PURNELL ROASTED.

Sheriff Stedman Replies to the Judge.

Wilmington, N. C., Nov. 5.—Sheriff Frank H. Stedman, is out in a signed card in the morning papers today replying to the sensational charges as to the condition of the New Hanover jail by Judge Purnell in the Federal court last week. The card of Sheriff Stedman is as follows:

"I wish to state that the reflections made upon me and my jailer in the United States court by Judge Purnell when I was not present were false and unjust in regard to the fare of prisoners in my custody in New Hanover county jail. The report of the grand jury of our county made at the September term of our court, and also the reports of previous grand juries, all composed of our best citizens substantiate what I say. The question at issue is who is to be believed, the grand jury or the United States prisoners? Would not Judge Purnell have reflected more credit upon himself if he had investigated before he made such statements? I am willing for my record and his record to be published side by side and let the people of North Carolina say who is right in this matter."

DR. BAXTER MATTHEWS A SUICIDE IN BALTIMORE.

Last Chapter in a Sensational Wife-Murder by a Greensboro Physician.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 5.—In a cheap lodging house on East Baltimore street at some time during the twenty-four hours preceding two o'clock this afternoon, Dr. J. Baxter Matthews, of Greensboro, N. C., blew out his brains with a shot from a 32 calibre revolver.

Dr. Matthews was convicted March 9th, 1905, at Greensboro, of the poisoning of his wife December 1st, 1905. He had been out of custody under bail pending the decision of his appeal for a new trial, which was denied him, and relatives and bondsmen have been searching for him for some weeks that he might be taken before the court to be sentenced. In the absence of a valid reason for his taking his life, it is supposed that he did so rather than serve the sentence, said to be twenty years in the penitentiary, to be imposed on him.

At the lodging house where he ended his life he gave the name of E. J. Graham.

Immediately after his conviction, which was of murder in the second degree, Dr. Matthews became a patient at Mount Hope Retreat, near this city, and was there under treatment for the morphine and liquor habits for some months, finally being discharged as cured.

HUGHES BEATS HEARST.

North Carolina Elects Every Democratic Congressman.

Old Pitt County covers Herself in Glory and Buries the Republicans Deeper Than Ever.

News From All Over the Country—as Received in Telegraph Bulletines.

Tuesday was a good day for the Democrats. North Carolina did well in electing a solid Democratic congressional delegation, and when you look at Pitt county's majorities running from 1391 to 1999 it shows that Democracy is here to stay.

Below we give the news from the different states in condensed form.

NEW YORK.

Buffalo—At 5:30 p. m. state chairman Connor said that Buffalo will give Hughes a plurality of 3,500 and Erie county approximately 5,000.

Elmira—Complete returns of city give Hughes 6,936 plurality. Cheurning county gives Hughes 3,146, Hearst 3,842.

Gloversville—City complete gives Hughes 2,393, Hearst 1,903. Amsterdam City gives Hughes 170 plurality.

New York—The first World bulletin says returns indicate that Hughes has about 8,000 majority in Kings county. Hughes carried Oyster Bay by 105.

The Herald flashlight says the state is doubtful but indicates Hughes election.

Utica—Complete returns gives Hughes 6,596, Hearst 6,606.

World bulletin says indications are that Hearst's majority in Manhattan and Bronx will be 35,000, while Hughes carries Kings county by 11,000.

The Times says indications are that Hughes is elected.

Troy City vote complete gives Hughes 9,036, Hearst 9,252. In 1904, Herrick received 8,311, Higgins 9,761, Republican loss of 1,616.

Oyster Bay—She fifth district, President Roosevelt's home, gave Hughes 105 majority.

Syracuse—City complete gives Hughes 15,676, Hearst 11,750, Democratic gain of 214 over 1904.

Brooklyn—Mr Hearst said early tonight "The few telegrams I have received are very encouraging. I believe I will win. I believe I will win. I expected 200,000, but if this is cut I shall be satisfied."

The Herald says indications are that Hearst carries Greater New York by 60,000.

The Brooklyn Eagle, which supported Hughes, says it now looks like Hearst has carried Erie county by 1,500 and Greater New York by 60,000.

The Times says indications are Hughes is elected by 30,000 majority, but Democrats possibly elect balance of state ticket.

The Word says indications at 8 p. m. are that Hearst will have

60,000 in Greater New York and that Hughes will come down in Bronx with 60,000

The Herald says Timothy Woodruff claims the state for Hughes by 35,000.

At 9 o'clock it was stated at Democratic headquarters that election of Hughes was not conceded by state committee. No estimates of pluralities being made.

The Times says at 8:40 Hughes is elected by 40,000 to 50,000 and entire state ticket.

The Evening Post which supported Hughes, claims at 8:30 Hughes election by 40,000 with remainder state ticket in doubt.

Max Ishman, Hearst's campaign manager, said at 9:35 he believed Hearst had safe majority despite claims to the contrary.

Lewis S. Chandler, candidate for lieutenant governor on Independent League and Democratic ticket, when told that he had been elected said "I should be very sorry indeed to be elected if Mr. Hearst be defeated."

