## VALUABLE REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA GEOLOGICAL AND ECONOMIC SURVEY.

There has just come from the press of the public printer Economic Paper No. 13 of the North Carolina Geological and Economic Survey, which is a report of the committee appointed by Governor R. B. Glenn to investigate the fishing industries in North Carolina. This committee met in Morehead City the 3rd of September and spent the following five days carefully and thoroughly investigating the problems relating to the fin fish and shell fish industries. In this report it is earnestly urged that the legislature make provision for a fish commission and a shell fish commission in North Carolina. Suggestions are also recommended for such legislation as will more thoroughly protect and increase the value of our fishing industries.

It has been conclusively demonstrated that the amount of apparatus that is fished in North Carolina is considerably greater than the fisheries of the State can support. This is most noticeable in the decrease in the catch from year to year and it is absolutely necessary that there be some restriction. Of course the waters of North Carolina cover a great area and will support a large fishery, but they cannot support a fishery that is subject to indefinite extension.

A subject that was given most serious consideration and discussed in the minutest detail was the cultivation of the oyster and clam in the waters of North Carolina and suggestions are made regarding legislation which will throw open for cultivation certain definite areas or sea bottoms in North Carolina and provide an incontestable title to the lessees of the bottoms, which on the other hand will not in any way whatever interfere with the natural oyster bottoms.

All of the present fish and oyster laws were gone over very carefully by the committee and suggestions made regarding many of them which in the sense of the committee will make them more effective and of more real value in their protection of the oyster and fish industries.

Rotation of the Superior Court judges is no doubt an excellent thing in many respects, but it has its drawbacks, especially in relation to the criminal docket. ## THE PREACHER AND THE PUMP

### Trial in Federal Court of T. H. Barnhill Whose Cachet Witness Said Flowed Spirits.

In the Federal court yesterday was commenced the trial for retailing, removing and concealing liquor on his land of the "Rev." Thomas H. Barnhill, a "Free Will Baptist" preacher.

Two witnesses were examined whose testimony was very damaging to the defendant, the evidence tending to show that the preacher was both cunning and inventive in the method followed of storing and disposing of the ardent.

The case is a part of a Pitt county sensation of over a year ago, in which the Rev. Barnhill was charged with having been one of a party of white caps who attempted to take out and whip W. J. Teel, who had been active in giving information to the authorities with respect to illegal dealings in liquor. Mr. Teel was visited at night by a mob who dragged him from bed but whom he frightened off by opening fire upon them with a pistol. He afterwards found on the scene a bundle of switches which it is supposed the white caps had prepared for use as a punishment against the informer.

At the trial in Federal court yesterday, a witness, L. C. James, testified that he had taken an excursion into the woods with the defendant in search of refreshment; that the preacher defendant had a good nose and soon located a rich strike, the outward symbol of which was a pump handle. When the defendant bore down on the pump, the witness stated that there flowed a stream of the pure stuff of a savoury odour and that of the same they then and there took and transported for future consumption four one gallon jugs and a five gallon demijohn. Witness stated that afterwards he went back into the woods upon a search for the pump of joy unending and found it; that connected with the handle was a well of ten barrels of liquor.

Only one other witness was examined during the sitting of the court yesterday. There will be in all twenty-five or more witnesses called and the case will not be concluded under two or possibly three days.

The jury yesterday returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Tony Evans, a blind-tiger keeper of Greenville. Sentence has not yet been passed.—News and Observer.

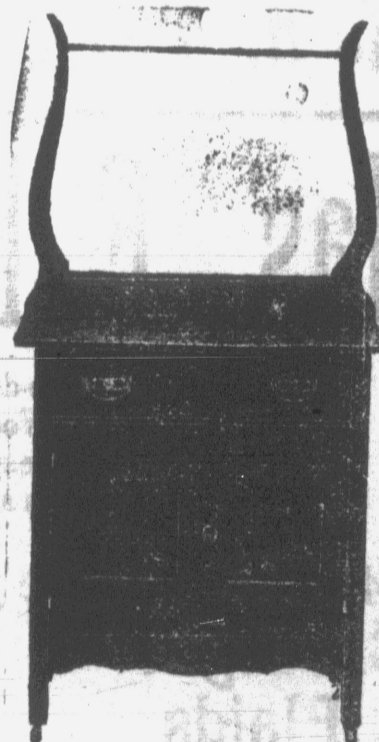

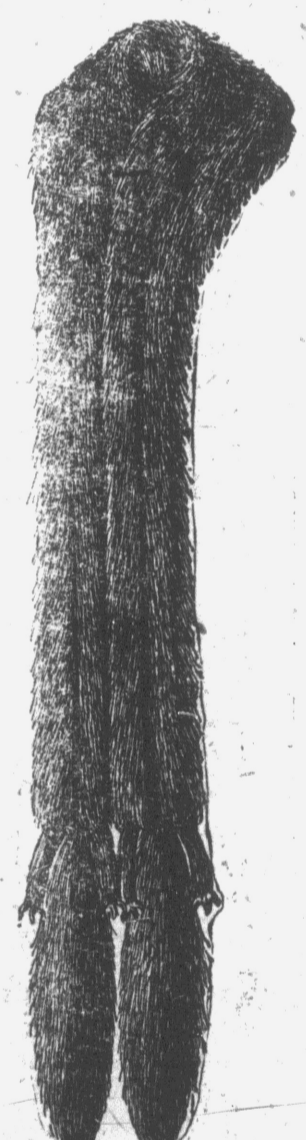
