GROUND WATERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COASTAL PLAIN.

The coastal plain of North Carolina; stretching back from the Atlantic for a distance of 100 miles or more to the highlands of the Piedmont plateau, is a region of many great natural resources, none of which are more important from an industrial standpoint than the underground water supplies now in course of investigation by the hydrographic branch of the United States geological survey. The studies have already demonstrated that there are few localities in this region where good water is not procurable, and at many points conditions are favorable for obtaining artesian supplies. These artesian flows are specially strong in the lowlands along the coast. It is probable that all of these waters are suitable for domestic use, but some of them contain ingredients harmful in certain lines of manufacturing.

The work now being carried on includes a study of the geologic conditions which govern the occurrence of the underground water, a determination of the depths to the various water-bearing beds, and estimates of the quantity of water which they may be expected to yield. The quality of the water is also being investigated. Special effort will be made to indicate the uses for which the available supplies are best fitted, and in places where the waters are inferior in quality better supplies will, if possible, be located.

It is probable that sufficient additional data will have been collected by the field men this summer to enable the publication of a report during the winter. This report will avoid so far as possible; the discussion of technical questions, and the matter will be so prepared and arranged that those interested can readily obtain from it detailed information concerning the quantity and quality of the ground waters of any part of the area. Copies of this report will be obtainable without cost on application to the Director of the Survey at Washington, D. C.

ROANOKE UNION.

Meeting With Greenville Baptist Church.

Saturday morning's session of the Roanoke Union was opened with devotional exercises by T. L. Vernon.

The moderator appointed G. L. Merrill, J. W. Nobles and C. J. Austin a committee on time and place of next union.

G. E. Lineberry, of Winterville, in the Neuse Association, was welcomed to a seat in the Union and asked to participate in the discussions.

J. W. Nobles, G. E. Lineberry, H. A. Willis, J. E. Ayscue, G. T. Lumpkin and G. L. Merrill made helpful and interesting talks on the subject of church discipline.

T. J. Crisp, J. T. Jenkins and J. E. Ayscue made some valuable suggestions on pastoral visiting.

The afternoon session Saturday opened with devotional exercises by T. J. Crisp.

The subject of revivals and methods in conducting them was discussed by J. T. Jenkins and G. L. Merrill.

G. T. Lumpkin spoke of the work at Farmville and a committee consisting of W. H. Ragsdale, Nora Biggs and T. L. Vernon together with A. G. Cox, of the Neuse association, was appointed to look into the advisability of securing a lot and building a house of worship there immediately.

T. L. Vernon discussed power in revivals and how to obtain it.

The subject of systematic giving was discussed by H. A. Willis, J. E. Ayscue and G. T. Lumpkin.

Associational missions was the subject before the Union at Saturday evening session. G. T. Lumpkin spoke of existing conditions among Baptists in Tar River Association and especially in the territory of Roanoke Union. W. H. Ragsdale spoke of the special needs to meet these requirements—more money, more men, more wisdom in the selection of missionaries and fields of operation.

Sunday morning a mass meeting was held in connection with the Sunday school. The addresses were in the interest of the orphanage at Thomasville, by H. A. Willis, T. L. Vernon and G. T. Lumpkin. Following the addresses a collection was taken for the orphanage amounting to some over \$60.

At 11 o'clock G. T. Lumpkin delivered an address on the subject of State missions.

In the afternoon the subject of foreign missions was discussed by T. L. Vernon, H. A. Willis and G. T. Lumpkin.

Sunday evening a sermon was delivered by J. T. Jenkins.

Throughout the Union the discussion on the different subjects were very interesting and the meeting was a profitable one in every way.

The sermons of Sunday were especially good and highly pleased the very large congregations. Rev. G. F. Lumpkin is well acquainted with the situation in North Carolina. His sermon in the morning was instructive as well as inspiring.

GRADED SCHOOL.

Opens With Large Attendance.

The graded school opened this morning with an attendance considerably larger than that of any previous year. All the grades are well attended, and it was especially gratifying to note the splendid enrollment in the upper grades. Gov. Jarvis was present, and made a brief and well received talk to the children.

The teachers are as follows. Misses Irvine, of Milton, N. C., Harding, of Greenville, Wade, of Farmville, Fa., Taylor, of Toano, Va., Bennette, of Reidsville, Neff, of Knoxville, Tenn., Cox, of Greenville, and McKinney, of Reidsville.

The school has a strong teaching force, and starts out under most excellent conditions. The management hope that this may be a year free from epidemics, and if so it is confidently believed that the year's work will be the best and most profitable in the history of the school.

Preparations are now on foot for a public memorial service in honor of the late Dr. McIver on the 11th of this month. The service will doubtless be well attended, as Dr. McIver was well known in Greenville.

New Brick Building.

E. H. Shelburn has purchased from O. Hooker the lot on Third street that was formerly a part of the Hoell property. Mr. Shelburn tells us he will erect a two story brick building on the lot for his bottling plant. Material is now being hauled for that purpose.

He spoke of the great opportunities for young men in North Carolina, and showed that since one half of all the Christians in the state are members of the Baptist church therefore as a denomination it has the greatest opportunities and also the greatest responsibility.

But while there are great opportunities, many Baptists are inactive and the contributions show that they are not doing what is necessary for them to do if they hold their present position.

Mr. Lumpkin was careful in all his statements and all denominations were helped by his discussion.

In the evening Rev. J. T. Jenkins, of Wilson, preached on the subject "The Power of Pentecost Applied." The congregation filled the house, and for an hour listened to the simple but powerful message of the speaker.

Mr. Jenkins is well known throughout this and in other states for his power as an earnest and forceful preacher.