When seen at his home at 9:30 Mr. Hughes said, "I am very much gratified if I am elected as it now seems to be to be the case, but I am not accustomed to speak in detail upon matters about which there may be any uncertainty. I understand, however, that my election is pretty well assured, but whatever my plurality may be my feeling is not one of elation but responsibility."

The Herald says entire Tammany judicial ticket elected by large majority.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston—Ten cities and towns in Massachusetts gave Guild, (Rep.) for governor, 2,963, Moran (Dem) 2,242. Same districts last year gave Guild 2,727, Bartlett 2,149.

Fifty cities and towns gave Guild 13,507, Moran 7,783. Last year they gave Guild 12,606, Bartlett 8,586.

The congressional districts in this State elect one Democrat and eight Republicans.

OKLAHOMA.

Reports so far received indicate large Democratic majority in constitutional convention.

KANSAS

Topeka—Meagre reports indicate that Governor Hock, Republican, is re-elected by less than 20,000.

SOUTH DAKOTA.

Deep interest in election in this state. Crawford is elected governor, but Republican majorities are generally cut down.

FLORIDA.

All Democrats in state elected. Legislature unanimously Demo-

cratic. The proposition to drain everglades seems defeated.

INDIANA.

Republicans claim state from 48,000 to 54,000.

MICHIGAN.

Detroit—Returns coming in slow, Republicans elect congressmen, and governor, by about 10,000.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Philadelphia—Scattering returns indicate large Republican gains as compared with last year.

WISCONSIN.

Milwaukee—Early returns from interior towns show Davidson, Republican, running two to one against Ayler, Democrat.

NEW JERSEY.

Newark—It is stated from reliable source that the Democratic candidate for congress in ninth district is elected by 20,000 majority.

At late hour it is indicated Republicans have 44 members assembly and Democrats 16, this will give Republicans majority of 39 on joint ballot.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

Concord—Early returns while showing lighter vote than in 1902 indicate slight Republican gains.

GEORGIA

Atlanta—Election quiet in state all districts elect Democratic congressmen.

RHODE ISLAND.

Providence—Republican and Democratic vote here about the same as last year.

UTAH.

Congressman-at-large Howell, Republican, elected.

CONNECTICUT.

New Haven—The towns are reporting early and indicate entire Republican state ticket and all Congressmen re-elected by pluralities as large as two years ago.

IOWA.

The vote for governor is large. Cummins' plurality of 1904 will be much reduced, but indications point to his re-election.

DELAWARE.

Wilmington—A large vote was polled in state. Democrats are elected in 4th, 5th and 8th districts. Republicans carry state and will control legislature electing United States Senator.

NORTH CAROLINA

Raleigh—Weather was exceptionally fine all over State. Returns show larger vote than expected, running only a little under presidential votes.

Returns up to 10 o'clock appear to show election of Hackett in 8th and Crawford in 10th districts. Hackett gained 203 votes in Blakely's home county. His total gain so far is 660, Crawford made good gain in Haywood. Hackett carried Iredell by 100, Stanley by 200. Republicans made heavy gain in city of Asheville.

Democrats carry State by approximately 45,000. According to most careful estimate they elect a congressmen. Fight was hot in 8th and 10th districts. The congressmen elected are J. H. Small, Claude Kitchen, C. R. Thomas, E. W. Pou, W. W. Kitchen, H. L. Goodwin, R. N. Page, R. N. Hackett, E. Y. Webb and W. T. Crawford.

THE OLD NATIONAL PIKE.

A Maryland representative has taken charge of the bill to rebuild the old national turnpike. This is the oldest east and west thoroughfare in the United States. It is the route that Braddock took to Fort Duquesne. Washington marched over it often. More than a century ago it was made a national road, and for forty years it had more traffic than any other road in the country. Beginning at Baltimore, it went almost due west to Frederick. South of Hagerstown, Md., it was joined by turnpikes from York, Harrisburg, Lancaster and Philadelphia. Thence it went on to Cumberland and to Wheeling. Joined by the Pittsburg turnpike, the old national road went through the Ohio valley and on to Illinois, which was then the end of civilization. Over this road the old Conestoga wagons carried eastern farmers to the western frontier. The old stage coaches brought General Jackson and Henry Clay over it to their seats in congress. To restore this road and to make it a great thoroughfare between the east and the west would revive many memories and help illustrate the political history of the olden times.—New York World.

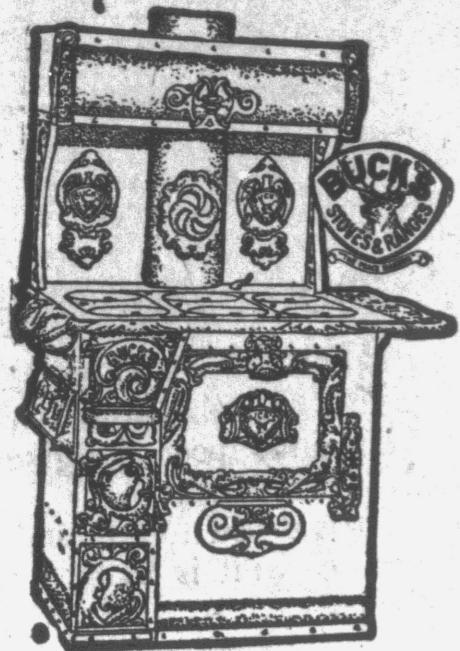

To Wash Challis.

