## SOLICITOR L. I. MOORE.

The people of this judicial district owe much to Solicitor L. I. Moore. He has made a capable and efficient prosecuting officer, allowing neither fear nor favor to deter him in the faithful performance of duty as he saw it. True the stand he has taken to suppress crime has aroused some opposition to him, for "No rogue e'er felt the halter draw."

With good opinion of the law. Yet his idea has been to enforce the law, with no thought of whether he would make political friends or enemies. In his efforts to put down violations and uphold the law he should have the support of all advocates of morality and lovers of law and order.

Not only in his official capacity has Mr. Moore won the commendation of the public, but his activity in the promotion of business enterprise has shown his worth as a citizen. In Greenville alone many enterprises owe their origin to him. Nor is this all. The Raleigh and Pamlico Sound railroad now building from the capitol to the sound, and which will mean so much for the development of this Eastern country, is largely the outcome of his efforts. The building of this road will place approximately \$700,000 of property on the tax lists of Pitt county, to say nothing of the money turned loose in the work of construction and the enterprises that will follow. Wake, Wilson, Greene, Craven and Beaufort counties will share proportionately in this benefit.

Mr. Moore has been attacked for his connection as attorney for the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound railroad. There is absolutely nothing in this attack. All solicitors in the history of the State have kept up their civil practice for all clients who applied to them. Mr. Moore does appear for the R and P railroad and by his connection has done more for our county than any other man. His employment is such, however, that he can withdraw from it any moment when the interests of the State should demand it. He is a lawyer of learning, character and standing, a business man of the highest integrity, and a patriot whose first thought is for the faithful performance of his duty. For eight years he has made an ideal solicitor, and the large majority by which he will be re-elected will fully establish the confidence of the people of the district have in him.

## Graded School.

Everything is in readiness for the opening of the graded school Monday. Some of the teachers are already there, and the others will be in this evening.

The management of the school hopes that as many children will come Monday as intend to register this year. Beginners may enter any time before Nov. 1st.

## VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY

### End of First White Cap Trial.

The white cap trial that began Monday morning ended late Friday evening in a verdict of not guilty, five days of the court having been consumed on the case. Only one defendant, J. K. Barnhill, was on trial.

The case was a strongly fought one from beginning to end, there being an able array of counsel on both sides. In all 105 witnesses were placed on the stand 40 for the State and 65 for the defense.

The verdict of the jury was a miscarriage of justice, as the State established a clear case of guilt to any unbiased mind.

