## MONUMENT TO M'IVER.

Appeal to the People of North Carolina to Erect Heroic Bronze Statue to Perpetuate His Memory.

Dr. Charles D. McIver devoted his life to the service of his people. No man of our day has rendered greater and more lasting service. Moved by love of his people and consciousness of his mission and duty, at great financial sacrifice, he rejected tempting offers from time to time to leave the State and enter the commercial world at home. His life stands out perhaps ideal in this generation of North Carolina of unselfish civic service. We believe that the people whom he served in so many ways with so much fidelity, ability and love will deem it a privilege and an honor to contribute to a fund for the erection of an heroic bronze statue to perpetuate his memory. The undersigned committee, therefore, appointed by the Governor of the State, earnestly appeals to every citizen of North Carolina, who loves his State and honors unselfish service, to send at once a liberal contribution for this memorial. The statue should be worthy of the man and his people.

It is hoped, therefore, that at least \$15,000 may be contributed. Fifty men and women in North Carolina could easily contribute \$100 each; one hundred men and women \$50 each; two hundred men and women \$25 each; two hundred men and women \$10 each, and a host of men and women will, we believe, gladly contribute smaller amounts. Let all express their gratitude for unselfish service rendered by a contribution to this worthy cause. The committee will make every effort to raise the necessary funds within the next thirty or sixty days. Let the responses be prompt. Acknowledgement of all contributions will be made through the press.

## REPUBLICANS ARE SCARED.

In Fear of Losing the House.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—Senator Simmons, who has been here conferring with political leaders, believes that the Democrats have the advantage in the campaign and that they will carry the House. The Tar Heel Senator spent some time with Chairman Griggs and other leaders at Democratic Congressional headquarters today and the optimistic reports that he obtained from them were corroborated by a high up Republican who confessed the fact that the campaign managers of his party are somewhat alarmed over the situation.

"I am very much pleased with the Congressional situation from what I have learned here," observed Senator Simmons, "and I believe that the democracy has more than an even chance to carry the house. There are indications that there is a turning of the political tide and that the people are ready for a change in the government. I never knew Democrats so buoyant and hopeful this far in advance of the election. It looks as though public sentiment is finally drifting our way. There is no doubt of the fact that the feeling among Republicans is very panicky. They are resting their hopes on Roosevelt's popularity and are endeavoring to make the president the issue of the campaign rather than the tariff."

## MODEL WATER POWER ELECTRIC PLANT FOR HARTFORD.

J. G. White and Company, Incorporated of New York who are building a number of railroads in this vicinity, have been awarded a contract for the construction of a large hydro electric plant to supply light and power to the city of Hartford Conn.

A hydraulic filled dam 600 feet long and 60 feet high will retain the water, while a wooden pipe seven feet in diameter and nearly two miles long will lead to the power house, giving a 200 foot head.

The plant will be a model in every respect.

### SCHUBERT'S SAD LIFE.

"I Shall Have to Sneak From Door to Door to Beg My Bread."

One of the bitterest disappointments in Schubert's life was Goethe's indifference. In 1818 he sent a selection of his compositions to the poet's songs to Weimar. What precious pearls of music were among the collection—the songs of "Mignon" and "The Harpist," those from "Faust," the sad melodies "Longing," "Nightsong," "The Wanderer's Nightsong," "The Earl King," "Haideroslein," "The Fisherman," "The Bard," "The King of Thule" and the music to "Claudine of Villa Bella." Goethe, who had an ear only for the stiff compositions of Zumstegg and Reinhart, then in fashion in Weimar, took no notice of Schubert's music and left his letter unanswered. Not until 1830—after Schubert's death—did Goethe learn to appreciate the extraordinary value of the compositions that lay neglected in his drawer. It was then that Wilhelmine Schroder Devrient sang "The Earl King" to him.

It was Schubert's greatest delight to make some little excursion with his friends to the picturesquely situated villages in the Wilnerwald or on the Kahlenberg, and it was in the arbors of the small inns, with a glass of pure country wine before him, that inspiration came most easily. But even these modest delights were imbibed by the malice that pictured him as a drunkard who composed his songs when he was full of wine. It is an absolute fact that he did not lose the faculty of artistic work even under the saddest circumstances. He composed the greater part of the "Miller Songs" while he was lying ill in hospital in 1823.

