AVERDICT OF GUILTY.

Returned Again to Standard Oil Company,
of Ohio—Jury Deliberated Thirty
Two Hours.

Findlay, Ohio, October 19.—
By the verdict of a jury the Standard Oil Company of Ohio, is guilty of conspiracy against trade in violation of the Valentine anti-trust law of Ohio.

The penalty is a fine of from \$50 to \$5,000, which may be repeated for each day of the offence, or imprisonment of from six to twelve months.

The Standard Oil Company of Ohio, has given notice that it will file a motion for a new trial.

The next step will be for the court to impose the penalty. To the state, the suit, the verdict and the ultimate appeal is important particularly because it initiates an entirely new method of proceeding against alleged trade monopolies—that is by confirmation and affidavit instead of by grand jury indictment.

After the verdict had been read, Attorney Troup stepped up to the bar of the court as the jury was leaving the box and said he wished to make the motion for a new trial in the case. He was assured by the court that the motion would be entertained, whereupon he returned to his hotel.

An Unusual Case in Wilkes.

Wilkes is hard to head. About two weeks ago Mitchell Wood went to Pres Hayes, in Mulberry township, and sold him a calf to get money to purchase license to wed Geneva Higgins. Next day he was dissatisfied, went back, handed over the money and took the calf home. A few days later he again took the calf to Pres, got the money and came to town and bought the license. He was married soon afterwards, but his bride refused to go home with him and still refuse to live with him. It is something new in the marriage line.

Cleanse at night and apply the following cream: Calomel, five grains; sulphur, five grains; oil of cade, one-half dram; rose ointment sufficient to make one ounce.—Boston Traveler.

To Remove Ink From Paper.
Ink can be removed from paper, if the stain is not too old, as follows: Take a teaspoonful of chlorinated lime and add just enough water to cover it; take a soft cloth, moisten it in the mixture and pat (do not rub) the stain gently, and it will slowly disappear. 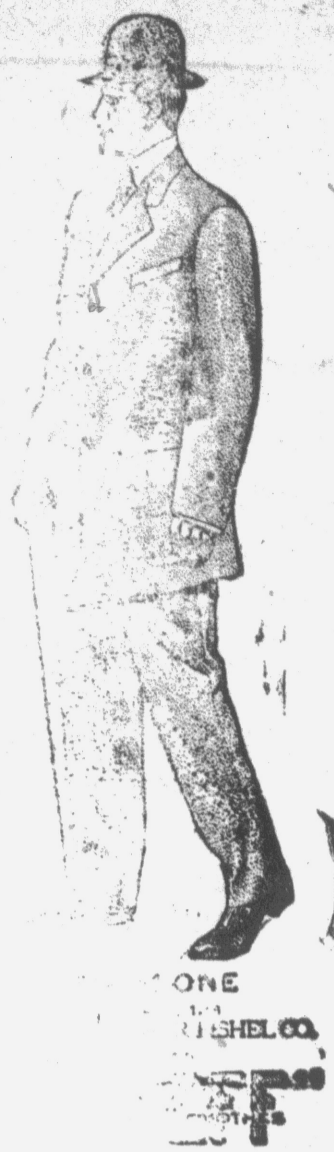

Dry Cleaning Laces.

To dry clean laces wash in either gasoline or naphtha. If all the dust and spots are not removed the first time clean them in the same way a second time, and repeat the process until they look like new. If possible do this cleansing out of doors, where there will be no danger of fire or of an explosion. Hang the pieces out of doors when cleaned, so the disagreeable odor that often lingers after dry cleaning will be done away with.

GOOD ROADS.

Farmers who live in counties that are minus good roads, have to stay at home in weather like we are having this week. No sort of weather keeps the Mecklenburg farmer at home. He can clip it to town like a crank car on steel rails.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Such items as this are enough to make water come in the mouths of the down Easterners who live along side of the mud roads. Just think of roads over which people can clip along to town in any kind of weather! There is nothing that Pitt county is more in need of. We have a great county in some respects, but in the matter of roads we are away behind. Our progress in this line will continue to be slow as long as the present methods of road making are kept up. The thing to do is issue bonds sufficient to build good roads all over the country and push the work as rapidly as possible. The people are gradually coming around to this way of thinking, and the sentiment of good roads is growing.

JOYS OF THE SIGHTLESS.

The Blind Take More Pleasure in Travel Than Many Suppose.

A blind man was making a tour of the New England coast on his vacation. In Maine, in the pretty village of Cashe, a lady said as she waited with him at the pier:

"What pleasure is there in travel for a blind man?"

"More pleasure than you think," he replied. "I enjoy this fine, invigorating wind from the sea as well as you do. The noise of the water is as pleasant to me as to you, and the warmth of the sunshine is as agreeable, and when we get aboard the boat do you think I shan't appreciate the swift sail seaward?"

"The blind are not so blind as the world imagines. When I walk the streets I know the shops I am passing by their odors. Meat, perfumes, tobacco, leather and flowers tell me as well as eyes would that a butcher's, a tobacconist's, a shoemaker's or a florist's is near."

"So it is in the country. A spicy smell tells me I am in a grove of pines. The sweet breath of new mown hay floats from the meadows, and in fancy I see the haymakers. The wild blackberries have their pungent odor, and it is easy to know the presence of the wild honeysuckle. The lowing cows, the neigh of a horse, the bleating of sheep tell me the occupants of the field I pass, and the gurgle of water assures me that in that field is a running brook."

