Superintendent Goodwin Vindicated.

Morganton, N. C., Dec. 19.—The investigation of the charges preferred by Prof. J. A. Tillinghast, of the chair of history and economics in Converse college against Superintendent E. McK. Goodwin's administration of the North Carolina school for the deaf, came to an end last Saturday afternoon. There was nothing sensational developed during the investigation. Mr. J. C. McNeill, the able and efficient reporter of the Charlotte Observer, made this remark to Professor Goodwin: "Mr. Goodwin, you have come out of the investigation without the smell of fire on you." That is the general opinion of those who attended the investigation. Nearly two weeks were consumed in long tedious questioning and answering. For two days school was suspended that all the officers and teachers might testify, the board of directors and superintendent aiding the Board of Internal Improvements in every way possible in the investigation.

Big Cotton Fire.

Weldon, N. C. Dec. 19.—The cotton storage warehouse of the Weldon Cotton Manufacturing company here has been burned to the ground together with over four hundred bales of cotton. The loss is about \$25,000.

A NERVOUS TRAVELER.

"I noticed that the fellow in 'the lower' across the aisle from me was very nervous," said a knight of the grip at the Central yesterday. "He crawled in his berth and cut again and kept poking his head between the curtains. He seemed to be uneasy about something. I could not go to sleep for watching him. Finally, about 12 o'clock, my neighbor got out in the aisle and beckoned to the porter who, with all the pomp and stiffness of his kind, came up and turned an ear.

"Saey, porter, tell the flagman to come here," passing him a quarter as he spoke.

The flagman came. "Young man," said my friend, "are you the flagman?"

"Yes, sir," was the reply. "Well, here is \$2.50; I want to go to sleep, you be sure and watch the tail end of this train."

"The company pays me to do that," said the flagman, drawing himself to his full height, "Yes, but I want to give you this extra to keep awake."—Charlotte Observer.

The above is a good illustration of the fear people feel when they travel in this day of belated trains and frequent railroad accidents. No man feels absolutely safe when he rides on a late train, and this fear is having considerable effect on travel at the present time. We have heard some railroad people say they never saw it lighter. Of course the railroads largely have themselves to blame for this state of affairs.

There are several tendencies to danger on trains that run off schedule time. When a train is on time the agents and other station men are on the lookout and have a clear way for it; but if the train is late with no certainty as to when it will arrive they go on about other work and there is a possibility of the belated train passing out of mind and everything may not be clear for it. Wrecks sometime occur in just this way. Again when a train is late the train crew themselves may get impatient, and through desire to make up as much of the lost time as possible and get home, run their trains with less care than they would otherwise exert. And this is another cause of wrecks.

People who operate trains are human beings just like other folks, and when schedules are all out of joint they are likely to get impatient under delay and over work, and are less cautious than at other times, and under such conditions the danger to the passengers is increased, the crew never thinking of danger to themselves.

All these things affect the public mind, and as most people regard their lives above all things else they avoid taking such risks as far as possible. The railroads can restore confidence by making schedules they can live up to, and stop this latter day trouble of all trains running on irregular time.

If there were not confirmatory evidence, the story told by the fireman of the late Engineer Kinney, of the Southern Railway, the latter of whom was killed in the recent wreck at Danville, could not be believed. It is that the glass was broken in the front window on the engineer's side of the cab and that at Spencer, before starting on the run, a carpenter was sent to nail tin over the window, and did so. This of course quite obstructed the engineer's view through the window and his only recourse was to lean out of the window at his side to see the track. It is not surprising, therefore, that he ploughed into the rear of a standing freight train at Danville, striking it, according to the fireman's testimony, before he knew that there was a train ahead, and dying, perhaps, without knowing what had happened. The act from which the accident resulted mounts high in the list of crimes.—Charlotte Observer.
