SEE WHERE THEY STAND.

The Republicans Still Bid for The Negro Vote.

The following is a chapter from the National Republican Campaign Text-Book for this year, which shows how they are still bidding for the negro vote: (Republican Text-Book for the Congressional campaign, 1906—page 249.)

"Our Colored Citizens."

"No more striking contrast as to the attitude of the two great parties touching their adherence to the principle that all men are created equal' can be made than that afforded by the course of events North and South during the past quarter of a century. In the North where Republicanism is strongest, colored citizens, although a minority of the population, are given participation in the control of municipalities, counties and States, and are frequently elected to public office in these respective units of our governmental system; in the South, the stronghold of Democracy, the colored citizen is being systematically disfranchised and barred from effective participation in the conduct of public affairs, and each year witnesses a narrowing of his political and civil rights. The mere mention of the facts well known to every observer of the times will suffice to indicate the relative attitude of the two great political parties toward the colored citizens. The Republican party believes in the political equality of all men without reference to race or nationality, and this belief it has supported by the most costly and sanguinary war in the history of our national history. The Democratic party believes in restricting the citizenship of a particular class and has written her opinion into the statutes, constitutions and practices of nearly every Southern State where that party is dominant. The Republican party believes in the doctrine so tersely expressed by President Roosevelt—"All men up, rather than some men down—and it has always encouraged the colored citizens in his efforts and ambitions to rise higher in the scale of civilization. The Democratic party would deny the negro the incentive to high aspirations, and boasts through its representatives of purpose to exclude colored men from any voice in the control of local affairs. Senator Gorman, high in the Democratic councils of his party, clearly stated the manifest intention of the Democracy to decitizenize, as far as possible, the colored voters of the country, and in a recent speech declared: "The South has passed through scenes of turbulence and disorder and rape and riot. By amendments to the State Constitutions, and by legislation the whites (of the South) have secured control, for the time being, of their own local governments, and the colored race is no longer a political factor in any State south of the Potomac." A merger of Railroads.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 16.—The Norfolk & Southern Railway and the Virginia & Carolina Coast Railway were today merged when the stockholders of the two lines met in this city and confirmed the consolidation effected by the directors of the two companies. The stockholders also authorized an increase in the capital stock from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000. Suffolk, Va., was made the northern terminus of the combined roads, and Columbia, N. C., the southern terminus. The Pamlico, Oriental & Western Railroad was sold to the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad and certain matters affecting the John L. Roper Lumber Company, brought practically into the consolidation, were disposed of as planned.

longer respects the time-honored maxim that governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed,' and that only a portion of the citizenry, are in the opinion of its leaders, entitled to a voice in public affairs.

"The Republican party encourages the highest character in the negro; the Democratic party seeks to degrade it. No Republican governor would dare veto a measure for the education of any class of citizens in the rudiments of knowledge yet that is just what has recently been done by the chief executive of Mississippi. The Republican party is on record as being in favor of the most liberal policies with respect to negro education, believing that no other position is consistent with the preservation of our popular institutions."

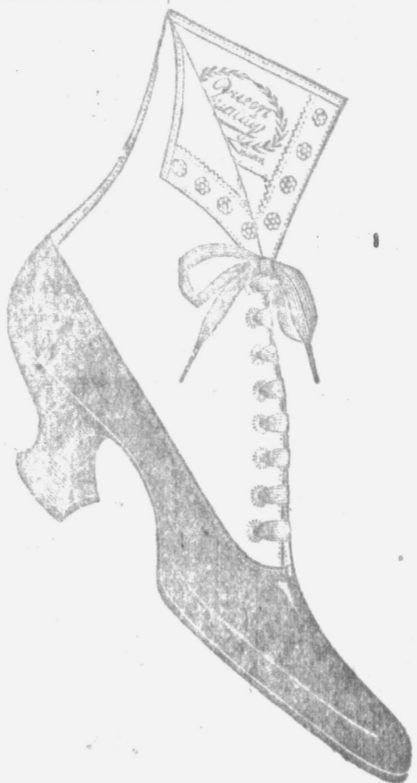

WATERMARKS IN PAPER.

The Ancient Devices Used In the Time of Caxton and Faust.

Watermarks have proved themselves invaluable for safeguarding against the forgery of bank notes, bills, stamps, etc., though the difficulty experienced by the Bank of England in evolving a mark defying imitation was very great and was accomplished by the execution of forgeries innumerable.

Many a will has been set aside owing to false dates in watermarks, for, thanks to watermarks, we are under no uncertainty respecting the date of the existence of the paper. Ireland's celebrated Shakespearean forgeries were, however, perpetrated with skillful recognition of the watermark difficulty.

Driven to the production of manuscripts, he set to work to purchase old volumes for their fly leaves, and, hearing that the "jug" was the prevalent watermark of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, he selected such as had the "jug" on, being careful to mingle with them a certain number of blank leaves, in order that the production on a sudden of so many identical watermarks might not arouse suspicion.

Two of the earliest watermarks consist of a circle surmounted by a cross, representing the pastoral benediction of a priest. Post paper takes its name from the post horn, which mark appears on a shield, and in the seventeenth century is surmounted by a ducal coronet, in which form it is still met with on our ordinary note paper.

The ox's head was another ancient watermark, on which Caxton and Faust printed some of their books, but Caxton used a watermark in the form of the letter "P" for the "Game and Plays of the Chesse," first printed in 1474.

The first edition of Shakespeare, printed by Isaac Jaggard and Edward Blount in 1623, will, however, be found to be mostly on paper bearing a cap like a jockey's as a watermark, and the general use of the term "cap" for various modern papers is owing to marks of this kind.—London Globe.

Mirrors.

The earliest looking glasses, or mirrors, were of either metal, highly polished, or of black painted mica. It is noted in Jewish history that the laver was made of brass "of the looking glasses of the women assembling, which assembled at the door of the tabernacle of the congregation," and some commentators conjecture that these women gave up their bronze or copper hand mirrors to supply the material for the laver. Egyptian women always carried their mirrors to the temples, and the Hebrew women probably did likewise, as do the Arabian and Turkish women today. Glass mirrors are of comparatively recent date. Mirrors of silver and gold were commonly used in mediaeval times. In 1860 Venice became the seat of the manufacture of glass mirrors, which have since superseded all other varieties, the improvements in the manufacture of plate glass enabling mirrors to be made of great size.

Senator Hoar's Marblehead.

On one of Senator Hoar's annual pilgrimages to Marblehead with Worcester friends he expressed a wish to meet some "genuine" Marbleheaders. While driving down Front street Uncle Bill High was espied, and Edward W. Doherty thought no more genuine Marbleheader could be found.

The carriage came to a halt while the two men were made acquainted. After a few remarks about the weather, fishing, etc., the senator, with a twinkle in his eye, asked, "Can we drive around to Gloucester this way?" pointing to the east.

Uncle Bill saw the twinkle and quickly answered, "Yes, if your horses are webfooted and you've got strong faith in the Almighty."

Treatment of Wounds.

When binding up cuts and wounds always use linen, not cotton, as the fibers of cotton are apt to irritate a sore place, and those of linen are perfectly round.

Cleaning Bronze.

Clean bronze with the solution: one dram of sweet oil, one ounce each of alcohol and water. Apply the quickly with a soft sponge, but do not rub.