"Do you wonder how a blind man makes his way in a crowded street? I will tell you. He walks fearlessly as long as he hears nothing, but when the sound of approaching footsteps reaches him he turns a little to the right and passes by without delay and without collision. Farther on he meets children. Children are easy to recognize by their noisy prattle and their light, quick, irregular steps. And the blind man, knowing that it is difficult to count with any degree of certainty upon the actions of these little people, goes very prudently, creeping along at a snail's pace until the children are passed."

"He knows a street crossing by the increased violence of the wind, the louder noises and the gradual descent of the pavement for some forty or fifty feet. He knows when he draws near a wall or big stationary object by the different sound his steps have and by the different feel to his flesh of the air, which is much more compressed."

"A blind man gets along better on a dark night than at any other time, for then all the world goes cautiously and slowly, and there is little danger of being run over or run down."—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Study of the Wild.

There is no more healthful and instructive recreation for the intelligent boy (or man, either, for that matter) than that which is easily obtainable by studying the ways of the wild things that inhabit the swamps, woods and forests in the vicinity of the town in which he lives. It is good for brain, nerves, eyes and muscles. It is good for the disposition, too, for the more you know of any living creatures (except beasts of prey, rattlesnakes and such) the less inclined to do them an injury. Ignorance is the parent of cruelty. One need not seek the great forests of the north and west to study wild things and their ways. The habits of many interesting birds and smaller wild animals may be studied at the expense of a not very long walk by the dwellers in most country towns all over the United States and Canada.—Field and Stream.

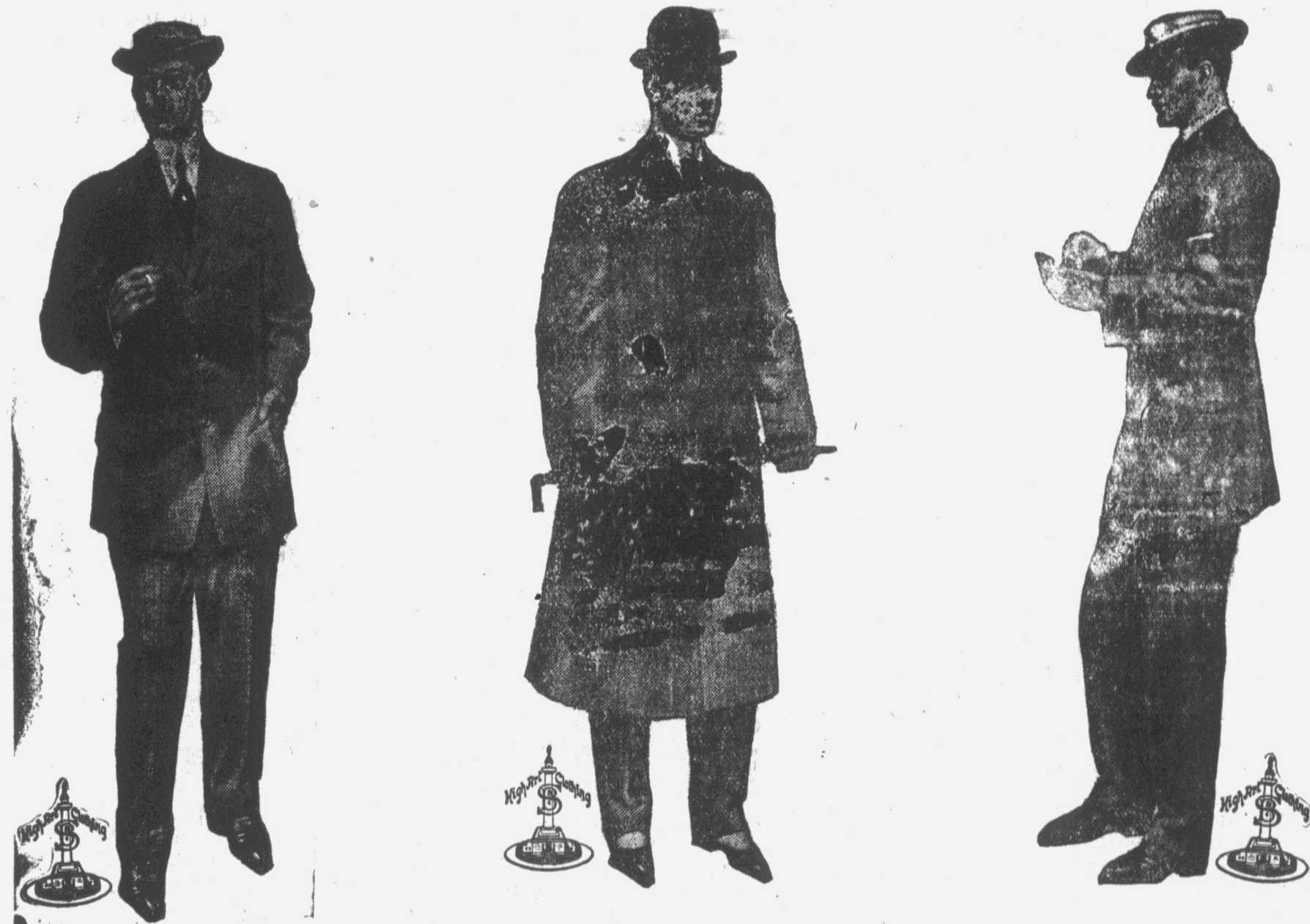
