AN ARGUMENT AGAINST GOING ON BONDS.

The United States Government, so far as the Western North Carolina revenue district is concerned, is making money looking up judgments on old distillers' and tobacco manufacturers' bonds, and making collections on the same, where years ago they were uncollectable. During six months of this year the sum of \$10,000 was realized and the work of making "good" in other sections of the district goes on as the officer makes his report of investigations in new counties. These judgments are never barred by the statute of limitations. In 1861 a young clerk in a large tobacco manufacturing business, signed a bond for his employer, as a matter of form or perfunctory accommodation. As the years passed, the old tobacconist died, his business ceased, and all was forgotten, until one day the former clerk was served with process on an execution in favor of the government for \$30,000 on this old bond. He had in the meantime become a man of means, a banker and one of the first men in North Carolina church and political affairs. He was "thunderstruck," but there was the situation to face. By the aid of powerful friends and a blameless record, he was able to make a compromise with the government for \$1800.

The Wrong Eggs.

O. D. Pitts, a farmer of Carolina county, tells the following remarkable story; He says he was plowing with a pair of horses on his farm and turned up a nest containing what he supposed to be turtle eggs. He put them in his pocket to carry them home and experiment with as to their hatching qualities. There have been spring like days recently, but this change is going to make activity around the wood pile.

Let one thing that Greenville begins planning for early in the coming year be a creditable exhibit at the Jamestown exposition. The Chamber of Commerce can put in some good work along this line.

Greenville is in the midst of preparation for Christmas, and the holiday spirit is uppermost in the minds of the people for the time being. When the holidays are over you are going to see Greenville set in on the greatest era of progress the town has yet known.

Congress has voted to increase the pay of the vice president and members of the cabinet to \$12,000, but held up on increasing the pay of congressmen to \$7,500. Possibly this was through fear of giving the country too much of a jolt all at once. But bigger pay for the congressmen and senators is one of the coming things.

The Durham Herald's head writer, or perhaps the printer in reading the copy, calls them prisoners instead of pensioners. That appellation might have done during and about the close of the war when many of the gallant Confederates saw the inside of prison walls. But not so now. They are honored pensioners, and the old heroes are the freest of the free. In fact nothing is too good for them, and the State honors herself every time she pays them a pension.

Information has come out that porters on Pullman cars are only paid \$25 a month and have to depend on tips from passengers to get enough to live on. It is also stated that the Traveling Mens' Association has declared war on the tip system and the traveling men are right. There is no reason why they should be levied on to pay car porters, hotel waiters and bell boys, and everybody else who comes along to be tipped. It is the place of railroads, hotels, corporations and such to pay their own help.

It would not be very dignified and we are not arguing for it to be done, but if a judge now and then would permit a witness to step from the stand and smite a lawyer's mouth there would be a stop to this way lawyers have of trying to blacken a man's character just because he happens to be a witness on the opposite side for which the lawyer is appearing. Such reflections on character have been allowed to go on until a good man dislikes to be a witness in court.

As Christmas draws near keep the idea in mind that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

America Sends Christmas Cheer.

New York, Dec. 15.—For the past three days the liners leaving for Europe carried considerably over \$2,000,000 in money orders. Most of this money goes to Great Britain and Ireland especially the latter, Germany coming next. Such a generous contribution was never known before. The mails are the largest on record, hundreds of extra hands having been engaged to deal with them. The Christmas mail for Australia and the far East has already gone through this city. According to the estimate of the postoffice authorities it is 35 per cent, larger than on any other occasion.