For washing challis rice water is the best. Boil one pound of rice in five quarts of water. When cool put the challis in with the rice and water and wash well, using the rice much as you would soap. If no rinsing is used the rice will have a good effect on the fabric.

Cleaning White Ribbons.

White ribbons—satin, messaline, louisine and the rest of the satiny kinds—which have become soiled may be washed in tepid water in which soap jelly has been dissolved. Stretch them out upon a board to dry—an ironing board covered with clean muslin is splendid for the purpose—pinning the ends firmly, so as to stretch the ribbon beyond the need of pressing if possible.

ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Suggestions For the Sickroom—Prevention of Bed Sores.

Bed sores are liable to occur in any long illness, especially where there is paralysis of both limbs and back that involves the nerves that provide nutrition for the tissues. Usually, however, they bespeak a neglectful nurse. They are first shown by permanent redness of the bony prominences where the patient rests. If not attended to the redness soon becomes purple, followed by more serious conditions that are hard to cope with. This the nurse must prevent, first by keeping the under sheet absolutely smooth and free from crumbs. Bathe the back from four to a dozen times a day with alcohol and water, half and half, dry carefully with the hand, then powder. Make also a ring cushion filled with hair or cotton or use a circular pillow covered with linen or cotton and place the sore spot in the center.

Elderberry Wine.

This is a fine old-fashioned wine, such as our grandmothers used medicinally. Strip the berries from the stems until you have five gallons if you wish to make it in quantity. Add ten gallons of water and cook twenty minutes before straining through a hair sieve. Do not press the berries too closely, as you wish the wine to be clear. Measure this and return to the boiler. Allow to each gallon of the strained juice three pounds and a half of granulated sugar and the juice of five lemons. Cook twenty minutes and turn into a keg or demijohn, which should be nearly full. When cool put in a yeast cake soaked in tepid water. Let this stand until fermentation is complete, then in about six weeks rack off and bottle.

Test For Oleomargarine.

Take a little piece of glass and rub a dab of the doubtful article upon it. If it is simon pure butter when you hold it to the light it will show a smooth blue. If it is oleomargarine there will be a yellowish streak at the bottom. The crystals of beef fat are white. The difference between pure and adulterated article can be told in the same way. The hand made a smooth blue, while the imitation which has a large percentage of oleomargarine compressed from beef fat, shows the same stearin crystals.

Cider.

This is a delicate drink and is nice either hot or cold. Being cooked in the sweet cider gives it a delicate apple flavor. Wash and scrub a medium sized ham and soak for twenty-four hours in plenty of cold water to cover. Wipe dry, put in a large agate kettle and fill with sweet cider. Add a bay leaf if desired, boil gently, allowing fifteen minutes to the pound. Allow it to cool in the cider, then skin and wipe the fat with a soft cloth. Garnish with vegetables and meat jelly.

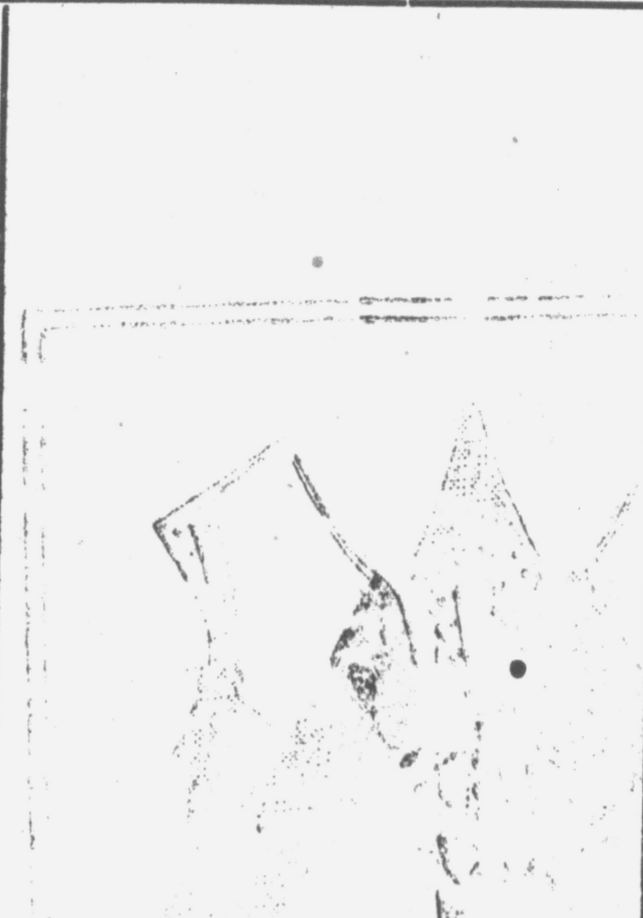


