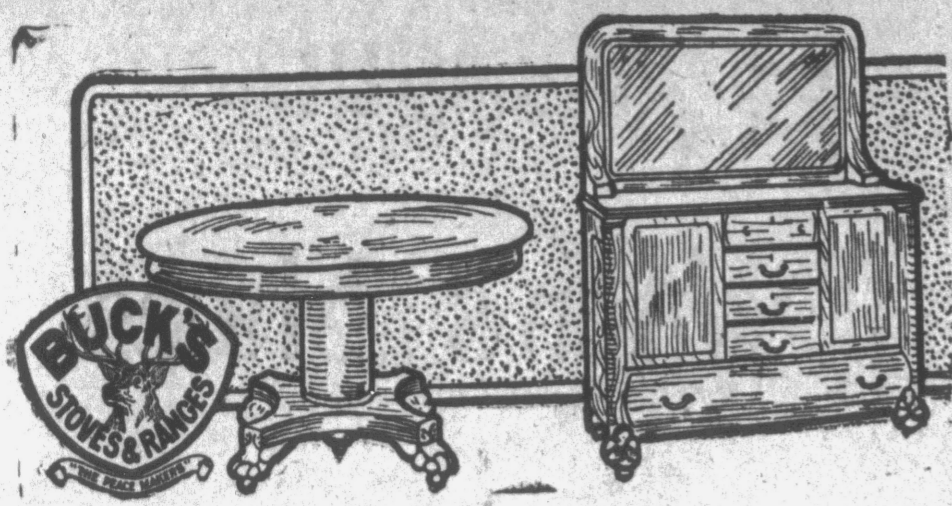

### A HUMOROUS PATIENT.

Surgery has much to gain from spinal cocainization, says Robert Jones, a Liverpool surgeon, in the Medical Press. He advocates this process in cases where patients cannot or will not take other anaesthetics. The resulting insensibility to pain lasts more than an hour, but the patient often develops abnormal loquacity.

Mr. Jones tells of an operation in which he cocainized the spine. It was that of a big man, who as soon as he had taken two or three whiffs of chloroform jumped off the operating table and scampered away. This happened twice, and Mr. Jones tried cocainization, injecting cocaine into the cerebro spinal fluid. By this means a troublesome operation of cutting out bones in the leg was safely carried out. The man, an old poacher, meantime regaled the doctors with stories of his art, only once interrupting, when the surgeon was chiseling a bone, to ask, "What is that knocking?"—London Mail.

### Fall of the Bicycle.

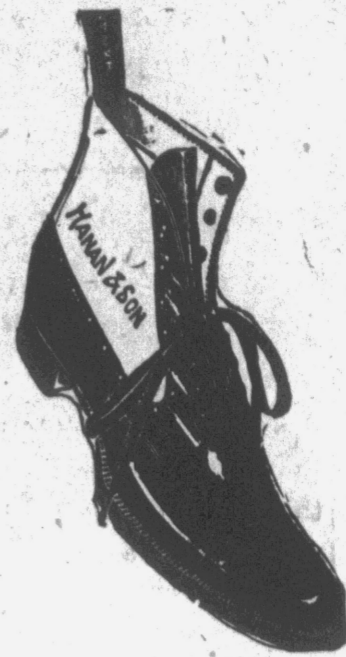
In one of the principal streets, where the tide of commerce flows strong, the sign "Bicycles Stored" stands out from the wall of a building where bicycles were much stored eight years ago. 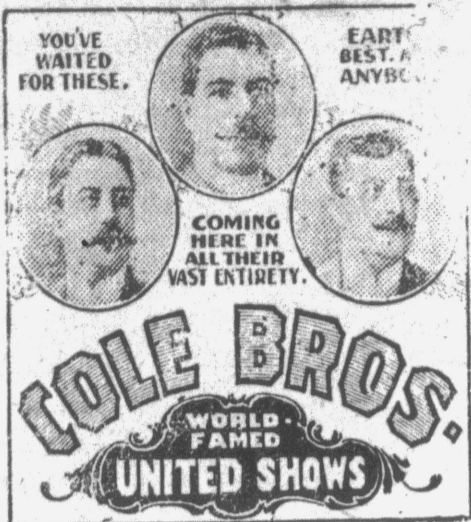

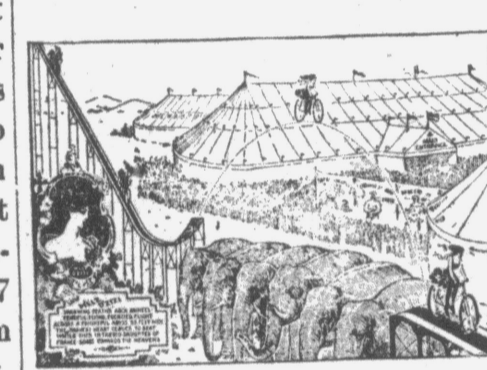

## INSANITY AND PROSPERITY.

In view of the oft repeated discussions on the questions whether insanity is more prevalent than formerly, and if so what are the causes for that condition, the statement made by Dr. Charles G. Hill, physician in charge at Mount Hope retreat, in the sixty-third annual report of that institution, is interesting. Dr. Hill in speaking of the reasons for any possible increase gives, among other things, "the prosperity of the period." He says: "If there is a marked increase of insanity at the present time I believe that by a thorough research, consisting not only of a survey of the mental symptoms, but an investigation with microscope and chemical reagent of the tissues, fluids and secretions of the body, it could be traced in a great part to the prosperity of the period—the luxurious indulgence, the dissipations, the departure from the old standard of rectitude and the moral deterioration made possible in all conditions of society to a greater or lesser degree."—Baltimore American.

### The Lazy Worm.

A large district in the middle of Porto Rico with a population of 100,000 is afflicted with "the lazy worm," and official efforts are being made to improve the inhabitants' condition. A hospital has been established at Albonito, with an endowment of \$15,000, and will do what it can to check the ravages of this minute reptile, of the existence of which the old time native Porto Rican never had the slightest notion. Last year an American medical officer, Captain Ashford, treated 4,500 cases, and nearly all of them were cured. As a result the population are aroused to much enthusiasm, and the afflicted are applying in great numbers for treatment. Heretofore the malady has been deemed incurable.