From the beginning to the end the Union meeting was interesting and full of enthusiasm.

The Baptists are growing rapidly in Eastern North Carolina, and with such well equipped young men as they have in the Roanoke Union they are certain to go forward with increased momentum.

Details of Dress That Are Insisted Upon by English Masters.

At many schools uniformity of dress is insisted upon. It is surprising how much the casual visitor is impressed by trifling details of dress, and if boys were given much latitude in this respect the impression would not always be a good one. Black coats and waistcoats with black ties always look tidy and respectable, and are frequently the rule. At Harrow boys over a certain height are allowed to wear "tails," which, however, do not look well with straw hats. The Harrow straws are familiar to most people, having a crown of hardly an inch in height; these are worn all the year round, a custom which prevails also at Winchester. At Eton top hats are the usual headgear, and one is sometimes treated to the spectacle of a boy clad in football things surmounted by a top hat.

At some schools one is struck by the enormous variety of caps worn by the different boys, every house having its own colors for the different school games. When clothes are changed for football or cricket this is reasonable enough, but under ordinary circumstances the neatest uniform is some dark suit with black ties, the members of the various school teams being possibly allowed to wear their colors as a mark of distinction. At many schools the boys are compelled to wear cap and gown, the prefects in some cases having the distinction of tassels to their mortarboards. At Bradfield and Radley the boys wear gowns, and at Winchester all the "collegers" were compelled to do so, but a mortarboard is very heavy to the head, while a gown is rather a hindrance to a boy, though it may help to keep his clothes clean.

It is customary for prefects or monitors to carry walking sticks as a mark of distinction, and in the old days at Winchester prefects used to wear cowers or "cow shooters" as an especial mark of dignity. At Harrow a boy's great ambition is to get his "fez," which in appearance is much like a smoking cap with a long tassel, but which confers a great distinction upon the wearer. Brown boots are not generally allowed at school. All these various little details of dress are most rigorously enforced by the boys themselves as well as by the masters, with quite regimental exactness.—Baily's Magazine.

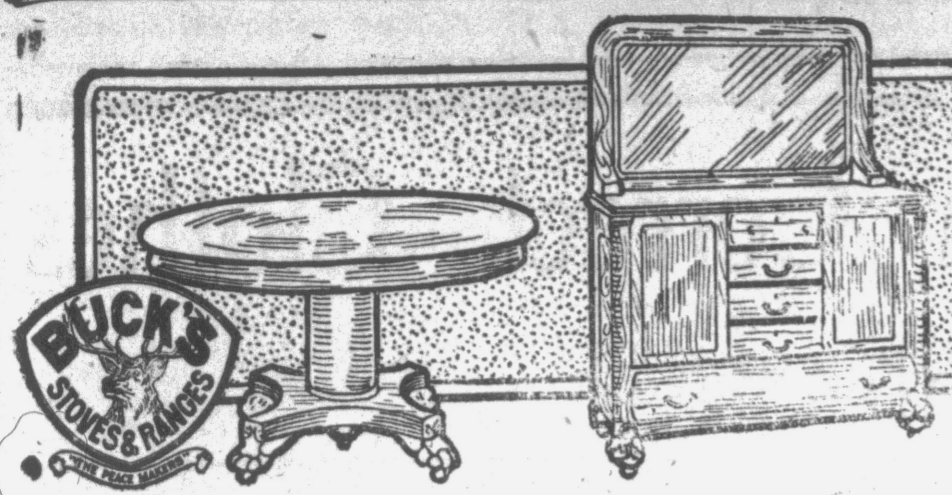

SPOONS.

Date of Their Origin Unknown, They Are So Very Ancient.

If you desire to know about the scarcity of really reliable data on the history of spoons, take down your handbooks and encyclopedias and see if it doesn't take you a long while to learn anything concerning their origin, "nativity," etc. In fact, the antiquarians do not pretend to give us anything of value in that line. It is admitted that they are "very ancient," but just exactly how old they are and by whom and where they were first used are points upon which we are left completely in the dark. Creighton says, "Spoons must have been a very ancient invention, for a Saxon spoon of perforated silver gilt, ornamented with gems, was found in a grave at Sarre, Thanet."

When forks were unknown spoons played a very important part at the table. Spoons of the thirteenth century, and even later, had handles terminating in a knob, knot, acorn or other odd and cumbersome devices. About the period of the restoration, of which so much is said in English history, a great change was made in the forms of spoons. In some of the unique patterns the "spoon" part was divided into two, three and even four parts, and the handles always split or twisted and turned up instead of down and back. Spoons of that period were all blunt instead of being pointed, as in the forms generally seen at present. They continued short and blunt to the time of George I., when they were first made pointed and had the handles turned down instead of up.

About the year 1500 what were known as "apostle spoons" were introduced. They were so called because they had the figures of the twelve apostles carved upon their handles. They were generally given by sponsors to children at their time of baptism. The wealthy presented the entire twelve, those who could not afford to indulge in such extravagance giving one or more, according as they felt able.

The most curious and remarkable spoon in the world perhaps is a "coronation spoon," preserved among the other royal relics in the Tower of London. The bowl is of gold and the handle of silver. The handle is split down the middle and set with all kinds of precious stones. The relic is valued at about £20,000, or upward of \$100,000.

A Trouble Breeder.

"Don't you think it's about time our daughter began to look out for a husband?" asked Mr. Green mildly. "She is getting on, and she'll be an old maid if she is not careful." "Indeed, yes, it is time," answered Mrs. Green, "but she is just the same as I was. I never thought of marriage until my mother warned me that if I were ever to marry at all I had no time to lose. I tell you I was so alarmed that I made up my mind to take the first fool that offered, and that very evening you came!"—Kansas City Independent.