He was quite right when he wrote to his friend Kuppelwieser in March, 1824, "Those of my compositions which have been inspired by pain seem to please people best." And in a letter to Bauernfeld he complained: "What will become of poor me? Like Goethe's harp player, I shall have to sneak from door to door and beg my bread." The only ray of light that fell into his dark life was when, through the kindness of Count Johann Esterhazy's manager, Unger, the father of the famous prima donna, Unger-Sabatier, he was appointed music master in the count's household in Zelecs, where he spent some happy summers, the happiest of his life. It was in Castle Zelecs that he is supposed to have fallen in love with Caroline, his patron's beautiful daughter, who was his pupil and who probably never learned the secret of the musician's heart, though it is strange that one so gifted and so beautiful should not have married before she was well into the thirties. Bitter disappointment followed this short spell of a life free of care.—London Telegraph.

#### Perforated Sails.

Although the assertion recently made by an Italian sea captain that the power of sails was increased by their being perforated was ridiculed, it has just been proved that he was right. His theory was that the force of the wind cannot fairly take effect on an inflated sail because of the cushion of immovable air that fills up the hollow. To prevent the creation and presence of that cushion he pierced his sails with many holes, through which the wind blew, the balance of the air pressure striking its full effect. Several experiments have been made on these lines, and the results are declared to have been eminently satisfactory.—Leeds Mercury.

#### It Killed the Dog.

James Lawrence Toole, England's veteran comedian, who died not long ago, once played a practical joke on his dog with fatal results. In order to get her husband home at a reasonably early hour after his work in the theater was over Mrs. Toole used to promise him just as good a meal as could be found in any restaurant or club in London. This meal his wife would provide and leave on the table for the comedian. Toole didn't like to disappoint his wife and so used to give the food to his dog. Next morning the plates would be clean and Mrs. Toole happy. By this device the comedian was able to get home at his club suppers until the dog died of overfeeding.

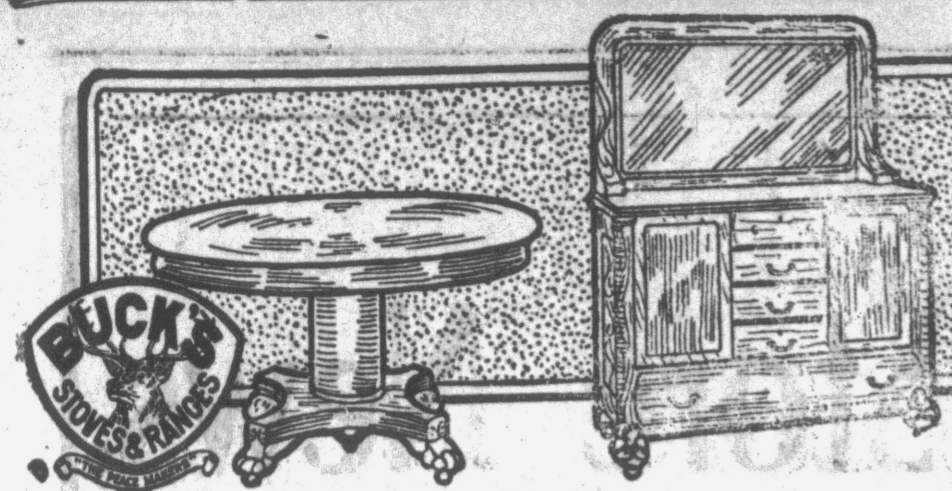

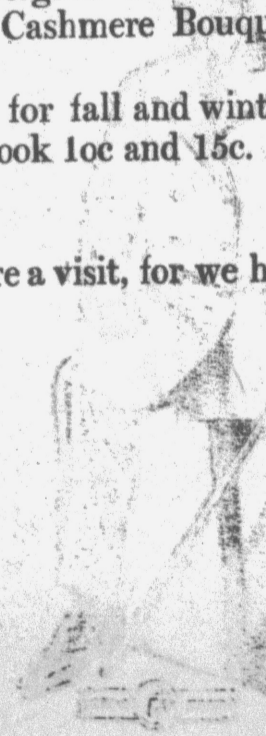
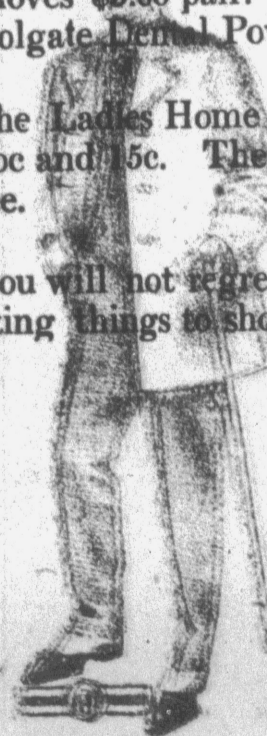
