A Buggy Sixty Years Old.

The buggy in which Joseph E. Brown, Georgia's civil war governor, drove his bride, in 1848, from South Carolina to his home at Canton, Ga., has been donated to the citizens of Canton by Mrs. E. L. Connally, who had purchased the old vehicle for \$10.

The Joseph E. Brown estate made a formal presentation to the town of Canton Friday of the old Brown homestead and four acres of ground, to be used as a park. At this time Mrs. Connally also gave the town the old buggy in which Gov. Brown and his bride rode all the way from South Carolina. The vehicle is very valuable as a memento, and will be placed in the kitchen of the old-fashioned country mansion, where it can be carefully preserved from the weather.

The buggy, though almost sixty years old, has suffered but little from the attacks of time, and is still sound and strong. It is very unusual looking, and has great tall wheels that rise high up along the sides. It was built in Atlanta.—Atlanta Constitution.

QUEER SUICIDES

Suicide is becoming a national grievance. Human life is held so cheap in some places that men and women take their lives for frivolous causes.

It is so common in Oriental countries that persons take their lives frequently in mere sport.

In last week's record a case is given of the suicide of a woman because she could not procure a servant maid, two other cases are given of women because their cooks had left without cause.

The case of a man who committed suicide because his wife would not allow him to eat onions at the table is recorded. But the queerest of all is the case of an old physician seventy-five years old who committed suicide because he was tired of living. He left a paper writing in which he stated that he regretted to take his own life and thus become a murderer and an ingrate and suggested that each community should have an institute for suicides whose duty it would be to furnish a speedy and painless death for those who desired to leave the world and go hence.

It was a serious subject with which he dealt and he met it deliberately. He said that he abhorred death by murder upon which God had placed his signet of infamy, and he was unwilling to fling back in the face of the Almighty a gift which he had meant as a benediction.

Suicide is a very serious thing. Legislation has failed to correct it. Religious bodies have denounced it. In some countries respectful burial have denied them.—R. B. Creecy in Elizabeth City Economist

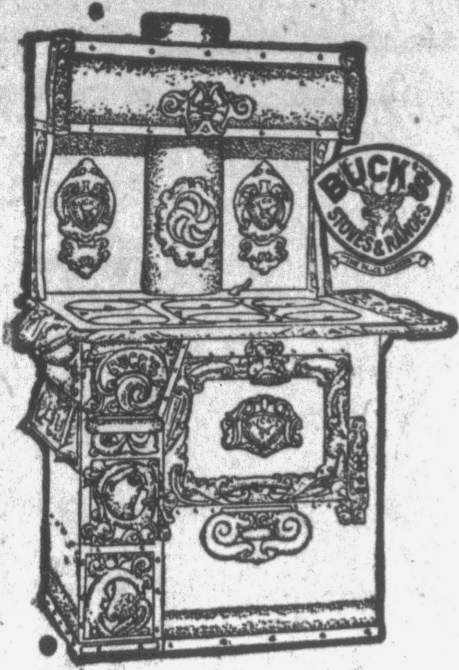

FATE AND ANDREW JACKSON.

What Going West, Not East, Meant to the Fiery Lawyer.

During the young manhood of Andrew Jackson, when he rode the circuit in Tennessee, knowing more law than most of his brethren at the bar, afraid of nothing on earth, ready to challenge to a duel some trained lawyer from the older settlements when that lawyer trespassed upon his own preserves and made fun of his ignorance—as Waightstill Avery did—thus holding his ground against all comers, partly by brute force and partly by mental superiority, he was probably nearer to happiness than he ever was afterward.

From court to court he rode his race horse, pistols in holsters, carrying his gun and his pack of hounds, ready for the courthouse, ready for the deer chase, ready for the shooting match, ready for the horse race, ready for the house raising and log rolling, ready to go out himself and drag into the courthouse the desperado whom the sheriff feared to arrest.

Rough and tumble times these were in backwoods Tennessee, with rude and lawless elements boiling and bubbling in that inevitable period of unrest and struggle which prevails in border settlements before the community takes form and everybody smugly congratulates everybody else on the "reign of law and order."

In just such a state of society young Jackson was peculiarly fitted to lead, dominate and prosper.

Had he gone eastward instead of westward, had he cast in his lot with the lawyers that were striving for advancement in the cities of the original thirteen seaboard states, nothing is more certain than that the world would never have heard of him.

