She was married to Dr. Perkins in 1888 and is survived by the husband and three sons, the youngest only about 7 months old. She also leaves one sister and one brother, Mrs. J. D. Murphy and Mr. W. W. Moore, of Asheville.

The sudden death of this excellent woman is sad beyond expression, and every heart throbs with sympathy for the husband and three little boys who are deprived of a devoted wife and loving mother. May they have the love of the Heavenly Father to comfort and sustain them in their loss.

Mrs. Perkins was held in warm esteem by kindred, friends and neighbors, for she possessed such traits of character and sympathetic kindness as won all hearts. She was a member of the Baptist church and her life was that of a faithful Christian. By the family, kindred, friends and the church she will be sadly missed.

The funeral will take place Friday morning at 11 o'clock, interment in Cherry Hill cemetery.

CORN EXHIBIT.

Some Fine Specimens Shown.

The meeting of the County Corn Association today had a very small attendance and only a few farmers brought specimens of their crop to exhibit. That brought in was certainly fine and would make a creditable exhibit any where.

Messrs. A. J. Moye and C. E. Fleming each had an ear that yielded 1 pound and 2 ounces. Mr. M. L. Moye from one stalk obtained 1 pound and 12 ounces, and Mr. O. H. Jackson from one hill had 3 pounds and 5 ounces. Mr. Jackson made 9 barrels to the acre.

Three best ears selected from each lot weighed as follows: A. J. Moye's 3 pounds and 13 ounces. C. E. Fleming's 3 pounds and 10½ ounces.

Farmers all over the county should be interested in these corn exhibits and bring in specimens of their crop.

COMMERCIAL KNITTING CO.

One of Greenville's Thriving Industries.

Since the re-organization of the Commercial Knitting Company last spring, the enterprise has made wonderful progress. The work has so increased that the first of this month \$10,000 additional stock was issued, making the total \$36,000. This increase of the stock was for the purpose of further enlarging and increasing the capacity of the plant.

A large annex is being built for a bleachery, considerable new machinery has been added, and the power is being increased.

The mill is now working on goods for next season, and has orders ahead for the entire season's output. An excellent quality of goods is turned out.

The next step ought to be to establish a yarn mill in connection with the knitting mill.

FACING TROUBLES.

Alarm But No Fire.

About 7 o'clock Wednesday evening some excitement was caused by the alarm of fire. It came from the home of Mr. J. C. Tripp, west of the railroad. Licks Mucilage and Dies.

Licking the gum on hat bands caused the death of Lizzie Cassidy, twenty-years old, of No. 465 Second avenue, who died of cerebral spinal meningitis in Bellevue on Wednesday, according to the belief of her family. A year ago, members of her family say, her tongue was cut when she was licking a hot label in a hat factory, where she was employed, and blood poisoning resulted.

She partly recovered, but had been unable to work much since then and a few days ago was taken to the hospital. Dr. Burke, who attended her, says it is possible that the former blood poisoning might have contributed to her death.—New York Herald.

No Tax on Foreign Notes.

Commissioner Yerkes, of the Internal Revenue Bureau has decided that the tax of 10 per cent, under section 20 of the act of February 8, 1875, is not payable on notes of foreign banks and corporations, whether bought in foreign countries or the United States, which are sold to tourists or others leaving the United States for foreign countries.

This exemption is provisional upon the condition that the notes are not to be used in this country for circulation in lieu of lawful money or currency of the United States.

ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Points to Remember When Preparing Pickles.

Vinegar used for pickling must be of the best, whether cider, white wine or grain vinegar. Never boil it longer than five or six minutes, unless you wish to reduce its strength.

Brass, copper or tin vessels should not be used in preparing pickles, as the action of the acid on these metals frequently results in producing poison in pickles. The glaze of common earthenware is also affected by the action of the vinegar. Use vessels of porcelain or granite ware for the cooking process and glass or stone ware jars for keeping them.

When the jars are filled the vinegar must completely cover the vegetables or fruit. Tie the spices up in muslin bags unless whole spices are used. To give the bright yellow coloring to the mustard pickles, corn relish, etc., an Indian saffron called turmeric is used.

A very small quantity of alum will aid in making the pickles firm and crisp, but the use of alum is an objection.

Green grape or green cabbage leaves placed between layers of cucumbers while they are heating will green them.

The Care of China.

If china is decorated with gold it should never be washed with soap, as it has a dulling effect and after a time causes the gilt to rub off. Hot water does no harm. It is better soft, and, if no rain water be handy, it is an easy matter to boil it well, then reduce it to the proper temperature. The softer the drying cloth the better. Use it the moment the articles are out of the water. To rinse in cold water is to retard the drying. Besides, many cracks are due to the sudden plunge from hot to cold water.

Cooking Game.

There is quite a difference in quality and flavor of wild ducks. The canvasback and redhead ducks are always best cooked without stuffing. It seems a pity to stuff these fine birds.

Mallards, teals, widgeons and wood ducks may be stuffed with rice, hominy or potatoes nicely seasoned with chopped English walnuts. Canvasbacks and redheads are vegetable eaters; hence the flavor is sweet.

Bleeding Gums.

