**GREENVILLE WAKING UP.**

**Chamber of Commerce Holds Enthusiastic Meeting—Asks Aldermen to Increase Donation to Public Library.**  
The large and enthusiastic gathering of business men at the special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Thursday night, shows what Greenville can do when she makes up her mind. Only a few hours' notice of the meeting was given, yet the business men were there, and when they learned for what purpose the meeting was called enthusiasm was general. Several strong speeches were made and these indicated the earnestness with which the matter under discussion will be taken hold of. For reasons that were good the Chamber of Commerce requested that the details of the meeting be withheld from publication until plans are some better matured, or until the president and executive committee shall deem it best to make the matter public. Under these circumstances The Reflector does not give out the facts today, but our readers can rest assured that if the movement started secures the enterprise in prospect it will mean more for advancement of Greenville than anything ever inaugurated here. The Chamber of Commerce is going to leave nothing undone to accomplish the purpose in view. Another thing the Chamber of Commerce did at this meeting was to unanimously adopt a motion requesting the board of aldermen of the town to increase its donation from \$75 to \$150 a year to aid the public library. The library was established some time ago under the auspices of the End of the Century Book Club, and the people generally do not realize what a vast benefit it is. Numbers of people who could get good books to read in no other way are taking advantage of the benefit the library affords them. The ladies of the book club desire to enlarge the usefulness of the library, and the Chamber of Commerce shows its interest in the work. We believe that the aldermen at the next meeting of the board will gladly increase the donation from the town treasury to aid the good work.

**HARVIE JORDAN SAYS CROP NONE TOO LARGE.**

**Mills Will Absorb Every Bale Produced This Year.**  
Atlanta, Ga., Dec 12.—Harvie Jordan, president of the Southern Cotton Association, in an interview today upon the recent government estimate placing the crop of the current year at practically twelve and a half million bales, said:  
"The holders of spot cotton in the South should not become panicky over the recent estimate of the Bureau of Cotton Statistics and the heavy slump which followed in the speculative exchanges of the country. The enormous demand for spot cotton by the mills of the world will absorb every bale of American cotton produced this year before another crop can be harvested. There is not now as much cotton in the South to gather and gin as was the case one year ago, hence the present crop will never reach 12,000,000 bales. If we should gin as much cotton after December 1st this season as we did from the big crop of 1904, the total crop would not exceed 12,200,000 bales. Every one acquainted with the situation knows that there is no late cotton as was the case in 1904, as the top crop this year was killed by an unusually early frost. Granting that only 85 per cent of the crop was ginned to December 1, the total yield would not exceed 11,700,000 bales. The Bureau has overestimated the yield this year as badly as it underestimated the crop a year ago. The people are urged to hold their cotton firmly for good prices and the spot market can be fully maintained for the balance of the season."

AN UNJUST TAX.

The Reflector is opposed to fireworks, and if it had control of the matter would allow no more to be used promiscuously. This is not because of a desire to diminish the Christmas pleasure of the young people, but because we are afraid of fireworks and think them dangerous. But as long as they are permitted to be sold and used in Greenville, we do not think the merchants of the town should be discriminated against and treated unjustly in the matter of selling the fireworks. It certainly is a gross imposition that the merchants, doing business within the corporate limits of the town have to pay a tax of \$25 for the privilege of selling fireworks, while dealers just on the outskirts of the town can sell them without having to pay such tax, and therefore can undersell the man who does business in town. Of course the dealer who does business just over the line cannot be blamed for this, as it is a right he has but we believe in fairness, and a merchant should not be placed at a disadvantage just because he comes inside to do business and help make the town.

The merchant who does business in the town pays taxes into the town treasury on his stock, on his building and on his person, while the merchant just over the line does not pay a cent into the town treasury for anything. The merchant within the corporate limits also does his share to keep up the town, for in addition to paying municipal taxes he uses electric lights and water from the town plant, but those living in the suburbs do not help out in any of these things.

It would be nothing but just for the board of aldermen to refund the fireworks tax to every merchant who has paid it this season. Such discriminating taxes do not encourage business men, who are to be considered as much as any other factor in the upbuilding and support of the town. Treat the business men fairly and do not impose unjust special taxes on them.

Let us drop the hint that you can watch Greenville grow.

The spirit of co-operation that is taking hold of the business interests of Greenville is more than gratifying. It means taking on new life and it is going to show good results. We believe the coming year will show the greatest advancement the town has yet made.