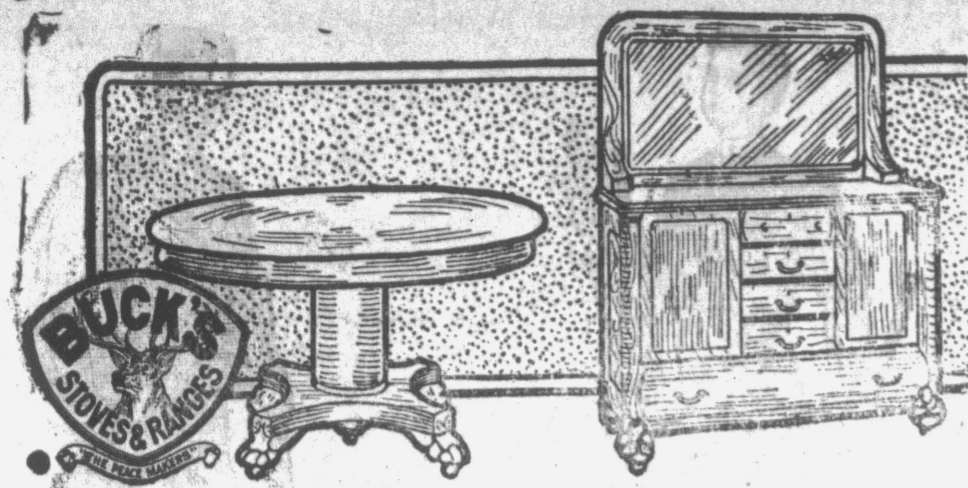

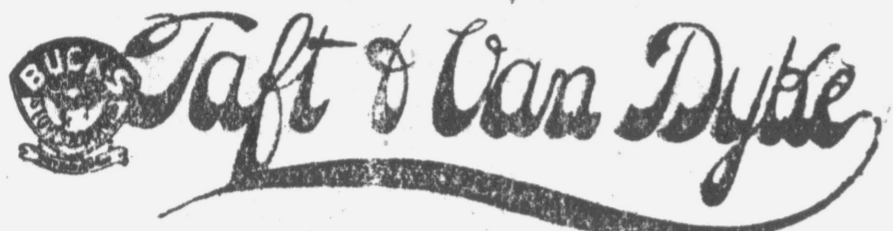

It is seldom an innocent man is punished, but the guilty that escape punishment are numerous.

Until the present jury system is reformed it is almost a waste of time and money to undertake the trial of a person charged with any crime of considerable magnitude.

While the other speeches were good, that of ex-Gov. C. B. Aycock in closing the argument for the State in the white cap case has never been surpassed before a Pitt county jury.

Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis uttered a great truth in his speech before the jury in the white cap case in saying when a man engages in the illicit sale or manufacture of whiskey he bids good bye to law and truth.

It looks very much like ex-Governor Aycock said in his closing argument to the jury in the white cap case; that a verdict of not guilty would be a declaration that every man in Pitt county would have to arm himself in defense of his own home, as he could no longer look to the law to protect him.

Judge Thomas J. Shaw has just closed a two weeks term of Pitt Superior court, the first he has held in this county. He is an able judge and has made a host of friends in this county. Judge Shaw was feeble when he came here to begin the court, and though the docket has been a heavy one he has held up well under the severe strain.

Before adjourning court Friday evening Judge Shaw remarked that he had witnessed more perjury in this court than had ever before come under his observation. He said if he had to hold another court here he would send some twelve or fifteen persons to the roads for perjury, as the county needs such an example. 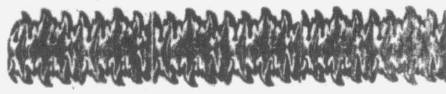

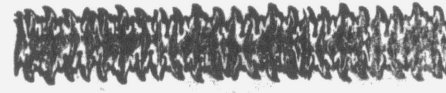

## THE QUEER UPOTOS.

Odd Customs of These Slave Holding Natives of Africa.

The Upotos live on the northern bank of the Kongo between Ikomango and Dobbo, or between the twentieth and twenty-second degrees of east longitude, and seem to have long resided in the region. They show a marked disinclination to quit it. They live chiefly by fishing, and one of the first things to strike a visitor is that certain fish are reserved for the men, others for the women and yet a third kind for the slaves. These slaves are chiefly slaves by birth or men sold for their debts. They are well treated, and opposite Irivui is an island on which all slaves who are incapable of working are allowed to reside by themselves. One form of semi-servitude is called lisokko. This is when a man, not having money to buy a wife, sells himself to a chief to obtain one. The offspring of such a marriage becomes the property of the chief.

One very curious custom is that a man may never look at his mother-in-law. If he does he has to pay her a fine of 30 to 50 mitakkos, which are brass rods, equal to a half penny. Neither must the mother-in-law look at her daughter's husband. Children are treated with great kindness and, in fact, spoiled. Their mothers do not chastise them, even if the children strike them. Among the duties of the women is that of shaving their husbands. The chief amusements are singing, dancing and wrestling matches between villages. The victors are painted red. So also are corpses before burial, but in the case of women it is not the bodies, but the coverings in which they are wrapped, that are so colored.

The Upotos believe in life after death and in spirits. They think their dead relatives and friends are always watching them, although they cannot be seen. Their god is named Libanza. Their account of the origin of the white and black races is curious. Libanza sent his son, Tserenga, on earth to see what the races of mankind were doing. Among Europeans he was well received, so he gave them a white skin and much knowledge, but among the Africans he was badly received, so he left them black and stupid. One of the myths entertained by this people is that the Kongo and its many tributaries were created by the tears of the tribe weeping for a favorite chief long ago. The moon is supposed to be an immense ship engaged in conveying the souls of the dead to Libanza, and the stars are the eyes of the dead, who sleep during the day.—Athenaeum.