Where there is bleeding of the gums table salt is good. It may be gently rubbed into the gums or a little used on the brush. Camphor is also a good thing to use where the gums are not very firm, and a good powder that can be put up by any druggist is made of half an ounce of gum camphor, two and one-half ounces precipitated chalk and one and one-half ounces of pulverized orris root.

Keeping Lemons Fresh.

Lemons should always be well washed in warm water before they are grated or if the peel is to be used. On close inspection it will be found that the outside of a lemon is anything but clean. To keep lemons from drying up put them in a jar and cover them well with cold water. Change the water every three or four days and the lemons will keep ripe and juicy for a month.

Ingrowing Nails.

For ingrowing nails, remove the shoe and stocking; put a piece of paper under the foot; heat a spoonful of tallow and pour it in and around the nail once or twice a day until relief comes, which will be in a few days. If you haven't the mutton tallow, lard will do or any kind of fat and just as hot as can be borne.

Banana Salad.

Have equal proportions of orange pulp and bananas cut into dice and grapes cut in two and the seeds removed. Sweeten to taste. Serve in orange cups made from half of the orange skins from which the pulp was taken.

In Case of Accident.

In every household should be a bottle of linseed oil and limewater, together with a roll of absorbent cotton and pieces and strips of old linen for bandages, all in a convenient place to use in case of burns.

Testing Woolens.

In testing a piece of cloth to see if it is a cotton mixture cut a small piece off and put a match to it. If it is all wool it will only singe, but if cotton is there it will flare up.

A Prodigious Egg.

There is being exhibited in Liverpool a prodigious egg, that of a tall, flightless bird—the Aepyornis maximus—which formerly inhabited the island of Madagascar. The eggs of this immense creature are nearly a yard in circumference and a foot in length, and their cubical contents, roughly speaking, are equal to six ostrich eggs, or 150 hens' eggs, or 60,000 humming birds' eggs, or two gallons of water. The market price ranges from £35 to £60, only twenty known specimens being in existence.

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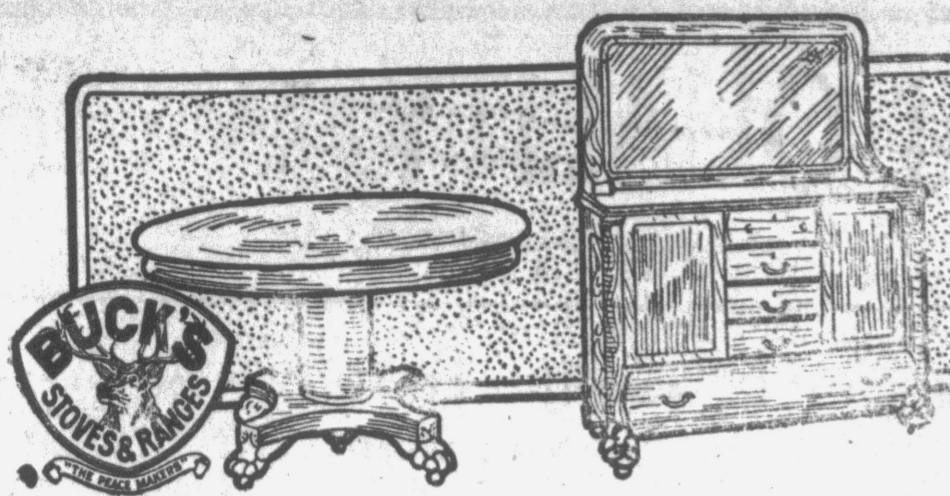

**BEWARE OF CANDIDATES WHO
SEEK THE SYMPATHY OF THE
LAWLESS ELEMENT.**

The Statesville Landmark in commenting on an article in The Reflector in which was asked the question "Is the Republican party a refuge for the lawless?" says:

There is something in this suggestion. The Landmark does not charge that the Republican party encourages lawlessness, or that as a rule its candidates promise immunity to the lawless. But it is true that some of the Republican candidates, directly and indirectly, appeal to the prejudices of those who oppose the liquor laws, and the violators of those laws, and those in sympathy with them, are led to believe that if the Republicans win they will be given greater liberty in these matters than under a Democratic administration. It is just as well to keep an eye on the candidate who in any way appeals to the sympathy of the lawless. All good citizens should stand, and all right-thinking citizens will stand, for the enforcement of the law and the punishment of the violators of the law. No matter if they think the law is an improper one, so long as it is on the statute book it should be enforced, and he who in any manner whatever encourages violators of any law is not a proper man to hold office—is not a proper man to make or execute laws.

It is a sad day for any country or section when the lawless element is strong enough to exercise influence on public officers; when to get votes for office candidates appeal to those who are not in sympathy with law and order; and every good citizen, every man who believes in law and order and civilization—and every good citizen does—should, regardless of party affiliation, set the seal of disapproval on any such tendency.

North Carolina will have a \$15,000 building at the Jamestown exposition. It will be used as headquarters for visitors from this State and contain educational and historical exhibits. The regular State exhibits will occupy large space in the main exposition buildings.

The Supreme court has decided against the mandamus of the lower court to compel the aldermen of Raleigh to order an election on the question of prohibition. The ground of denial was the provision against voting within 90 days before or after a general election.