His lack of knowledge of the law would have made him easy prey to those who were masters of this profession. His fiery temper would have kept him constantly in battle array, and in fighting those lawyers who got the better of him in the citation of legal authorities he would, in the nature of things, have met the wrong man sooner or later.—Watson's Magazine.

Does not the waving of your country's flag make your heart beat faster and your blood quicken? Look closer and on every fold of Old Glory you will find, written in the blood of freemen, the immortal truths of Democracy.—Asheville-Citizen.

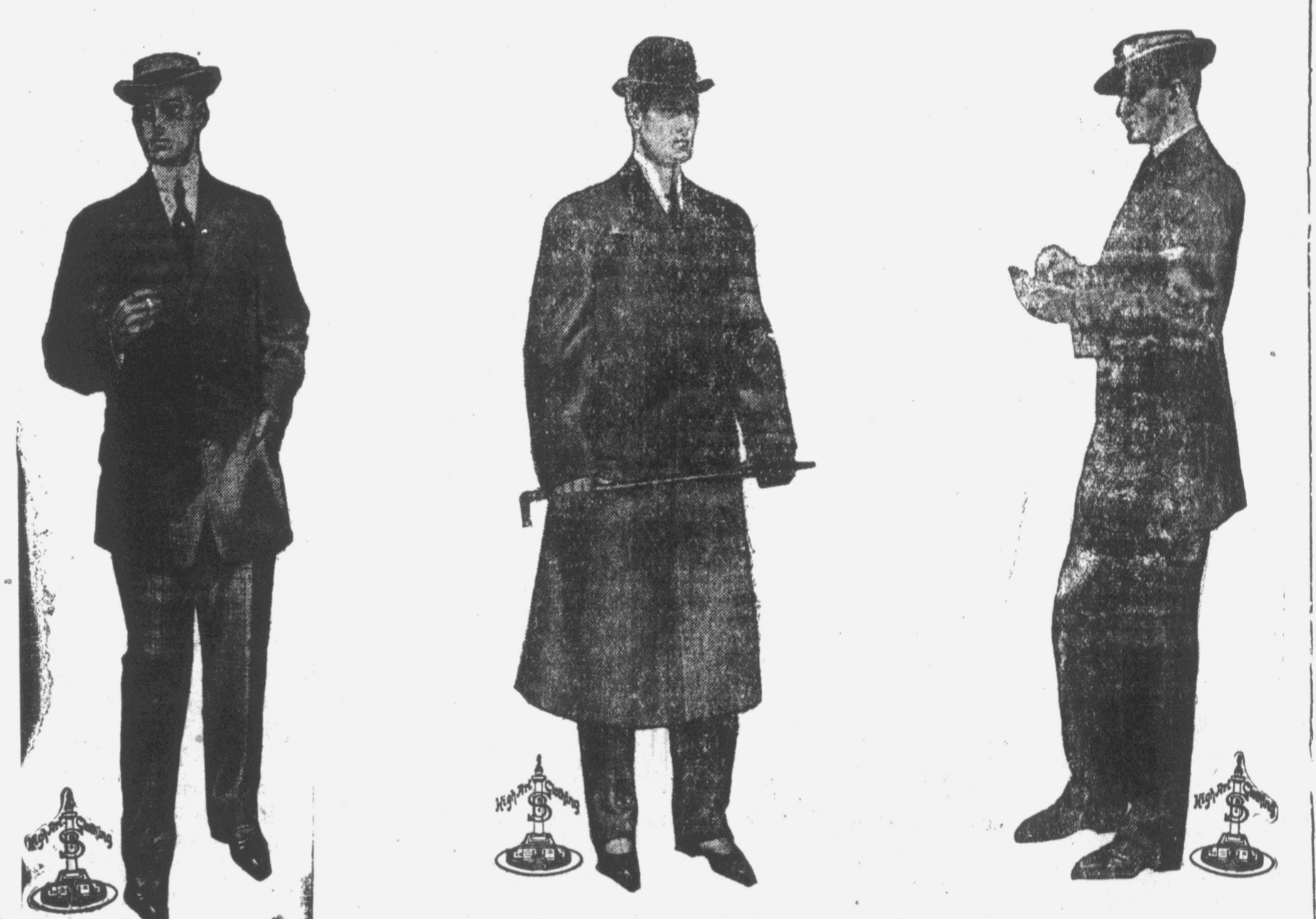


